## Boston Steamers

Mr. H. T. Stevens, of the Moncton Times, and Mrs. Stevens, who have been visiting the island, left for Moncton on Monday morning.

Mr. W. H. Stewart, of the firm of Harris & Stewart, London, has arrived home on Thursday evening from a business trip to England.

Mr. James Pater, who has been in the "Old Country" purchasing goods for the firm of which he is a member, returned home on Thursday evening last.

Mr. William Rowe, one of the crew of the wrecked brigantine Birdie, arrived home on Monday evening, and is to be congratulated on his narrow escape.

Mr. J. W. Mansel, connected with Chapin Bros, Boston, is in the city. He has for the last few years purchased a large quantity of potatoes on the island.
