 EVENING SESSION, August 22nd, 1859.

Exercises commenced by singing the 784th Hymn of the Psalmist, and prayer by Rev. D. W. C. Dimock.

Foreign Missionary Report was read by Rev. Dr. Tupper, Secretary of the Board, as follows :

## REPORT OF THE FOREIGN MISSIONARY BOARD.

At the last meeting of the Convention it was ascertained that there had occurred an unexpected delay in the transmission of the sum of 400 dollars which had been forwarded to Boston, for the support of native preachers in Burmah. Your Secretary immediately addressed a letter to F. A. Smith, Esq., Assistant Treasurer of the American Baptist Missionary Union, requesting information relative to the cause of this delay. Brother Smith replied with promptness and urbanity, and stated, in effect, that our remittance was received *after* the appropriations for the current year had been made out; but added, that the Executive Committee had now determined to "appropriate special donations at once, and thus prevent the delay arising from making only annual appropriations as heretofore."

Brother Crawley, in a letter dated Henthadah, Oct. 16th, 1858, furnished a pleasing and encouraging account of the manner in which the first remittance had been employed in the support of three active and useful Assistants during the greater part of the year preceding, gratefully acknowledging the receipt of the 400 dollars remitted, and expressed himself satisfied with the explanation given him by the Foreign Secretary with reference to its retention.

The Board, however, at a meeting held in Tremont, Aylesford, Nov. 30th, concluded that it would be more expeditious and advantageous to obtain an English Government Draft, and forward it directly to Brother Crawley in Henthadah. In accordance with a Resolution passed in approval of this course, the sum of 400 dollars for the support of native preachers, and 100 dollars for Sister Crawley's Female School, was thus remitted, through the favor of Brother J. W. Barss of Wolfville.

In a letter addressed to your Secretary, dated April 18th, 1859, Brother Crawley acknowledged the receipt of this sum in the following terms:—

"MY DEAR DR. TUPPER,

"Your welcome note, together with the remittance by Brother Barss, has been safely received. I would say at once, that no course could be more safe, easy, or satisfactory, than this one of remitting by Government Draft on London. This supply is most opportune. The Board at Boston are seriously embarrassed pecuniarily, and find no small difficulty in raising funds sufficient to pay Missionaries' salaries. It must

be cause of no small satisfaction to the brethren at home to reflect, that through their liberality our missionary operations continue unchecked, through a period when, *otherwise*, the Missionary would have to work on single-handed, and behold the harvest perishing for lack of labourers."

Our esteemed Brother adds, "I am just now proceeding to a tour of some 50 miles above Henthada, where seed has been sown by some of the Assistants, and there are a few enquirers. When I last wrote you there were *four* assistants supported by your fund. I have since been able to add another, a young man of intelligence and much promise. It surely but needs the fervent prayers of the *supporters of these brethren*, to put it in my power to write home such news as will make every heart an altar of joyful thank-offering.

"The Draft realized in Rangoon 960 rupees. Please render my thanks to all concerned in this liberality."

With reference to the proposed school, Brother C. remarks, "You will, ere this, have received my letter, informing you of Mrs. Crawley's return home. I trust, however, the same feeling of interest in the *female school* will continue—its patrons regarding its establishment as *postponed*, not *relinquished*. Mrs. C. will soon return, I hope with recruited strength, and better able, therefore, to initiate the school."

On receiving intelligence of this unavoidable postponement, your Secretary wrote to Brother Crawley, suggesting the expediency of employing the 100 dollars, already sent, in the support of native preachers, with the understanding that this amount shall be retained, to be appropriated for sustaining the female school when it may be established. The Board, at their Session in Upper Wilmot, June 13th, passed a resolution adopting this course. As 2 pounds additional have been contributed, there are now 27 pounds in reserve for this object. Further contributions for it are affectionately solicited.

As it is understood that Government Bills cannot be procured for smaller sums than £100 sterling (\$500,) it has been judged advisable to retain the remaining \$100 voted at the last meeting of the Convention, till after the present Session, when it can be remitted with an additional amount that may be appropriated to the support of our native preachers in Burmah.

Under date of May 3rd, our faithful and valued Superintendent writes, "In my recent tour up the river there were two applicants for baptism. Though I had reason to think them both sincere, still I thought it best that they should obtain a clearer knowledge of the nature of conversion, and sustain another examination, before they were admitted to membership. Last Sunday I baptized a man whose name I will mention, as I think it very likely I shall have frequent occasion to allude to him. His name is Mounk Kan Gye. I regard his case as perhaps one of the most encouraging that has occurred in connexion with this or any other mission. At the age of twelve years he received a tract at the mission house in Rangoon; read it, and received from it impressions which never left him. They led him to renounce all connexion with priests and idolatry, and to tremble at the thought of what awaited him beyond the grave. For nearly thirty years he continued with his mind ill at ease,—now searching for a Saviour, and again quenching for a while in worldly pursuits the burnings of his spirit. I was struck at once on meeting him, with the earnestness expressed in his face. He was a sinner, and he needed a Saviour: that he felt, he said, in his inmost soul. Almost in the language of the Eunuch he professed his faith in Jesus Christ, and asked for baptism. . . . On Sunday, after the morning service, the disciples, in a most faithful, and at the same time kindly manner, put to him many searching questions, and were so well satisfied with his answers, that on the putting of the vote he was received by acclamation.

This is the third baptism we have had since I returned from Maulmain. Tell the brethren, Dear Sir, that the Burman Mission is *not* a failure. Let them give liberally, and pray earnestly, and "try" the LORD, "and see if He do not pour out a blessing" even upon these unpromising Burmese.

"The assistants all continue labouring quietly and steadily at their posts; and they are doing a great work, for they are preaching the Gospel that is able to save."

Your Board conceive that the cheering intelligence contained in these extracts from the letters recently received, as well as in those from others already published, may well stimulate all the friends of Christ and lovers of the souls of the perishing heathen, to zealous and persevering efforts for the continued support of the faithful and efficient laborers now employed, and for the increase of their number. Who can fail to be delighted with the thought, that, at a comparatively trifling expense, we are now sustaining *five* intelligent and indefatigable native missionaries in Burmah, of whom one, Moungh Thet Nau, labouring successfully at Donabew, may be justly regarded as the representative and successor of our late beloved Brother Burpe, by whose labours he was brought to the knowledge of Christ?

The Treasurer's Report presents some pleasing instances of donations kindly made for this Mission. It is, however, apparent, that, while we ought to be providing means to send out a mission family, even at our present limited rate of expenditure, our funds will soon be exhausted, unless they be replenished by contributions much more readily commensurate with the demands. They obviously ought to be made, with increased liberality, throughout the three Provinces.

It affords your Board much pleasure to state, in conclusion, that the Juvenile Missionary Board of Brussels Street, St. John, N. B., have determined to support a native preacher under the supervision of Brother Crawley. The expense is estimated at about \$80 per annum. They have now sent the sum of \$50, to be forwarded with our next remittance. May this worthy example be imitated by many other Societies and individuals!

On motion of Rev. Dr. Cramp, seconded by Rev. W. H. Humphrey, the report was adopted.

The Rev. W. G. Parker, moved the following resolution:

*Resolved*, That the success attending the employment of native assistants under the supervision of Brother Crawley, calls for devout gratitude to God, and should excite us to increased effort to enlarge their number, and to pray that "great grace may be upon them all."

Seconded by Rev. I. E. Bill, and adopted.

The following resolution was moved by the Rev. S. T. Rand:

*Resolved*, That efforts must be made to increase our funds. As our outlays at present exceed our income, the friends of the Mission must pray more, read and preach about it more, and must give more, and more must give. Union Societies must be revived, Juvenile Missionary Societies formed, public collections taken, and subscriptions and private donations must be made on a large and liberal scale.

Seconded by Rev. T. A. Higgins, and adopted.

The Rev. S. N. Bentley, travelling agent for the Nova Scotia Domestic Missionary Board, addressed the meeting presenting the claims of the Home Mission and announcing his purpose to solicit contributions for that society.

The Missionary Hymn was sung while the collection was being taken up.

On motion, adjourned.

TUESDAY, A. M., August 23rd, 1859.

Prayer by Rev. S. N. Bentley.

There being but few present, the discussion of the subject of Education was deferred, and Brother S. Selden submitted the following resolutions :

*Whereas*, There has been, hitherto, great diversity in the form of statistical tables, especially with regard to the benevolence of the churches as published in the Minutes of the Associations holding fraternal connection with this Convention, which do not give a correct return of their contributions.

*Resolved, therefore*, That it is highly desirable that greater uniformity be observed in the tables of statistics and that the following be recommended as headings of the columns in such tables:—Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Ministerial Education, Infirm Ministers, &c.

*Also Resolved*, That it is highly desirable that all contributions of each church, as far as possible, be reported to its Association, and be made items in such tables, although the sums may have been appropriated through other channels.

The following resolution was submitted by Bro. D. McN. Parker, M. D. :

*Resolved*, That the pastors and officers of the churches connected with this Convention be urgently requested to organize a System in their several churches by which each member may contribute a sum not less than 1s. 3d. per annum. for the support of young men studying preparatory for the ministry at Acadia College; or at the Academies of Horton and Fredericton; and that Committees be appointed by this Convention, one in Nova Scotia and one in New Brunswick, for carrying into effect the above suggestion and for appropriating the funds collected.

*Also*, That all monies raised by such means which shall not be required for the object named, be appropriated to the payment of the Theological Professor's salary.

The clauses having been discussed were severally adopted.

*Voted*, That Rev'ds. B. Hughes, D. W. C. Dimock, George Armstrong, and Brother J. E. Masters be a Committee to nominate the above named Committees.

The subject of Education having been introduced, the Rev. Professor Sawyer, moved, and Brother H. Vaughan seconded the adoption of the Educational reports, which motion was carried.

The following resolution was moved by Rev. D. M. Welton :

*Resolved*, That sound, enlightened, and thorough education, imparted under wholesome and religious influences, is an unspeakable blessing to any people, and is absolutely necessary to the elevation of society, the preservation of true liberty, and, when sanctified by the grace of God, is highly serviceable in maintaining and extending the Gospel of Christ among men.

Seconded by Rev. T. A. Higgins, and adopted.

Rev. D. Freeman moved the following resolution :

*Resolved*, That in view of the large measure of success which has attended our educational operations in connection with Acadia College, this Convention has abundant cause of gratitude to God, and of encouragement to continued effort in the cause.

Seconded by Rev. Dr. Cramp, and adopted.

Rev. G. Armstrong moved the following resolution :

*Resolved*, That the existence, advancement and enlarged success of Acadia College is closely connected with the prosperity and extension of the Baptist denomination in the three Provinces represented in this Convention.

Seconded by Rev. S. N. Bentley, and adopted.

The following resolution was moved by the Hon. J. W. Johnston :

*Resolved*, That it is the duty of the Baptists in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and P. E. Island to maintain Acadia College, in the present crisis of its history, with undiminished efficiency; and to furnish the means necessary to enlarge its operations with as little delay as possible.

Seconded by Rev. S. W. de Blois and adopted.

The Committee on departed Brethren, reported as follows :

Since the last meeting of this Convention, it has pleased God to remove by death two brethren in the ministry, one from Nova Scotia and the other from New Brunswick.

Rev. Ebenezer Stronach, of Wilmot, N. S., died Nov. 25th. He had been engaged for nearly thirty years as a christian minister—principally as a missionary. His success shows that "his labor was not in vain in

the Lord." Love was, with him, the ruling passion. It shone in his countenance, gave a subdued mildness to all his actions, and a meekness to his appearance.

In his private conversation and public ministrations he delighted to dwell upon the love and sufferings of his Saviour.

The Rev. Charles Thorne, of the parish of Johnson, N. B., has also departed this life. He was a warm-hearted, devoted Christian, and for many years preached the gospel of the grace of God with commendable zeal and with encouraging tokens of the divine favor. "The memory of the just is blessed."

### REPORT.

*To the Board of Governors of Acadia College:—*

The undersigned being appointed a Visiting Committee, to attend the Quarterly or half-yearly examinations of the Classes of Acadia College, &c., report that they were present at, and assisted in the examinations held on the *first* and *second* of June. Classes in *Geometry, Mechanics, Political Economy, Geology, Tacitus, Virgil, Homer, Hebrew, Ecclesiastical History* and *Theology* were examined. On the whole we were much pleased with the evidences of ability and thoroughness on the part of the Professors, and of diligence, zeal and progress on the part of the Students. It is evident, however, that the Professors are endeavouring to accomplish more than ought to be required of them. The Rev. Dr. Cramp's engagements in the College during the year, have been as follows:

*Freshman Class:—*Modern History, Three Quarters; daily recitations, five days in the week.

*Junior Class:—*Moral Science, half year; Christian Evidence one Quarter; Geology, one Quarter; daily recitation, four days in the week.

*Senior Class:—*Last half year,—Political Economy, daily recitations, four days in the week.

In the *Theological Department*, Dr. Cramp gave lectures on *Theology* or *Ecclesiastical History*, daily, five days in the week.

*Hebrew:—*A daily recitation five days in the week.

*Exegesis* on the Greek Testament once a week.

Of these, Moral Science, Christian Evidences, Geology, Hebrew and Exercises are not properly included in the duties of Dr. Cramp's professorship. There is no Sophomore class in those departments as now being conducted; the proper direction and satisfactory

The Rev. A. W. Sawyer, A. M., the Professor of Latin and Greek, conducted Classes in the following exercises during the year :—

*Freshman Class* :—A recitation in Latin or Greek four days in the week, three Quarters ; fourth Quarter, recitation both in Greek and Latin four days in the week ; Latin or Greek Composition every Saturday morning.

*Junior Class* :—Recitation in Greek or Latin four days in the week through the year.

*Senior Class* :—Recitation through the first term in Intellectual Philosophy four days in the week ; for three Quarters a weekly exercise in English.

*Literature* :—For three Quarters, recitation in Greek or Latin four days in the week.

In addition to the duties of his professorship, Professor Sawyer takes charge of the *Rhetorical Department*, which demands considerable time and attention, as may be seen by the following statement :—

One Essay from each member of the Freshman Class is required the last Quarter.

An Essay once a week from each student during his second or third years. Seniors during first Term present two Essays for private examination, and deliver two orations each before the College assembled in full. These Essays are examined privately, and then with each writer. Besides these Professor Sawyer is expected to conduct a daily recitation in *Rhetoric* with the Sophomore Class, during the first Term. This year there has been no Sophomore Class.

Mr. R. L. Weatherbe, A. B., has given instruction in Algebra and Geometry, to the *Freshman Class*.

Mr. H. Vaughan, A. B., has had charge of the *Junior Class* in Spherical Trigonometry, Nautical Astronomy, Surveying, Analytical Geometry, Calculus, Mechanics.

The additional services named above, Professors Cramp and Sawyer consent to render in view of the exigencies of the College. We hope the time may soon come when the friends of Acadia College will supply means for procuring instruction in those departments, so that the present Professors may not as now be compelled to withdraw any of their attention from the proper duties of their Professorships. Increased efficiency and satisfaction would be the result were such provision made.

It is impossible for the Professors to continue these *extra* services for an extended period, without impairing their usefulness in their own departments. Our Denomination and all friendly should put forth the proper efforts to increase the Faculty of Instruction immediately. This cannot be long delayed without serious injury to the prosperity and reputation of the College.

In compliance with the suggestion of the Faculty, and also in consideration of a want which seems to be generally experienced, your Board have caused to be prepared, and presented to the Public, in our periodicals, the scheme of an entirely English Course of Study, extending to two years. Those who enter for that Course must be prepared for the same examination as matriculating students, the Latin and Greek Languages excepted. They must have a competent acquaintance with English Grammar, Arithmetic, Geography, Ancient History, and Algebra as far as Quadratic Equations.

The studies of the "English Course" will be divided as follows, viz:—

FIRST YEAR.

*First Term*:—Algebra, Modern History, Rhetoric.

*Second Term*:—Geometry, Modern History concluded, Logic.

SECOND YEAR.

*First Term*:—Moral Science, Political Economy, Chemistry or Mathematics.

*Second Term*:—Evidences of Christianity, Geology, Intellectual Philosophy, Chemistry or Mathematics concluded.

Rhetorical Exercises will be attended to throughout the course.

Certificates will be given at the close of the Course to those who sustain a satisfactory examination.

It being decided at the last meeting of the Convention to recommend the employment of the Rev. D. Freeman as Financial Agent of this Board, that recommendation was adopted, and Bro. Freeman during the past year has been constantly employed in his work.

The year just closed has been one of unprecedented financial embarrassment throughout the Provinces, and perhaps Bro. Freeman's success has not been commensurate with the expectations formed. A great work however in securing and deciding the value of old notes, and settling up old subscriptions, has been accomplished, as will appear from the Agent's report. And your Board have great pleasure in testifying to the thoroughness and efficiency with which that work has been accomplished.

Adverting again to the Minutes of the last Convention, we find a resolution authorizing and requiring your Board to make sale of a certain piece of land on the north side of the road opposite the College.

It being the opinion of some members of your Board, that such sale could not be effected, on account of legal objections, your Board sought the advice of the Attorney General of Nova Scotia; whose opinion on examination of the Deed of Conveyance, was adverse to the legality of such sale, unless a special Act of the House of Assembly of this Province, could be procured, in the application for which Act, the N. S. Baptist Education Society must unite. Your Board were therefore compelled to relinquish the project for the present.

Six members of your Board retire from office at this meeting of the Convention, in conformity with the act of Incorporation. This is the first year since said act was passed, that the rotation system can be adopted. Those who thus retire are subject to re-election or otherwise as the case may be.

Your Board trust that at this meeting of the Convention such measures will be adopted, as will indicate on the part of the Baptist body of these Provinces, a determination to sustain our beloved institution in the highest state of efficiency.

Five new Churches have been constituted : at Tusket Lakes, and River Philip, N. S. ; at Black River, N. B. ; and at Salmon River, and St. Peter's Road, P. E. I.

Six new Meeting Houses have been opened, viz ; in *Nova Scotia*, at Windsor—Black River, near Gasperaux—Greenpod Square, Lower Aylesford—Diligent River—and Mills village ; in *New Brunswick*, at Cambridge, Q. C.

The large number of baptisms reported (larger than at any previous meeting of the Convention) indicates the gracious blessing enjoyed in many of the Churches during the year. There have been seasons of remarkable revival, and numerous conversions have gladdened the hearts of God's people.

The Committee take the liberty to remind their brethren of solemn responsibility connected with these bestowments.

The new converts require careful instruction, continuous training, and all the appliances of parental solicitude, that they may grow up into vigorous, healthful piety. And the Churches which have been favoured with revival mercies need the exercise of special vigilance lest the ardour of holy excitement be succeeded by coldness and declension.

The deficiency of pastors is much to be deplored. There are not half as many pastors in these Provinces as there are churches. And there are large districts which call for evangelizing effort; but "the labourers are few."

The measure adopted by the Convention with the view to the raising of a fund for ministerial education deserves to be commended to the earnest attention of the Churches. It is believed that there are many young men, in different parts of the Provinces, who are gifted for usefulness, and to whom a course of preparatory instruction, would be invaluable, but who are unable to repair to our Institutions for want of funds. The duty of the Churches to assist them is evident; and it may be hoped that such liberal contributions will be gathered as shall suffice to meet the exigency.

While in some places the spiritual rain has plentifully descended, the majority of the churches, it is to be feared, are far from being in a prosperous state. The causes should be searched out. Examination and enquiry will doubtless bring to light deficiencies to be supplied and evils to be corrected. May we be prepared to receive the instruction, warning, or reproof, with submissive teachableness!
