THE BUCTOUCHE CYCLONE.

THE Moniteur Acadien gives the following account of the "breaking" and His "Literature" is Varied, course of the cyclone:-About four o'clock in the afternoon,

(Wednesday) the sky was covered with dark thick clouds, and heavy thunder claps were heard in the distance. This presaged a tempest, but nobody expected the terrific one that plunged the people of the north in terror.
Some thick clouds ploughed the sky and two especially enormously large and black approached each other from opposite directions and came into collision at Rich Cove, about two miles above St. Mary's Church. The shock was terrible and formed a waterspout, conical in shape and of a frightful size. Many of the inhabitants of the south bank witnessed the spectacle, and say that what they saw resembled an enormous cylinder emitting fire and steam with a tremendous noise. The cyclone moving toward the east traversed a small wood, uprooting and raising everything in the course of its passage for a width of two acres. After describing a circle towards the north the waterspout rushed upon a barn belonging to Rev. Mr. Ouellet, at a quarter of a mile behind the Presbya quarter of a mile benind the Presby-tery, which it demolished almost com-pletely, leaving only a part of the gable end standing, The zigzag course saved St. Mary's Church, the Presbytery and their dependencies, which thus by good fortune escaped certain destruction. Advancing toward the east in a zigzag and circular fashion, the waterspout came in the twinkling of an eye to the Buctonche Church, where it wrought its last destruction on this side of the frith, and from which, after crossing the bay and the shore, it lost itself in the sea.



The following is a summary of the judgments delivered to-day by the Court on the Canada Temperance Act. This was a rule nisi for a certiorari obtained and argued last Trinity term before Allen, C. J., the question being the ultra vires of the Canada Temperance Act of 1878.

The judgement of the Court is as fol-

Welcon J.—The question is whether erals will probably predominate. and commerce. If so, it is good. The preamble states it is for another pur pose, but the whole act may be looked at. My opinion is the Act is for the Parliament has no power to affect the licensing power of the local legislatures. It is said the object of the Act is a legislation against crime. It is not such an Act as is intended by the Imperial Act; it interferes with civil rights and property. In Reg. vs Justices of Kings the court said the Parliament may legislate exclusively on the subject. But this is not legislation regulating commerce but temperance. The question before the Court was not the power the Parliament had to make laws, but dealing with a law which interfered with trade and commerce. I think the rule should be made ab-

rade and commerce it is ultra vires. The term trade and commerce refers to international as well as to foreign trade.

Reg. vs. Justices of Kings does not degreat proclamation of freedom. For great proclamation of freedom. and property when it limits or withholds the power of granting liquor licenses. The law is not for the regulation of trade but for the he law itself it is a sumptuary law, the promotion of temperance, and making a distinction between the rich and poor. 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#### REGULATIONS

Respecting the Disposal of certain Do-minion Lands for the purposes of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

DEPARTMENT OF INTERIOR, Ottawa, July 9th, 1879.

"Public notice is hereby given that the following regulations are promulgated as governing the mode of disposing of the Dominion Lands situate within 110 (one hundred and ten) miles on each side of the line of the Canadian Pacific Railway:

1. "Untilifurther and final survey of the said railway has been made west of the Red River, and for the purpose of these Regulations, the line of the said railway shall be assumed to be on the fourth base westerly to the intersection of the said base by the line between ranges 21 and 22 west of the first principal meridan, and thence in a direct line to the confluence of the Shell River with the river Assinibeine.

2. "The country lying on each side of the

2. "The country lying on each side of the line of railway shall be respectively divided into belts as follows:

(1) A belt of five miles on either side o the railway, and immediately adjoining the same, to be called belt A; "(2) A belt of fifteen miles on either side of the railway adjoining belt A, to be called belt

"(3) A belt of twenty miles on either side of the railway, adjoining belt B, to be called belt C;

"(4) A belt of twenty miles on either of the erailway, adjoining belt C, to be called belt "(5) A belt of fifty miles on either side of the railway, adjoining belt D, to be called belt

"(5) A beit of fifty miles on either side of the railway, adjoining belt D, to be called belt E;

3. "The Dominion lands in beit A shall be absolutely withdrawn from homestead entry, also from pre-emption, and shall be held exclusively for sale at six dollars per acre.

4. "The lands in belt B shall be hisposed of as follows: The even-numbered sections within the belt shall be set apart for homesteads and pre-emptions, and the odd-numbered sections shall be regarded as railway lands proper. The homesteads on the even-numbered sections, to the extent of eighty acres each, shall consist of the easterly halves of the easterly halves of the easterly halves of the westerly halves of the easterly halves, also of the easterly halves, shall consist of the westerly halves of the easterly halves, also of the easterly halves of the westerly halves, also of the easterly halves, and shall be sold at the rate of \$2.50 (two dollars and fifty cents) per acre. Railway lands proper, being the odd-numbered sections in belt C will be set apart for homesteads and pre-emptions of eighty acres each, in manner as above described; the price of pre-emptions similarly to be \$2.50 (two dollars and fifty cents) per acre; the railway lands to consist of the odd-numbered sections, and to be dealt with in the same manner as above provided in respect of lands in belt B, except that the price shall be \$3.50 (three dollars and fifty cents) per acre.

6. "The even-numbered sections in belt D shall also be set apart for homesteads and pre-emptions of eighty acres each, as provided for in respect of belts B and C, but the price of pre-emptions shall be at the rate of \$2 (two dollars) per acre. Railway lands to consist, as in the belts B and C, of the odd-numbered sections, and the price of pre-emptions and the price thereof to be at the uniform rate of \$2 (two dollars) per acre.

7. "The belt E, the description and area to be a the tuniform rate of \$2 (two d

7. In the best E; the description and area of homesteads and pre-emptions, and railway lands respectively, to be as above, and the prices of both pre-emption and railway lands to be at the uniform rate of \$1 (one dollar) per

8. "The terms of sale of pre-emptions throughout the several belts, B, C, D and E shall be as follows, viz.; Four-tenths of the purchase money, together with interest on the latter, at the rate of 6 per cent. per annum, to be paid at the end of three years from the date of entry; the remainder to be paid in six equal annual instalments from and after the said date, with interest at the rate above mon-tioned on such balance of the purchase money as may from time to time remain unpaid, to be paid with each instalment.

9. "The terms of sale of railway lands to be uniformly as follows, viz.: One-tenth in cash at the time of purchase; the balance in nine equal annual instalments, with interest at the rate of six per cent, per annum on the balance of purchase money from time to time remaining unpaid, to be paid with each instalment. All payments, either for pre-emptions or railway lands proper, shall be in cash, and not in script or bounty warrants.

10. "All entries of land shall be subject to the following provisions respecting the right of way of the Canadian Pacific Bailway or of any G overnment colonization railway connected therewith, viz.

a. In the case of the railway crossing lands entered as a homestead, the right of way there-on shall be free to the Government.

b. Where the railway crosses pre-emptions or railway lands proper, the owner shall only be entitled to claim payment for the land required for right of way at the same rate per acre as he may have paid the Government for the same.

11. "The above regulations shall come into force on and after the first day of August next, up to which time the provisions of the Dominion Lands Act shall continue to operate over the lands included in the several belts mentioned, excepting as relates to the belts A and B, in both of which up to the said date, homesteads of 160 acres each, but no other entries will, as at psesent, be permitted.

12. "Claims to Dominion lands arising from settlement, after the date hereof, in territory unsurveyed at the time of such settlement, and which may be embraced within the limits affected by the above policy, or by the extension thereof in the future over additional territory, will be ultimately dealt with in accordance with the terms prescribed above for the lands in the particular belt in which such settlement may be found to be situated.

13. "All entries after the date thereof of unoccupied lands in the Saskatchewan Agency, will be considered as provisional until the railway line through that part of the territories has been located, after which the same will be finally disposed of in accordance with the above regulations, as the same may apply to the particular belt in which such lands may be found to be situated.

14. "The above regulations it will, of the territories has been located, after which the same way be found to be situated.

"Any further information necessary may be ebtained on application at the Dominion Lands. Office, Ottawa, or from the agent of Dominion Lands, Winnipeg, or from any of the local agents in Manitoba or the Territories, who are in possession of maps showing the limits of the several belts above referred to, a supply of which maps will, as soon as possible, be placed in the hands of the said agents for general distribution."
