Robbers of the Mall.—The mail from Kingston, including those from the western part of the Province, which left here on Thursday evening between 8 and 9, was robbed about fourt-en miles below, near Grass' Creek, and this side of Fairman's taven. The robbers, three in number, one of whom had Creek, and this side of Fairman's tavern. The robers, three in number, (one of whom had his face blackened) stopped the mail carrier, who was in a one horse waggon, while ascending a hill. Two of them seized the horse's head, while the third presented a rifle at the earnier's breast. They then cut the harness from the horse, threw the mail bag upon him and made off—first tying up the driver with the reins. It appears, by tracking the horse, that they carried the mail to a skill in the creek not far off: that they then rowed down it to the river, and were seen by persons corssing to the American shore. The carrier succeeded with his teeth in getting one arm loose, so so to obtain his knife, and to cut his fastenings. The horse has been found. We fear, that at this sesson of the year the mail would cen-

Further Particulars.—Yesterday, Maxwell Greenwood, the lad who had charge of the Mail at the time of the robbery, went before the Grand Juty of the Midland District, now is session at this place, and made affidavit to fibe following effect. Le state d that on Thursday evening at about half past eleven o'clock while proceeding with the mail downwards he was stopped by three men in a small, ine wood, about half a mile beyond Grass' Creek on the Montreal road, and thirten miles and a half below kingston. It bathe mail in a one hoise waggon. Two of the robbers took hold of the horse by the head, and the third levelled a gun at him. They then cut the lines and traces of his harness, and tied deponant in the waggon. One of them said, "I know the place to take the mail," and added 'shere is Johnston;" another said, "may name is Johnston." Deponent told him that he was not Johnston, having seen that person before and knew him by sight. Never mind, said the robber, tell that my name is Johnston, They asked deponent if he had any news, to which he replied in the negative. They then enquired if there were many Yankes, to be hung at Kingston. After seeing that deponent was well bound and secured, they took his horse and puriting the mail on his back went off towards the river. He asked them what they were going to do with his horse, when one of them answered that he would get him soon. One of the party said, "you took the mail yesterday morning," to which he said "Yes." One of them had a dark race, and it occurred to deponent that he was an Indian, whom he had formerly seen. The person who lied deponant was a good deal agitated—his hands trembled much while binding him. Soon after the robbers went away, deponent succeeded in releasing his arms and hastened to give the alarm in the neighbourhood, but tound some difficulty in getting assistance. Deponent proceeded to Gananoque and related the whole affair to the Post Master. When deponent was first attacked the robbers made such a yelling noise that he thought there were twenty of them. The person who took the mail said to deponent—"you may say that Johnston has got the mail again." This person was previously very silent, and kept at a little distance.
