No more heroic effort has been made

They tried to keep him back but he had been with them in Ginchy and other struggles, and he would not desert his boys now, so he continued to work on the shell torn

continued to work on the shell torn bullet swept field, his kindly face seen now beside some wounded man, now beside another, who was dying. It was while he was kneeling to give absolution to some badly wounded man that a German shell broke near him and he was killed. It was a great loss to the Irish troops and his name was spoken of with tears by those left behind.

Among others who will not be forgotten, is the doctor who, for five days and five nights, continued to rescue the wounded under heavy fire.

Telesphore Legault, Montreal, who was employed as a painter at the Deaf Mute Institute was killed by lightning while crossing the open court in the rear of the main building of the institute.


