This will entail a present loss to the U. S. postal department of about \$8,000,000 annually, but it is believed that success will ultimately crown the effort. Is it not time that a reduction on the Canadian letter postal rate was made?

MONTREAL has just had its eyes opened to a state of affairs that bids fair to outdo anything ever written by William Harrison Ainsworth in his criminal annals. A private detective named Fahy, an ex-city detective named Naegle, and a couple of policemen named Bureau and Plante have been arrested, charged with having for years back carried on a wholesale system of robbery, while ostensibly guarding the public interest. They are alleged to have, amongst other crimes, stolen \$1,210 from the G. T. R. station, Bureau, who was at that time a G. T. R. constable having secured the key of the safe sufficiently long for his accomplices to take an impression. The evidence against the prisoners on this and other cases is said to be most conclusive, and a feeling of unrest prevails throughout the entire city. The case against the prisoners was worked up by a Pinkerton detective, and two detectives of the G. T. R. Co.

The three little sons of Thomas McCallum, of Newark, N. J., who have been living with their grandmother in Brussels for some time, started for their eastern home last week, going alone. The oldest boy is 12 or 13 years of age.

An exchange warns the public to beware of shoddy peddlars who are visiting farmers' homes throughout the district, and in order to make a sale tell how they have just sold so many hundred dollars worth to store keepers in the locality.

While Mr Wm. Oke, of Kintbray, was engaged in crushing grain recently, he had the misfortune to get his arm caught in some of the wheels, which he broke it very badly. Medical aid was procured at once and we are glad to hear he is improving.

Complaints have been made by different people of the number of sharpers waiting at different places in Brussels to beat green-horns out of money. An example should be made of a few of them, and the greenies should know enough not to be caught by every little child's trick.

Master William Gosnell, eldest son of Mr J. Gosnell, of the Gravel Road, north of Searforth, met with a very painful accident last week. He was firing a gun when the powder flew back in his face, injuring one eye so severely that he will lose the sight of it.

A big potato is making mouths to water in Brussels. It grew in the garden of Wm. Pieper, formerly manager of the Brussels flax mill, now of Morden, Man. The Murphy weighed three pounds, and was brought to Brussels by Wm. Holling. He says there are plenty of potatoes of a great deal larger, some weighing as high as five pounds.

One day recently an 8-year-old son of B. Ward, Brussels, had the misfortune to have the third finger of his left hand cut off by an axe in the hands of his smaller brother. The injured digit was restored to its proper place, and the patient is doing as well as could be expected. This boy is rather unfortunate, as he received very serious injury by being kicked by a horse a few years ago.

At about daylight on Saturday morning, the inmates of Mr George Crossman's house, on the 8th con. of Bayfield, were started out of their slumbers to find the rear part of the house in flames. They dressed and got out as quickly as possible, managing to save only a few things before the whole place was burned. The evening before a furnace in a cook house to the rear of the dwelling had been used, and it is supposed that the fire must have originated from this. Several neighbors, once offered the shelter of their houses to Mr Crossman and his son-in-law, who occupied the house with him, and they accepted the offer of Mr James Snell, and will enjoy the brick house owned by this gentleman, on the gravel road, until a new house can be erected. The loss by fire will be in the vicinity of \$2000, on which there was no insurance.

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NEWS OF THE WEEK.

Latest Intelligence from all Parts.

Crisp Items of Interest for People Who Want the News in a Hurry—Information Brought Down to suit our Readers Time.

The editor of a health journal in England recently died. His widow says that the cause of his death was his attempt to live in accordance with the health principles advocated in his paper. He ate every kind of food advertised, and as each variety of food was intended for a people of certain temperaments, the result when one person ate them all was fatal.

The Anarchist Sanferment Committee of Chicago called upon the Mayor to plead for permission to supply beer at the Battery D demonstration of this day week. His Honor laconically declined to alter his previous decision. Subsequently they offered to detail fifty of their number to see that everybody was sober, but the Mayor dismissed them by inquiring who was to keep the fifty sober. The deputation then left.

At 2 o'clock Saturday morning fire was discovered on the first floor of the Commercial Hotel, Guelph, one of the largest hotels in the city. It had made such headway when the guests and boarders were awakened, that escape by the stairway was impossible, and all had to jump from the windows in their night clothes to save their lives. Hugh, the proprietor of the hotel, was seriously injured in rescuing his family. The third and fourth stories of the building are completely gutted, and the hotel will have to be entirely rebuilt. The body of Charles Rake was found in the ruins. He was reported safe at first and afterwards missing.

Communication from Garrow & Proudfoot respecting drain assessment of Messrs Henderson and Stewart, and from Kinloss clerk respecting expenses of John Robison while at London hospital, were read and received. G. Brown asked to have dog tax struck off his assessment, claiming that he did not own the dog assessed against him. No action taken until further proof be given. The communication from Garrow & Proudfoot was considered, and on motion their letter was ordered to be laid before the town ship auditor by the reeve and deputy reeve. The following deputy returning officers were appointed for the coming municipal election, John Bowers for division No 1; Geo Rutledge for No 2; R. K. Miller for No 3 and John Gordon for No 4. The collector was granted an extension of time for returning his roll until February 1st. It was expected that a settlement would be made with the late treasurer, Mr Durain, the council being willing to allow Mr Durain the amount of errors shown by the auditors' special report, viz: \$713.69, but as the report of Mr Parkinson, the expert who had audited the treasurer's books, showed a balance of \$1570.39 in favor of the treasurer, Mr Durain asked the privilege of communicating with Mr Parkinson before accepting the council granted until Saturday, December 10th, when it is expected all matters between the late treasurer and the municipality will be settled. After the issuing of several debentures, the council adjourned to meet on Saturday, Dec. 10th, at 1 o'clock. R. K. MILLER, clerk.

In Massachusetts the sheep are kept upon dry, rocky pastures, which are best for the sheep; so that cases of the foot rot are very rare, if any exist."

Latest Intelligence from all Parts.

Crisp Items of Interest for People Who Want the News in a Hurry—Information Balled Down to Suit Our Readers' Time.

Twenty-two persons were drowned in the recent hurricane off the Orkney Islands.

The corporation of Quebec are to pay all the costs of the present test case of the Salvation Army, but will not carry it to any higher court or pay further expenses.

Mme. Patti made her first public appearance in Paris since the Franco-Prussian war Friday night. The occasion was a concert in aid of the French Hospital in London.

The rector of St. Patrick's school, Quebec, Brother Thos. O'Brien, dropped dead in St. Patrick's church, Quebec, Saturday night, while attending service. Heart disease was the cause.

Benjamin Freer, headmaster of the Kinardine high school, has resigned, to accept a more lucrative position in Toronto. Mr. Freer has been fourteen years in the service of the board.

The train bound north over the St. Louis, Arkansas and Texas railway was stopped by train robbers, ten miles this side of Texarkana, Ark., on Friday day night, and the express car robbed of \$40,000.
