The railway commission is out to drive a good bargain with the government road. The main argument is that the G. T. R. is committed to supplying terminal facilities for the city road, providing it with baggage rooms and selling its tickets. This is in consideration of a 99-year lease of a parcel of property between Wel-lington and Waterloo streets. At this point the G. T. R. right-of-way is only 40 feet wide, and so it leased

quite a parcel from the city. It was the fear of accidents to large crowds gathering at the G. T. R. depot, with so many tracks to cross that led the local railway commission to have a terminal of its own, with the result that the G. T. R. is freed from having to supply this. It is in lieu of this that the G. T. R. is beng asked to supply the building and land for a new terminal free of rent

Downfall of Shillington Fails To Deter Activities of "Bookmakers."

IGNORE PASTORS' PROTEST

Mythical "Odds" From Track Where Betting Is Illegal Still Featured.

Despite the protests of London elergymen—the fact that Section 235, Chapter 10, of the Dominion Criminal code, reads:

"Section 235, chapter 10: It is an offence to send by mail any infor-mation relating to bookmaking, pool-selling, betting or wagering, etc. The sender of such information by post is therefore guilty of an offence, and if the department has knowledge of it, must, in accordance with the criminal code, refuse to transmit such mail" and—the fact that the downfall of Harold W. Shillington, charged with the theft of \$75,000 in stocks and securities from a London financial institution, is alleged in usually well informed circles to have had its inception in the loss of thousands of dollars, "playing the ponies" with local "bookmakers," prior to his flight to Boston, and from there to Manchester, England - a morning newspaper, after abandoning the open publication of racing "tips" and "selections," emanating from the fertile brain of a sporting editor, fo.lowing the London Advertiser's exposure of January 11, has resumed the practice under skilled camouflage, to the detriment alike of the unwary youths of the community and the 'sport of kings.'

Method Is Simple. The method is simplicity itself, as he accompanying illustration shows. As an instance, regard the first race at New Orleans, as submitted in the extract from the publication question. Among the entries in the first race will be noted Indian P., followed by a (1); Eva Stories, followed by a (2) and Martha L., followed by a (3).

Why should they be there at all? It is an indisputable fact, which reference to the files of the newspaper in question will prove, that prior to January 11 these numbers did not appear after the names of any of the horses in the entries at any of the meetings.

Points Out Absence of Serious Accidents in Local Factories.

The report of survey of industrial s in London, undertaken through the co-operation of the London Chamber of Commerce and the Social Service Council of Canada, and carried out by Mabel H. Christie department of labor, Toronto, contains the information that in the of "Machinery and Metals, of which they have had reports from five out of the seven establishments in London, 2,597 persons are employd, of which 1,528 are men and 1,031 women, and 38 children between the

ages of 14 and 16. According to the report the employment is for the most part con-stant in this industry, the slack time is generally during the months of March and April, but the staffs are usually retained.

The report contains the number and nature of the accidents sustained by the employees, none of wnich appear to be serious, and number only about 50, due largely to care-

In one firm only is there any welfare work done, that establishment keeping a trained nurse in attendance all the time.

A cafeteria is operated and a mid-morning lunch provided. A committee made up of 100 mem bers manage all the welfare activi-

The largest number of male em ployees receive wages between \$20 and \$30 a week, while the female help receive from \$10 to \$20, with a few skilled hands receiving above tha

amount. There is only one report of a strike given, while most of the plants are operated on the open shop policy.

The hours of labor for the industry are: For men, 44 to 50 hours week, and for women, 50 hours.

Viscount Lascelles To Take Bride To Mansion in Yorkshire.

SUMMER AT HAREWOOD

Town Residence Will Be Chesterfield House, Completed in 1749.

LONDON, England, Jan. 23.—Interest Viscount Lascelles continues to grow it this country, and the general public picks up news in connection with the future home-making of the royal lad; and her non-royal lover with avidity Plans for wedding gifts have taken pos-session of the people, and the gifts will be as varied as the numerous groups of givers differ in their ideas with re-gard thereto. London itself will make a gift to the bride. The lord mayor has announced the opening of a fund for this purpose. To the staid married people probably one of the uppermost questions in connection with the com-ing marriage is, "Where will the couple

To begin with, the princess and her husband propose to live during the early part of their married life at Goldsorough Hall, Yorkshire. Goldsborough Hall is a red brick early Jacobean man-sion standing in a park and gardens which have an area of over 100 acres. The village of Goldsborough is near the old town of Knaresparough

Goldsborough Hall is the property of Aylmer Cemetery. ord Lascelles' father, Lord Harewood who himself lived there for fourteer years. For the past 26 years the man-sion has been occupied by W. R. Lamb a Vorkshire magistrate, and his family Mr. Lamb has arranged to give up pos-session on April 30, and the hall is to be prepared for the reception of Lord Lascelles and his bride next summer The future country residence of Prin-cess Mary and her husband will be Harewood House, the home of the Las-

celles family. It is a state commanding fine views of the natural beauties of Wharfedale. It has many royal associations, and the early Lords of Harewood were of regal descent The name is said to be derived from Here-wood—the wood of the soldiers— where a battle was fought between Danes and Saxons. The royal castle, which was built in the reign of Edward III., has long since been dismantled, but its ruins and the old church, with its wonderful sculptured tombs remain The present mansion was built in 1760 for Edwin Lascelles, who was created the first Baron Harewood in 1790. It took twelve years to build it, at a cost, t is said, of £120,000.

Harewood House was enlarged and improved about sixty years ago, and it was then that the fine Italian garden on the south terrace was planned. The palatial front affords a sweeping view of wooded landscape, and nearer, the gardens, which were laid out at a cost of £16,000. The grounds contain a famous "Tokay" vine, 70 feet long and twenty four feet wide, which was planted in 1783. The state apartments are handsomely decorated and furnished. In Harewood House are wonderful painted ceilings by Rebecci, Rose and Zucchi; plaques by Kauffman, and portraits by

Reynolds, Hoppner and Lawrence; also a collection of china—largely Sevres— valued at over £200,000. The Prince of Wales stayed at Harewood House last summer, the king and queen were entertained there in 1908, when their majesties visited Leeds to open the new university buildings. King Edward and Queen Alexandra were guests at Harewood House, as Queen Victoria had been there before her ac ssion to the throne.

Lord Lascelles' town residence is Chesterfield House, which he bought from the Dowager Lady Burton early last year. Until then he lived, when in London, with his brother and sisterin-law, the Hon. Edward and Mrs. Lascelles, in South street. W. I. Chester and the corner of field House stands at the corner of Audley and Curzon streets. It has rather gloomy exterior, with a closed court yard. When Lord Lascelles bought court yard. When Lord Lascelles bought Chesterfield House it was the head-quarters of the League of Nations, and it was lent to the government as a residence for the Crown Prince of Japan during his recent visit to this country. The house was built for the fourth Earl of Chesterfield, the author of the famous "Letters to My Son." It was completed in 1749, and has remained practically unchanged.





"It is a fact that many of our best

nechanics, foremen and superintendents have secured their knowl edge at the night school, as you say. I can recall a number of cases, where men, after being well along with their trade, wanted to specialize in tool making, but found they needed nore mathematics and drawing, and another who, after spending some years in a drafting room, found out he was never going to be much more than a tracer, because he hadn't the education that would allow him to go on and combine initiative with his work, as is required of the designing draftsman. It took, in several cases, a couple of years' hard work at night to remedy the defects in the education of these mechanics, but today they have made good, and they have done so by their own efforts and the assist ance they secured in a night school."

No doubt there are many similar cases. There is a tendency to laugh at the advertisements used by some item is that in the estimated reof the correspondence schools, showing a man elated over a promotion, or over his ability to tell his wife that they can go ahead and get the things now they were not able to get before.

Back of it all, every man in the mechanical field today knows that he is up against a proposition that is changing very rapidly. #### HOW TO KEEP WELL Cockroaches

BY DR. R. H. BISHOP. OCKROACHES as



carriers of disease have not been proved to be more dangerous than flies. Yet there are few people would not rather have many flies around than one cockroach. Like flies, how-

ever, cockroaches carry germs on their legs. Their legs are not hairy, as those of flies, and in consequence the number of germs on a cockroach is not liable to exceed 10,000, while flies commonly have more than 100,000.

Roaches feed on sputum, where of pneumonia, there are germs tuberculosis and colds, and on filth where reside germs of typhoid fever and summer complaint. Their legs, covered with the germs from one food, are wiped on the next food catch, which may be food ready for human consumption.

All in all, cockroaches are not as capable of spreading disease as are flies, but they are capable enough to warrant reckoning with.



### JAPAN AGREES TO WITHDRAW SIBERIAN ARMY

Disclaims Any Intention of Disputing Territorial Integrity of Russia.

WINS FAVOR OF PARLEY

Agreement On All Far Eastern Questions Seen At Early Date.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 23.-A sweeping disclaimer of any claim against the territorial integrity of Russia, coupled with a pledge to withdraw the Japanese troops stationed in Siberia as soon as orderly conditions are restored, was presented to the arms conference Far Eastern committee today by the Japanese Selegation, and was received with a general show of satisfaction by the representatityes of the other princi-

Formal discussion of the Japanese policy was postponed until tomorrow, but there was no indication tonight that any of the "big five" delegations would oppose acceptance of today's declaration at its face value, or seriously dispute the plan for continuing at present Japanese occupation of

The general opinion was that the whole Siberian subject touched upon today for the first time soon would be disposed of on the basis of the Japanese pleages.

Reach Shantung Pact. At the same time, the long-continued Shantung negotiations also approached their conclusion. At their 31st meeting to discuss the subject the Japanese and Chinese virtually completed an agreement on all of the issues involved, except the central question of the TsingTao-TsinanFu Railroad, and there were signs of impending developments regarding

Ma Soo, Washington representative of the unrecognized Chinese govern ment of Canton, announced that a railroad settlement already had been

In connection with the Japanese statement regarding Siberia, it was revealed that the American government had addressed a communication on that subject to Tokio shortly before the arms conference met, and that the Japanese foreign office had replied virtually in the same terms as laid down at today's committee meeting by Baron Shidehara.

Conceal Purport of Note.
The exact purport of the United States note was not disclosed, but it was said to have pointed out that the United States forces having been withdrawn from Siberia, there was much speculation as to why the Japanese troops remained.

The Chinese declined to reveal their attitude toward the Japanese policy, and the only note of criticism came from outside the conference, in a statement by the delegation sent to Washington by the unrecognized Far Eastern republic of Chita, Siberia. The Japanese promise drawal from Siberian soil, the statement declared, has been a "chronic statement" of the Tokio government since August, 1920.


