#### Where the Wreck Occurred

Princeton, where the Grand Trunk Atlantic express was wrecked this morning, about 5 o'clock, is forty miles from London, and only a short distance from Woodstock. There is a very steep grade there, and all trains travel at a terrific rate down the incline. It is said that as a usual thing this train would have been covering ground at the rate of not less than seventy miles an hour, but from the fact that but six people were hurt, and these only slightly, it would appear that the express this morning could not have been going so fast. Princeton and neighborhood has been the scene of several bad accidents within the past twenty years. Between Woodstock and Princeton, about four years ago, a rear-end collision occurred in which five men lost their lives. Princeton acquired fame some years since when J. Reginald Birchall lured his victim, Albert Benwell. into a swamp, and murdered him. Birchall was afterward hanged in Woodstock for the crime.
