The enemy directed his attention particularly to the town of Ypres, where the belfry, the cathedral, the markets, and a number of houses were set on fire, to Soissons

"In the Argonne the day was characterized by very hot fighting. The enemy delivered very spirited attacks, which were repulsed. "In the Woevre and in the Vosges the situation is without change."



THEN USED REVOLVER

Fell At Last Wounded, But Is Safe in Enemy's Hospital.

ATTEMPT ALL BRITISH

Two Other Aeroplanes Kept Out of Range, But Dropped Bombs.

New York, Nov. 23.—A London cable o the Herald says: "No greater hero has been developed by the war than Lieut. Briggs, of the British royal naval air service, who was one of three aviators who tried to destroy the great Zeppelin sheds at Friedrichshafen. A dispatch received here last night by way of Berlin and the Hague from Friedrichshafen states that Lieut Briggs, with his shell-pierced gasoline tank on fire, volplaned across the sheds, dropping many bombs as he glided to the earth. pistol, he fought single-handed until he was felled by a head wound. The three British airmen, whose starting point is not announced, suddenly appeared to the Germans at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon, while flying at a great height over Lake Constance. Great precautions which the Germans

have taken to protect the Zeppelin works and its neormous dirigibles at riedrichshafen were responsible he detection of the aeroplanes. was telephoned ahead to Friedrich-shafen, and when the three aviators approached the Zeppelin plant the Ger-mans were ready for them. Krupps at Work.

A bombardment high into the sky was begun by the numerous high-powered Krupp guns that have been mounted on roofs and in a wide area surrounding the Zeppelin plant. These angles, sent scores of shells into the sky, the shells exploding near tha aeroplanes.

Two of the aeroplanes discreetly kept shrapnel shells. All three circled about the town and dropped six powerful combs. These came so close to hitting the Zeppelin sheds that a tremor of apprehension spread through the thousands of persons who were watching the combat. Two other bombs were drop-


