From Honolulu to the Samoan or Navigator's Islands, a distance of nearly twenty five hundred miles, nothing of importance occurred to relieve the lengthy monotony.

WE CROSSED THE EQUATOR.

No particular shock was felt; our vessel didn't tremble from bow to stern like an aspen leaf; nor were we favored with an interview with that ancient celebrity, Neptune, with his trident and briny suite of sea-nymphs.

THE SAMOAN ISLANDS.

and having a German Consul to land, we drew along side one of these. They are of apparent volcanic origin, and near the coast are densely wooded.

OF AN EXACT COPPER COLOR.

Their hair is thickly matted and of a reddish yellowish brownish black (for want of a more expressive term.) These mats are so thick that they make an excellent repository for the natives tooth brush, lead pencil, pipe, small spears, walking stick or any other extra.

unrequited and unrequited. We omitted Saturday, and after Friday came Sunday, thus having a week of seven consecutive days included in two Sundays. The twentieth day brought us in sight of a number of the islands along the coast of New Zealand.

THE POSITION OF AUCKLAND

for commercial purposes is very good, a fine harbor, with numerous wharves and jetties, affords excellent facilities for the loading and discharging of vessels.

The dress, manners, and general appearance of the people is widely different from that of the American towns, and contrasting. A lively go-ahead American town of forty thousand population, with Auckland, the thought of Rip-Van-Winkle suggests itself, for in many things, we noticed, in our short visit, the colonist appear to be a half century behind the times.

AN ANTIQUATED TYPE.

The two wheeled carts here answer the purpose of our American wagon; there are generally four or five horses hitched one in front of another, and in no case under a penalty of ten shillings is the driver justified in riding in his cart.

A FINE RACE OF PEOPLE.

Captain Cook in 1777 spent some months trying to improve the condition of these people, and describes them as savages in the fullest sense of the word. They were almost totally unacquainted with mechanical arts, their skill being limited to the making of spears and other rude instruments of war.

NATIVES AS MEMBERS.

The race is doing away with the barbarous custom of tattooing their persons, and it is only the old men and women that can now boast of having their faces carved, punctured and frizzled with every conceivable design.

Joseph Brice, seven feet eight inches. At the age of twenty-six years he was exhibited in London, 1862-5. His hand could span fifteen and a half inches. Born at Ramonchamp, in the Vosges, France, 1840. Was sometimes called Anak.

John Busby, of Darfield, seven feet nine inches. His brother was about the same height. Captain Bates, of Kentucky, seven feet eleven and one-half inches. Exhibited in London, 1871.

Gilly, a Swede, eight feet. Exhibited as a show early in the nineteenth century. Charlemagne, nearly eight feet. He could squeeze together three horse shoes at once in his hands.

J. Toller of Nova Scotia, eight feet. Died 1819. Chang-Woo-Goo, of Tychou, Chinese giant, eight feet two inches. Exhibited in London, 1806-07, and again in 1880.

J. H. Reichart, of Friedburg, Sweden, eight feet three inches. His father and mother were giants. Charles O'Brien, of Byrne, Irish giant, eight feet four inches. His skeleton is preserved in the museum of the College of Surgeons, 1761-1873. Patrick, his brother, was eight feet seven inches.

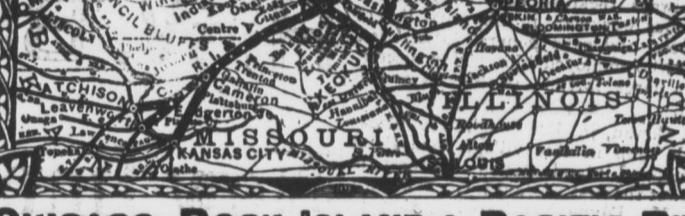
