LONDON, Jan. 31.—A despatch from Constantinople says that the armistice still unsigned, and the Russians are advancing. The Porte repeatedly telegraphed to the British and French governments but did not receive a reply.

A despatch from Vienna says Austria has distinctly warned Russia that she will not recognize separate peace conditions if they are opposed to the Treaty of Berlin.

An Adrialectic despatch says the Russian vanguard has occupied Boboski, Haskiovi, Demotica, and Kirk Kilissa. The Czar's troops are everywhere retreating upon the fortresses of the Quadrilateral.
