Prince Edward Island Rules Relating to Private Bills. 26 All petitions for Private Bills must be presented within fourteen days after the commencement of the session exclusive of adjournment.

37 No Private Bill shall be brought into the House, but upon a petition first presented, truly stating the case at the peril of the suitors for such Bill and such petition must be signed by the said parties.

38 A committee shall be appointed at the commencement of every Session consisting of five members of whom three shall be a quorum, to be denominated The Private Bills Committee to whom shall be referred every Private Bill, and no proceedings after the first reading shall be had upon such Bill until such Committee has reported thereon to the House.

39 So soon as the Committee has reported any Bill, such Bill together with any amendments that may be suggested by the Committee shall be printed at the expense of the printer who are suitors for such Bill and printed copies thereof delivered to the members before the second reading if deemed necessary by the Committee.

41 No Bill having for its object the vesting in or conferring upon any person or persons, Municipality or Body corporate the title to any tract of land shall be received or read in the House unless at least four weeks notice containing a full description of the land in question has been published in the Royal Gazette and one other newspaper in this Province of the intention of such person or persons Municipality or Body Corporate to apply for such Bill.

Vestments And Linens

At Holy Mass the Church adorns the priest, the chalice and the altar with vestments and linens replete with spiritual significance.

Having first washed his hands, the priest kisses the amice (a rectangular piece of linen with two stripes attached), rests it a moment on his head, then places it on his shoulders and ties the strings around his body. It represents the "helmet of salvation" spoken of by Isaiah (59:17) and St. Paul, Eph. 6:17. It also recalls the cloth with which the Jews shamefully blindfolded Christ in His Passion. The priest next puts on the alb, a white robe reaching to the ground. It signifies purity of life and also recalls the white garment in which Christ was robed by the mocking Herod. It is bound about the waist by the cincture, or girdle, signifying chastity, and also recalling the cords binding Our Saviour in the Garden of Olives and later to the Pillar of Scourging. The priest next places on his left arm the maniple, originally a handkerchief, but now a narrow band of silken cloth, signifying the fruits of our toil and sweat in Christ's vineyard. He then places around his neck and across his breast the stole (Greek, garment) a long silken strip or band which originally was a robe and still signifies the robe of glorious immortality awaiting us in heaven. Over all is placed the surplice, symbolizing charity and also recalling the cloak thrown about the shoulders of Christ by the mocking soldiers.

The chalice which the priest carries to the altar next engages our attention. Over its cup, and hanging down on either side, is the purificator, a linen cloth with a small embroidered cross. St. Catherine Of Siena.

Catherine Benincasa (St. Catherine of Siena) was born in Siena March 25th, 1347, the youngest one of a very large family. Her father, Giacomo di Benincasa, was a dyer, and her mother the daughter of a local poet. The family belonged to the lower middle class.

Early in life Catherine made a vow of chastity. She began to see visions and to practice extreme austerities. When she was sixteen years old she took the habit of the Dominican Tertiaries and renewed the life of the anchorites of the desert in a little room in her father's house.

During the summer of 1370 she received a series of special manifestations of Divine mysteries which culminated in a prolonged trance, a kind of mystical death, in which she had a vision of Hell, Purgatory and Heaven and heard a Divine command to leave her cell and enter the public life of the world. From this time forward she became an important factor in the political as well as the religious life of Italy, and, indeed, of all Western Christendom. She was in correspondence with the rulers of the various states of Italy, was consulted by the papal legates about the affairs of the Church, and devoted her energies to healing the wounds of civil war.

The Spirit of Conciliation

(Ottawa Journal)

The controversy between railway employees and the railway executives, before the National Railway Labor Board at Chicago, lasted for over three months.

There are always two sides to every dispute. In coming together and frankly discussing the matters in controversy the point of view with which each side starts out is often changed.

During the whole five hours that the King and Queen were in the city there wasn't an unpleasant incident. Loyalists crowded the streets to cheer the King and Queen and disloyalists, if any, kept away.

Belfast was awakened at 7 a. m. by the booming of guns as the royal yacht Victoria and Albert sailed to anchor in the lough, escorted by a great fleet of cruisers and destroyers.

At the steps of the hall there was a short halt while the King and Queen received an address of welcome from the corporation, headed by Lord Mayor Stuart Coates who later in the day was made a baronet.

Just before the King's arrival two trumpeters in gorgeous gold lace tunics took their position on each side of the throne.

Then with a fanfare of trumpets the doors were thrown open and the Ulster King-at-Arms, Chief Heraldic Officer of Ireland entered at the head of a procession.

The Thronos had been constructed as replicas of those at Westminster, and on these the Sovereign and his consort took their seats. Then the officials and their families filed past bowing or curtseying, according to sex.

A tall, handsome, elderly man in court dress advanced from the opposite end of the hall, bowing three times as he advanced.

The Black Rod bowed before the Thronos, received a nod from the King, then walking backward bowing three times as he left the chamber, returning in a few minutes leading the members of the Ulster House of Commons, with Premier Sir James Craig and Speaker Hugh O'Neill on either side.

TEXT OF KING'S SPEECH. The text of the King's Speech to the Parliament follows: "For all who love Ireland, as I do with all my heart, this is a profoundly moving occasion in Irish history."

Dispenses Justice From The Roadside

St. John, N. B., June 25.—Dispensing justice on the roadside at one o'clock in the morning, near Norton, King's County Magistrate Herbert J. Anderson, of Renforth, imposed a fine of \$25 and costs on John T. Lorraine, of New Bedford, Mass., for furious driving and refusing to stop when ordered to do so by Constables.

Lorraine was driving with J. Morrell in a high powered runabout when first sighted by Robert Crawford, provincial traffic officer, near Renforth, early in the evening. He gave chase but could not overtake them, and wired to stations ahead to stop the car.

They were not arrested, however, until they reached Petit Codiac, in an adjacent county, fifty-nine miles from Renforth. They wanted to be tried right away, but as their offences were committed in King's County they could not be tried in Petit Codiac.

The men then offered to pay the expenses of the traffic officer and magistrate if they would come up from Renforth to try them. The two were accordingly put back in their own automobile and driven back over the border into King's County, where a little after midnight they met the magistrate and traffic officer, who went up from Renforth.

The court was held by the roadside and the driver had to pay a \$25 fine, besides the transportation expenses of the officer and magistrate from Renforth to the seat of justice.

Ottawa, June 22.—What Canada has done for her returned soldiers is graphically summarized in a report covering the activities of all departments dealing with returned men, which has been prepared and placed before Sir James Loughheed, Minister of the Interior, who has had charge of returned soldiers' affairs.

Canada's Efforts For Returned Soldiers

Ottawa, June 22.—What Canada has done for her returned soldiers is graphically summarized in a report covering the activities of all departments dealing with returned men, which has been prepared and placed before Sir James Loughheed, Minister of the Interior, who has had charge of returned soldiers' affairs.

The summary shows that in the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-Establishment, 108,161 men were trained; 50,521 vocationally trained, and 109,493 placed in employment up to December 31, 1920. The Board of Pension Commissioners awarded to the same date 110,702 pensions, and the annual pensions in force were \$31,169,520.

The number of returned men placed on farms by the Soldier Settlement Board to the end of the last year was 20,122, and the total of loans granted \$81,845,948.

The extent to which returned soldiers were placed in employment by the Civil Service Commission up to the end of last year is also given. A total of 29,084 returned men had been given employment to that date.

A total of \$164,000,000 was paid in War Service Gratuity, and 47,000 dependents were returned from overseas at the conclusion of the war. The cost of cashing sterling cheques at par to March 31, 1920, was \$524,335.43.

Dealing with unemployment, relief given to returned men and their families, the report states that \$7,058,989.84 was spent during 1919-1920 and \$1,500,000 during the past winter.

38 A committee shall be appointed at the commencement of every Session consisting of five members of whom three shall be a quorum, to be denominated The Private Bills Committee to whom shall be referred every Private Bill, and no proceedings after the first reading shall be had upon such Bill until such Committee has reported thereon to the House.

39 So soon as the Committee has reported any Bill, such Bill together with any amendments that may be suggested by the Committee, shall be printed at the expense of the parties who are suitors for such Bill and printed copies thereof delivered to the members before the second reading if deemed necessary by the Committee.

40 No Bill for the particular interest of any person or persons Corporation or Corporations or body or bodies of people shall be read a second time until all fees be paid for the same into the hands of the Clerk of the House.

Local and Other Items

With two turbines out of commission and an after compartment flooded, after collision with a "dud" torpedo during tactical manoeuvres, the United States destroyer Dent put into the harbor at Los Angeles with a jagged hole in its hull.

William Thompson, born at Tamworth, Ont., on June 20th, 1820, celebrated his 101st birthday at the Home for the Aged at Kingston the other day. The greater part of his life was spent as a lumberman and river driver. He is in fairly good health.

An explosion of fire damp destroyed the greater part of the Mont Cenis mine, Switzerland. Twenty-two men are known to be dead and a large number injured. Of the 300 who were in the mine at the time of the disaster, only 120 are accounted for.

Ten steamers have delivered cargoes of Canadian coal at Cherbourg, France, according to a correspondent of the London Times. This coal, the correspondent says, is being used to bunker ships which are unable to obtain fuel in British ports, owing to the miners' strike.

Toronto advices of June 23rd say: Haying is about completed in most parts of Ontario, and generally speaking there has been a fair crop. In some portions of the province the cutting of fall wheat will commence next week, with varied prospects. In some parts the fall wheat suffered considerably during the winter for the lack of the snow blanket.

Close on to a \$100,000,000 in the estimated revenue this year from income taxation, the second instalment of which is due thirty-first of June. The response to the first instalment was general and brought in \$39,000,000. The second will not be as heavy as a proportion, varying from ten to seventy per cent in different cities, paid the poll tax at the start.

A strong earthquake shook Messina and Reggio di Calabria about midnight Sunday last, according to a Milan despatch to the Daily Mail. Apparently there were neither victims nor serious damage. The quake was preceded by a strange howling which terrified the people. They fled to the open. A panic was averted in the Messina Theatre by one of the actors appealing for calm.

Farmers in southern Aroostook County, Maine, have dumped approximately 45,000 barrels of potatoes in their fields, where they will be ploughed in to serve as fertilizer. The producers were caught with a large surplus as a result of a falling market, which reduced the price from three dollars a barrel early in the season to forty cents a barrel today. In the northern part of the county starch factories took care of the surplus.

Calgary advices of June 23rd say: Harvesting operations have already started on the big farms of the Noble Foundation in Southern Alberta. Eleven binders are at work cutting 2,500 acres of Rosen rye, a new variety which is being tried out for the first time in this province. This is proved to be the earliest grain yet raised, and is at least thirty days ahead of any other variety of rye. The grain is standing four feet high and assures a heavy yield.

Major G. L. Jennings, Superintendent of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police at Edmonton, is escorting the judicial party that is to conduct the trial of Albert Lebeaux at Fort Providence, and will go on from that point to the Arctic Coast. He is taking five men to add to the Police Detachments in the north and will inspect all the posts down the McKenzie River to Fort McPherson and Herschel Island. The trial at Fort Providence of a Slavetribes Indian charged with the murder of his wife and infant child will be held about the second week in July. It will be the first jury trial ever held in McKenzie territory and will therefore be an object lesson to the natives of the north that British law and justice are to prevail in the wilderness. Judge L. Dubne has been commissioned to try the case.

Local and Other Items

Premier Meighen has accepted the invitation of the City of Edinburgh to receive the freedom of the city. The date set is July 18 or 19. The place where the ceremony will take place has not been selected. The script will be presented in an elaborate gold casket.

Flight-Lieut. Proctor, one of the most famous of British air fighters, who won the Victoria Cross in the war, bringing down 60 enemy airplanes and 28 balloons, was killed last week near London when his plane crashed while he was practising over Salisbury Plain. When at an altitude of 3,000 feet he started a loop, but the machine went into a nose dive. Lieut. Proctor's death was instantaneous.

Practically the last official act of His Excellency the Governor-General in Ottawa was to sign the order-in-council which will result in a bone-dry Ontario on July 18. His Excellency signed the order-in-council on Saturday, June 18th, prior to his departure for Quebec. Rt. Hon. Sir George Foster, acting Prime Minister stated that evoking that importations of liquor into Ontario would be illegal on the morning of July 18.

The British Antarctic expedition headed by Dr. Cope has discovered a new continental Antarctic region described as rich in oil, minerals and furs, according to a cable from Sydney, N.S.W., quoting the Sydney Morning Post. According to the brief despatches reaching Sydney from the "bottom of the world," strange birds of immense size, seals and gorgeous Emperor penguins inhabit the land beyond Tierra de Fuego, the area of which has not yet been computed.

It was intimated recently at Washington that Administration officials would welcome a revival of the suggestion that more formal diplomatic relations be established between Canada and the United States by appointment of a Canadian diplomatic representative to Washington. Reciprocal action by the United States in appointing a minister or ambassador would require legislation, it was explained, but pending such authorization a diplomatic commissioner could be sent to Canada.
