**Provincial Legislature.**  
FRIDAY, April 6.  
The House met at 10.30.  
Mr. Shaw asked the Commissioner of Public Works (1) to table a statement showing the total amount paid, or agreed to be paid, for work let by tender or public sale, and the total amount paid or agreed to be paid, for private contracts, respectively, during the past year, and up to date in the Public Works Department; (2) to table a statement showing in detail the amount of contracts entered into by public competition, private sale or day work during the last financial year, and not paid in full during the year ending 31st December 1893, statement to show the names of persons to whom the contracts were let, and the amount of each contract respectively; (3) to table a statement showing in detail the amount expended during the year 1893 and up to date in filling up a portion of the dock between Norton's wharf and the Victoria Bridge, by each person, private sale, and the amount of private contract, a copy of all tenders received and the tender accepted, if by private contract or day's work, the names of the persons employed on each dock, the number of persons each person was so employed, the wages per day paid to each person respectively, the wages per day paid for each horse employed, the names of the persons to whom horse hire was paid, and the amount paid to each person for horse hire respectively; (4) to table a statement showing in detail the amount expended on the reconstruction of Poplar Point wharf during the year 1893, and up to date, the amount let by public sale and the amount by private contract or day's work, and if by private contract or day's work the names of the persons employed on said work, the number of days each person was so employed, the names of the persons to whom horse hire was paid, and the amount paid to each person for horse hire respectively, the amount paid for material, the names of the persons furnishing the material, and the amount of material furnished by each person respectively; (5) to table a statement showing in detail the amount paid for cutting ice on Morill Bridge, and removing the same therefrom, and all other work done on said bridge since the 1st January, 1893, until the 1st April, 1894, and the names of persons to whom paid.  
Mr. McLean said that much of the information asked for would be found in the printed report of the Public Works Department. Some of the other information asked for could not be got ready in time for this session, but such information as it was possible to give would be furnished with all possible despatch.  
Mr. Shaw asked the Leader of the Government if any petition had been received by the Government asking that the information asked for be furnished in a pamphlet form, and if so, if the Government intended taking in reference thereto.  
Mr. McLean said the question makes a statement of fact which the Government desires to give, and that it is not possible to give a pamphlet form of the information asked for. He thought that hon. members should not make such positive statements as that made in the question asked.  
Mr. Shaw asked that the petition be printed on the table and read by the Clerk.  
Mr. Shaw again asked the question regarding the debtors.  
Mr. Peters said that he would lay on the table a statement giving some of the information asked for, and if it could not be given, every man who put in a tender should have his name and private business paraded publicly. He therefore did not think it advisable to print the information asked for in this particular. However, if the person tendering had no objection he would give their names.

He referred to the great usefulness of the Telephone Company, and condemned the monopoly enjoyed by the Anglo-American Telephone Company.  
Mr. Arneson said the Telephone Company had been granted a monopoly, and was giving satisfaction. But there were other companies that were also giving satisfaction, and the remarks that were used in reference to the Telephone Company applied with equal force to them.  
Mr. Shaw called attention to the fact that in 1885 exempting the Telephone Company from taxation for five years, and pointed out that at that time the deficit was many many thousands of dollars less than it is at the present day.  
Mr. Peters pointed out that in 1888 the late government did right in exempting the Telephone Company, and he thought that the present Government was right in still further exempting the company for a further period of nineteen years.  
Hon. Mr. Gordon thought it would be very questionable to pass a bill of this nature. We have very few rich people here. He moved in amendment that owing to the novelty of the tax here it would be objectionable to pass the bill, and it would be inadvisable to pass such a measure.
