BITS OF SCIENCE.

The aurora spectrum does not, as a rule, contain the lines of iron. An interesting find in shape of a boulder of jade was recently made in Sika. The mines in the Argentine Republic are again attracting capitalists after a ten years' rest. Evidence seems to show that age affects the intensity of sleep more than the frequency of dreams.

The new course in electricity at Columbia college will be open to graduates of all scientific schools. From a general view taken in England, the natives appear to be increasing in vigor, rather than degenerating. Lake Biwa, in Japan, is the largest sheet of fresh water in that country, having an area of 500 square miles. It may be generally stated that tornadoes do not occur in the United States west of the one hundredth meridian.

A society has been formed for the granting of premiums for the killing of animals proving up the elder duck. Kustner's observations on the aberration of fixed stars tend toward proving that the altitude of the pole is variable. Professor Waage thinks that sterilizing infusorial earth would be very much better as a means of preservation than boric acid.

A new compound containing aluminum in a lower state of oxidation corresponding to ferrous iron has been obtained. An exhibition will be opened in Paris in September next for machines especially adapted for the peeling of ramie stalks. The necessity for the artificial application of water is said to be far greater in California than in the other countries of Europe.

In the Berlin observatory a series of astronomical panoramas has been prepared to explain the phenomena of solar eclipses. Dew on growing vegetables is said to be produced by the condensation of the transparent material from the plant on its own leaves. The so-called annular tubes of the Sutherland quartzite are said to be the remains of terrestrial plants that grew upon gneiss domes.

Explosive crystallizes in alcohol in the form of pearly pellets, and is either in that of sharp needles, and is quite insoluble in water. About 1850 B. C., when Emperor Yan gave the order for the observation of the meridian stars is thought to be the beginning of Chinese astronomy. From Nov. 1 to Jan. 6 at least twenty comets were visible to the height of Venus, while the size of the base of the cone of eruption was proportionally increased.

Hertz's recent experiments prove that actual magnetic waves are reflected and interfere with one another, and that the velocity of such waves is about what is calculated. The great advantage of high speed engines, or rather, that very little of it is condensed in comparison with low speed engines. Helmholtz has shown that if an inviolable jet of steam be electrified or heated it becomes visible with bright tints of different colors according to the potential of the atmosphere.

The temperature of Siberia was once much milder than at present. This change of climate is said to account for the conversion of what were once sedentary birds there into birds that migrate to south Africa and elsewhere. The density of a medium capable by its resistance of causing a secular acceleration of half a second in the mean velocity of the moon would correspond with a kilogramme of matter uniformly diffused through a space of 900,000 square miles.—New York Times.

IDEAS FOR DRESS.

White astrakhan is the favorite fur for long, dressy evening and carriage frocks. The Sara Crews frock is as fashionable for little girls as the Little Lord Fauntleroy suit is for boys. Ribbon striped necks and gausers are again on the dry goods counters among new fall dress fabrics.

Slippers or low shoes, with big rosettes or Louis XIV bows on the instep, are the rigour for evening wear. It looks incongruous to see new spring fabrics on the counters alongside the furs and heavy woollens of the passing season.

Russian collars of otter, beaver and long pile Alaska seals are worn effectively with seal plush wraps in the coldest weather. London women are carrying very small muffs this winter, but their little children's muffs are all made of exaggerated size.

High heeled shoes and boots are no longer worn except by women who do not know how to dress and who wish to attract attention. Bows are as fashionable as ever, but the preference is given to those which are made flat around the neck like a collar and gradually assume a round shape as they taper to the ends.

A black and white costume always attracts attention, and therefore most always be well conceived, well thought out and well carried out to be in good taste and altogether pleasing.
