## Olympic Trials Will Be Run Off On the 10-Mile Martin Road Race Course, Here

### MAY 24TH THE MEN WHO ARE TO BATTLE FOR HONORS IN BELGIUM WILL BE DECIDED IN THIS CITY

Twenty Track and Field Men Will Be Sent To Antwerp; Boxing Trials Will Be Held in Toronto on Dominion Day; Congratulations to World's Hockey Champions.

Ontario's Olympic Marathon trial will be run at St. Catharines on May 24th. Last night the Ontario Branch of the A.A.U. of C. awarded the race to the Martin Athletic Club of St. Catharines. The distance will be fifteen miles. The final trial in which runners from all parts of Canada will compete will be run at Hamilton on the 19th of July.

The application for reinstatement of Ollie Johnson the Hamilton sprinter was discussed and it was decided to make no final decision until further information has been received. Johnson ran in the Powderhall handicap while serving with the Canadian Expeditionary Force. He claims that he received no money and was not aware that he was transgressing the amateur rules.

### Youth Worked All Day To Midnight and Then He Couldn't Get His Wages

Fred. Large, a youth, told in Police Court today a story which sounds like some of Dickens' creations, when he charged Thomas Benson, a robust looking man in an expensive fur-lined overcoat, with refusing to pay him his wages. Large said that his hours at the Benson pool room were from 8.30 a. m. to about a quarter past 12, midnight.

"We had to clean up, you know, after the place closed," said Large. He went on to say that he never got off for meals and spent the whole day and half the night on duty. Once in a blue moon, he said, Benson brought him in a bun at noon, but nearly all the time he went without food until he got home after midnight. The youth's appearance went to prove this assertion. He looked played out Friday night last about 9.30, when the proprietor, Benson, came back from supper, he having left at 4.30 as usual. Large told him he was not feeling well and intended to go home for supper. He didn't show up again that night and when he returned to the pool room at 10 a. m. he found another young man picking up things with a broom and mop and otherwise occupying Large's job.

Then when Benson came in he told Large he was through. Large wanted the \$16 coming to him—he had drawn \$2 of his week's wages, but Benson said, "No, you're through."

Benson went on the witness stand and stated that the boy had regular hours for meals but he didn't take them.

Magistrate Campbell informed Benson that he thought he had taken advantage of the boy, and ordered him to pay him \$16 and \$4.75 costs.

Lawn Bowlers Organized For Season; Two New Cups By Ecclestone and Graves  
The St. Catharines Lawn Bowling Club reorganized for the season last night at a meeting in Standard Hall, with the President, Joseph Hodgins, in the chair. It was decided to have a full membership vote on the sixteen members who are to be the club this year and each member will be furnished with a list of the entire membership. A. M. Ecclestone, S. J. Inksater and Frank Pattinson were appointed umpires to serve this season. The Games Committee will be appointed by the Directors. As the new green at Glen Ridge was newly made last autumn it is scarcely likely to be ready for May 24th, the usual opening day. It was announced that Niagara-on-the-Lake Club has invited seven or eight rinks to play there that day.

#### BROTHERHOOD MOVEMENT

The story of the Brotherhood Movement is one of the most romantic in the social and religious world of our times. In 1875, John Blackam of West Bromwich, England, began what were known as "Pleasant Sunday Afternoon Classes." These aimed to provide bright, interesting, religious services for the great number of men who did not usually go to church. The thing caught on and soon spread all over England.

As members of the British Brotherhoods emigrated or travelled they carried the Brotherhood seed to many lands. Societies were formed and in most cases flourished. An International Congress was planned to take place by the war. It seemed that the Brotherhood idea must perish in the struggle of 1914-18. But Brotherhood men were being scattered all over the globe. In France, Belgium, India, Egypt, and in every corner of the world they worked. Peace came and the dream of an International Congress was revived. The leaders of the Brotherhood Movement came to Canada to confer with the Canadian Brotherhoods. So great was the enthusiasm shown in the Dominion that the leaders went back to England resolved that the dream must become a fact.

In September, 1919, the World Brotherhood Congress was held. Representatives of more than twenty nations were present and addresses were given by David Lloyd George, Lord Robert Cecil, the Bishop of London, and others. So great was the success that a similar congress is planned to take place in Washington next fall. To interest the men of Canada in this Congress and to strive to foster brother-feeling between England, Canada and the U.S.A., Brotherhood leaders are coming from the old country and will speak in various churches throughout the Dominion.

One of the most attractive services rendered by the Brotherhood Movement is that of providing relief to the war stricken countries of Europe. For some time Belgium and France received the greater part of this help but for the past two years the war orphans of Serbia have been taken care of. A home in England was founded and a number of children cared for there. Recently it has been decided to institute educational farms in Serbia itself and this has already been begun.

#### GRANTS ANNUAL PASSES.

C. P. R. Encourages Loyalty in Service.  
The C.P.R. to encourage loyalty in service, and recognize the principle of co-operation, has through the president, Mr. E. W. Beatty, announced a new departure which will, doubtless, be much appreciated. This is the granting of annual passes to officers and employees, and their wives under the following classifications:  
Employee on a general superintendent's district who has had continuous service for a period of not less than ten years, will be granted an annual pass good over district on which employed.  
Such employee, who has had continuous service for twenty years and over, will be allowed annual pass good over eastern or western lines upon whichever employed. Employees of any other department of the service will enjoy the same privilege as above, stating the territory over which pass is desired. Head office employees who have had fifteen years' service will receive annual passes over eastern or western lines where employed. Women employees are to be treated the same as men in this connection. This action expresses the policy of the C.P.R. to aim at the contentment and loyalty of the employees of whom there is an army of 80,000 at present, including all classes.

### ULTIMATUM PRESENTED TO N.S. & T.R. HEAD TO REINSTATE FIVE MEN IN THEIR POSITIONS OR STRIKE FRIDAY MORNING

Men Say That Agreement is Not Being Carried Out, Also That Company Heads Have Violated an Order Which Was Made in 1918 and Was Never Rescinded, They Say.

Unless certain grievances with the N.S. & T.R. men have against the company are satisfactory adjusted by 11 o'clock tomorrow morning, the men will go on strike at four o'clock Friday morning.

The grievances centre around five men in the car shops, one of whom was discharged and the other four resigned. The trouble has been largely on account of objection being taken by the company to the men of the car shops taking half an hour to cash pay cheques.

In answer to this the men refer to an order issued Feb. 18th, 1918 as follows:—  
"Effect immediate. Men employed in car barns, freight sheds, etc., will be allowed from 11.30 a.m. to 12 noon to cash pay cheques. Employees will not leave work at any other time."

The order is signed by W. R. Robertson who was then superintendent and has never been rescinded, the men say. There are a number of other minor things at issue also.

The men this morning wired to Vice-President Hungerford of the National Railway Board notifying him of the situation and the proposal to tie up the line Friday morning. The Men's committee had a long conference of over four hours yesterday with E. W. Oliver, the general superintendent and manager Cummings, but nothing came of it, as neither side appeared willing to give any.

BUFFALO April 28—The case of John Edward Teiper will go to the jury in the supreme court on Friday morning. Roscoe R. Mitchell will sum up for the defence today and District Attorney Guy B. Moore will sum up tomorrow. Teiper should know his fate by Saturday.

**TO INVESTIGATE IN RUSSIA**

Approval by the Allied Council of the plan gives to the International Labor Mission to Russia a status that will be little less important than that of a diplomatic mission. Britain will send seven delegates, including Miss Margaret Bondfield representing the women workers of the Motherland. Canada is also to be represented. Mr. Arthur Martel, Vice-President of the Trades and Labor Congress, having been chosen by organized labor for that purpose. The British delegation will divide itself into two sections, one of which will examine working and living conditions, while the other will get information on government, trade and economic. The Russian Government has announced its readiness to allow the mission facilities for inquiry into matters on which enlightenment is sought.

Properly carried out, the tour of the mission ought to settle all doubts and perplexities with regard to the Russian situation. The Allies have not added to their reputation by the methods they have pursued toward Russia, and recent changes of attitude reveal a tendency to make a new start in an effort to resume trade and diplomatic relationships falling which there can be no real settlement of Europe's problems. Russia is too great a country, and her potentialities are too vast to admit of her being left out of the plans for the future of the old world. To millions of people idea of negotiations of any kind with the men who head the Russian Government at this time is abhorrent. But behind Lenin, Trotsky, and the red-headed band whose manipulations have been responsible for horrors not yet revealed in all their ghastliness are millions of people who eventually will either find their salvation in work and decent government or involve many other countries in the chaos that has yet rules great areas of their own.

Russia may be won to sanity by peaceful intercourse with other nations. She cannot be saved by military or economic wars waged against her people.

**NATIONAL PURCHASING BOARD**

Appointment by the Dominion Government of a permanent purchasing board—men of proved capacity and unquestioned integrity—ought to save Canada millions of dollars. It would apply to the vast and complicated national buying the same sound, economical, businesslike principle which is part of the policy of every large and successful private business.

There was never greater need for efficient methods than now. The country faces serious financial obligations. The people are experiencing heavy taxation. Their representatives in parliament ought to deem it calculated to save money for the people calculated to save money for the public treasury.

The National Purchasing Board—big enough in every way for its job—inevitably must mean better coordination, increased efficiency, greater economy. Its members will be required to give their whole time to the work. It will purchase only supplies included in departmental estimates and on requisition of the departments. The system of buying by public is to be adopted in so far as this is possible.

Against a businesslike policy certain to yield immense return in the saving of public money there can be but one cause for Parliamentary protest. It will result in further curtailment of the party patronage system.

**COURT APPROVES NEW UNION OF "MIDDLE CLASS"**

**NEW YORK, April 24**—Supreme Court Justice Gavegan today approved articles of incorporation for the "Public Union, Inc." purporting to be a growing union of middle class people, formed "to benefit in any way those who are not either organized manual laborers or high-salaried executives."

Purposes of the new organization also listed in the petition were "to help relieve class oppression, to regulate and classify all forms of voluntary services, to serve in emergency crisis and to secure representation of all middle interests in all legislative action."

**NEGROES SEEN IN THE VICINITY OF MURDER**

**BUFFALO, April 23**—"I had it on my mind and my heart."  
That was Tony George, a laborer, could not rest until he had delivered to the proper persons—the story he told yesterday afternoon on the witness stand, the story that may save John Edward Teiper from the electric chair.

Tells of Meeting Negroes  
In broken English, earnestly and straightforwardly, this surprise witness for the defense, told of meeting in the Orchard Park road on the afternoon of the Teiper tragedy two negroes who looked and acted suspiciously. One of these he described as "big and large."

The most striking thing about this man's testimony, corroborating it would seem, the defendant's story about the "burly nigger" who committed the murders, he is charged with, is the fact that it was brought voluntarily to the defense only within the past month. And brought because the man's conscience pricked him so much, he said, that he got up out of bed one night to write on a piece of paper the gist of his story.

He had wanted four years ago to tell of seeing two negroes, he said; but did not know how to get his information to the authorities. Besides Tony said, pointing to the defendant, who sat a few feet away from the witness stand, "all the people say he did it," and he thought his story of no consequence for that reason.

Even after his conscience had finally forced him to action nineteen days ago, he told the jury he knew of no other way of making his information public except by paying to have it inserted in a newspaper.

Writing the gist of his story on a scrap of paper, he slipped it in the keyhole of a newspaper office, thus starting the information on the way, to Roscoe R. Mitchell, associate counsel for the defense, who drew the entire story from the laborer's lips in the court room yesterday.

Scores Heavily Twice  
Tony George scored twice for the defense—and heavily. That he saw the two negroes who asked him the way to Lackawanna, and then ignored his directions, and turned toward Orchard Park was point one. The

second was his assertion that he had told Constable William Baker of West Seneca—one of the authorities working on the murder case—of seeing the negroes in the vicinity of the crime. This the defense held up as the most damning exhibit in its contention that the authorities ignored all other clues except those pointing to the guilt of the defendant, for no mention has ever been made on the stand by Constable Baker of this incident.

Eight persons in all testified yesterday of seeing a strange negro at various times of the day on January 30, 1916, but the testimony of none was as sincere and convincing as that of Tony George, this laborer who stuck stoutly to his story through the frequent titers of laughter, his dialect and mannerisms of speech raised among the spectators.

Although this was Tony's first appearance in the trial, District Attorney Moore made little effort to trip him on his testimony. He asked scarcely half a dozen questions on cross-examination, possibly with the intention of leaving with the jurors an impression that he thought the laborer's testimony of no serious weight.

It was easily the most interesting day since the Teiper trial began. The reason was, Tony George—or Tony De George, as he is also known. He came to court in his working clothes, not snobby but with a speck of dust here and there and a big black patch on the knee of his trousers. He looked like a character just stepped from the stage. But on his olive-tanned face was written earnestness and almost boyish eagerness to tell what he had to tell.

**DEER SEASON SHORTENED**

Toronto fur dealer, represented by George Mordeth, John Hallan, W. R. Sweeney and S. Brazier, protested to the Fish and Game Committee of the Legislature against the present royalty system, because of the extra clerical work entailed. They suggested a new licensing fee graded from the farmer or trapper to the ultimate dealer. They were asked to submit proposals in writing.

Despite objections from the C. N. R. and C. P. R. who claimed that shortening of the deer season in the north would injure tourist traffic, the committee reduced the open season north of the French and Mattawa Rivers by 15 days, commencing October 15. That the bounty on wolves would be increased from \$20 to \$50 was recommended.

**LAUREL, Del., April 23**—Mrs. Derrick Morris, whose husband was brutally murdered here and whose son is in jail accused of the crime, has known little except tragedy throughout the fifty-five years of her life.

Her oldest son, James, was killed twelve years ago while employed as a railroad brakeman in New York.

A daughter seven years old, was burned to death a few years ago.

Another daughter eye was knocked out by the limb of a peach tree.

In the first three months of 1920 the League has distributed an enormous amount of safety material, including 35,000 industrial safety bulletins; 20,400 school safety bulletins; 8,000 special bulletins; 8,500 traffic bulletins; 2,700 electric railway bulletins; 150,000 motorists safety book-lets; 10,200 health bulletins; 6,500 new letters; 9,000 safety calendars; 12,000 leaflets to the "new man"; 125,000 gummed seals; 3,000 safety cards and posters.

#### POTATOES AND GARDENING

What reason there has been for the extraordinary rise in the price of potatoe is not clear. The blame is laid on United States buying to help cover a shortage across the border. But potatoe are held in car-lots at many points, passing from one speculative hand to another, merely

on the strength of a bill of lading, and the price is shoved higher each time. Potatoe are \$5 a bag, and there is no protest from any authority in the name of the consuming public. If the public complacency will endure a price six times as high as the pre-war price for a necessary that is the base of nearly all meals, then the extortion will not abate. But the

high price will surely turn extra attention to back-yard gardening this year. Toronto back-yards and vacant lots produced \$100,000 worth of vegetables in the war period. If potatoe were generally grown this season, in the vacant and soil in and about the city, two months' supply might be produced locally. But the gardening fever does not seem to be epidemic, and perhaps the Colorado beetle will find his fodder rather short. During the food shortage back yard gardening was a matter of patriotism but today the food shortage is much greater than it was then. We shall see if back-yard gardening can be made a question of pocket. If potatoe at \$6 a bag are not sufficient motive, then the outlook is hopeless, and the country will have to go on until mounting food prices force partial depopulation of the congested cities and towns, and repopulation of the farms.

### POTATO BOYCOTT GAINING GROUND

#### MANY RECRUITS SWELL RANKS OF THOSE WHO ARE "FASTING"

TORONTO, April 23—The potato situation becomes more interesting each day as more organizations endorse the protest against high prices and agree to restrict their diet for a month, by which time it is hoped, that the familiar tuber will have been reduced to prices more suited to its humble origin and history. Through the enterprise of the Regent, Mrs. W. R. Jackson, the Municipal Chapter of the I.O.D.E., comprising 38 primary chapters with a membership of about 3,000 women, have agreed to the potato fast of one month. The annual meetings of the Women's Liberal Association and the Women's Patriotic League also took favorable action yesterday.

#### STANDS OR FALLS BY EXCESS PROFITS TAX

LONDON, April 22—Austin Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, announced in the House of Commons today that he intended to stand or fall by his original proposal to increase the excess profits tax to 60 per cent from the present 40 per cent rate. The Chancellor, said, however, that if proposals subsequently were introduced for the taxation of war acquired wealth the extra 20 per cent would be remitted.

NEW YORK, April 23—Five men are under arrest today. Five tons of stolen silk valued at \$218,000 have been recovered and the police believe a band of thieves who have stolen millions of dollars worth of merchandise from freight cars in the last two years has been unearthed. It is asserted that the man has handled stolen goods valued at more than \$1,000,000.

## Income Tax Return

on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

Dominion of Canada  
  
Department of Finance

ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:—

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more.
3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

#### Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.  
FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T 1A.

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use Form T 2.

#### Penalty

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable. Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

#### General Instructions.

Obtain Forms from the Inspectors or Assistant Inspectors of Taxation or from Postmasters.

Read carefully all instructions on Form before filling it in.

Prepay postage on letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspectors of Taxation.

Make your returns promptly and avoid penalties.

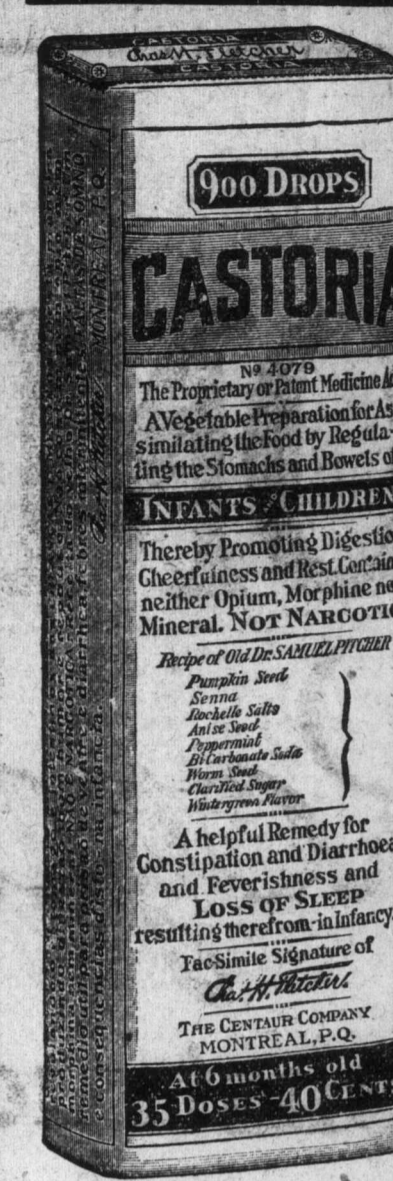

"BOOZE" MADE HIM FORGET WEDDING

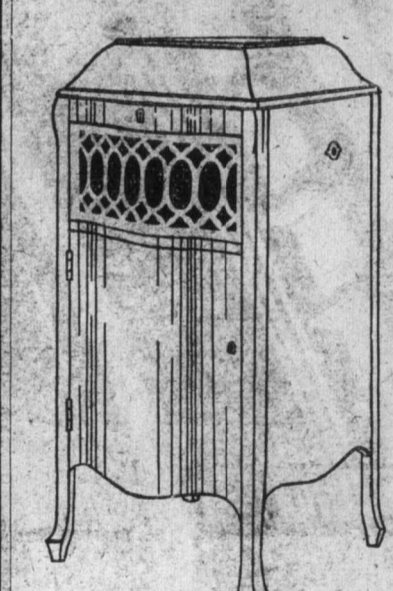

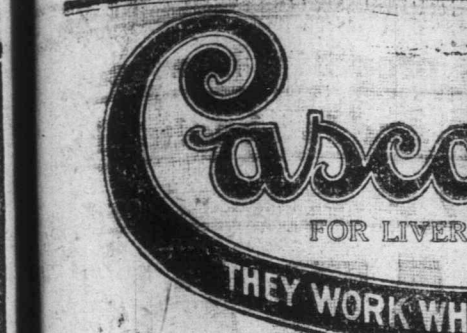

## WOMEN RIOT TO GET GLIMPSE OF ODELLS ON WAY TO COURT

Confessed Slayer of Wife's Betrayer May Know Fate To-day—Seek Manslaughter Verdict—Tells of Events Preceding Killing.

ROCHESTER, April 23—James Odell, on trial for the murder of Edward J. Kneip last January at a lonely spot near the Scottsville road in Buffalo, will know his fate probably before another day closes. The prosecution and the defense finished their summing up late yesterday at

that he might be given a verdict of manslaughter, rather than first degree murder. District Attorney Wm. F. Love, however, has insisted that nothing but a verdict of murder in the first degree would be consistent with the evidence as presented.

Arnold, stepfather of Odell took the witness stand on behalf of the prisoner, and told of the incident at his home when Odell and his wife brought Kneip there and questioned him regarding Kneip's assault on Pearl Beaver, previous to her marriage to Odell. "I asked Kneip if he had used force on Pearl," said the aged man, who has grown gray and stooped since the beginning of the trouble that has come into his family. "He said he had considerable force on her." I got up from the table in the dining room and went out in the kitchen. Jim came out to me a minute later. "Dad," he said "What shall I do?" The black-tinted mother of the slain youth, Mrs. Mary C. Kneip, and his sister, Miss Josephine Kneip, both testified briefly. Neither was cross-examined. Just before the noon recess a twelve-year-old girl with dark curly hair hanging at her shoulders, Hazel Nember, a niece of Pearl Odell, was called to testify regarding a state of nervousness that she had observed in Pearl before her marriage to Odell. The child added a peculiarly human touch to the courtroom, and in his brief cross-examination of her District Attorney Love, was particularly solicitous.

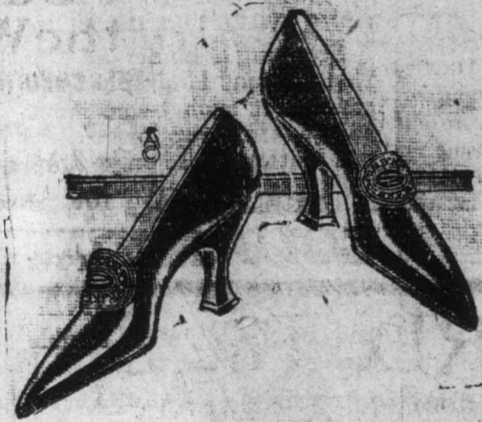

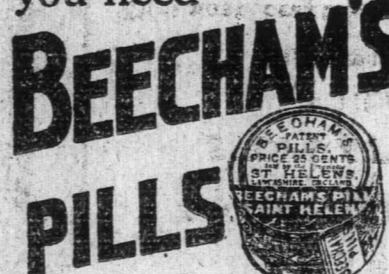

ROCHESTER, April 24—After deliberating for eleven hours and fifty minutes a supreme court jury at 10:25 o'clock last night brought in a verdict of murder in the first degree against James L. Odell, indicted with his wife, Pearl Beaver Odell, for the murder of Edward J. Kneip on the night of January 7. Immediately after the verdict was announced Odell was sentenced by Justice Robert Thompson to die in the week of June 13.

Weighed down by the nervous strain of the trial and her own heroic efforts to save the life of her husband through a sacrifice of her own honor, Mrs. Odell suffered a complete relapse at the Monroe County Jail this morning shortly before the hour set for the opening of the final session of court. A mere slip of a girl physically, her superb carriage through the trying ordeal of the last three days was purely on the strength of her supreme endeavor to do her utmost for the man she loves.

Although the outcome of the present case may have considerable bearing on the trial of Mrs. Odell due to be called for the latter part of May, it is believed that the defense in her case will take such course as will give it a decidedly independent aspect. Her condition is such that an important event is expected before the calling of her case next month, which is expected to have an important bearing on her jury's attitude toward her in the testimony which she gave in the trial of her husband, she did not go into the details of the actual killing of Kneip, her lawyer asserting his legal right to prevent his client from incriminating herself.

On Monday C. J. Coppen, convicted by Mr. Justice Latchford and a jury of the murder of his wife in North Toronto last fall, will learn his fate. Coppen is under sentence to hang on May 5, and on Monday the First Divisional Court will give judgment on his stated case. Coppen will either hang or will be given a new trial.
