

But, then mothers are always terrible matchmakers. Margaret is going to marry a good man who loves her with all his big, manly heart, and whom she loves. Don't you think that mother is wickedly selfish? I do. It seems to me there is a terrible lot of tommyrot written about the American mother trying to sell her daughter for wealth or title. Of course there is that class of mother, just as there is a criminal class, but I don't think one should be regarded as typically American, any more than the other.

What I mean by a matchmaking mother is a mother who makes a deliberate effort to help her daughter meet the right sort of men. Who entertains the nice young people of the neighbourhood as much as she can afford to. What Mason meant when he spoke of caplin leant into ears, and of Abbe Baudoin's old man. I did so in my original paper, and see no object in repeating my remarks. The Judge is very unfortunate in his evidence, for Abbe Baudoin's statement (1897) again disproves his theory. He said Harbor Grace was the first colony established by the English in Newfoundland, and to indicate its age, he instanced the death of an old man born about 1610-11. It is obvious that if there had been settlers all round the Bay and in St. John's for 150 years or more there would have been no object for telling this story.

Now, I will just put a few conundrums to the Judge. How does he explain the fact that Guy's Charter (1610) declares, in two places, that Newfoundland was uninhabited by any Christian person? Why did Guy state that he had proved by his experience that Newfoundland was habitable and that others intended to follow his example? Why did Sir William Vaughan, who had been in Newfoundland about 1610-18 for the purpose of planting a colony, declare in two places that John Guy was the first Christian to settle in Newfoundland?

How does he explain Sir William Alexander's statement (1622) that the first houses for habitation in Newfoundland were built at Cupids by Guy? Why did Whitbourne, writing in 1619, recommend that St. John's should be settled, if it had been a flourishing colony since 1583? Why did Parkhurst, Hales, Carlisle Peckham and Hakluyt so strongly recommend the colonization of Newfoundland when it was already colonized?

How was it possible to keep the matter secret from generation to generation if thousands of fishermen knew of it? Until these questions are satisfactorily answered I think I will retire from the controversy. In conclusion, I wish to relate how the controversy arose. The Historical Society decided to try to celebrate the tercentenary of the founding of Guy's Colony. Some thought that Harbor Grace or Mosquito was the original site and not Cupids. When that error was settled, others declared that it was not the first settlement in Newfoundland and should not be celebrated. I contended that it was and undertook to prove it. I leave it to the public to decide whether it has been done or not.

"I'll tell you, Kelly, what you should do," said Tucker, "try and raise a few hundred dollars, pick out a nice locality and build a house for yourself. You'll regret this nooky-nawdy way of getting along a few years from now; you'll be played out from working and have nothing to show for your industry only a hump on your back and turned-in feet."

Governor's Speech

IN PROLOGUING THE ASSEMBLY THIS AFTERNOON.

Mr. President and Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council: Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly: It is with pleasure that I find myself in a position so speedily to receive you of your Parliamentary duties. The session, whilst almost unprecedented in your history for the number and variety of the measures considered, comprehending creative and constructive legislation—perhaps without example in the Colony's annals, has been marked by such elasticity and business-like methods as have enabled a great volume of business to be transacted in a remarkably short time.

The early opening of the session has, I am pleased to observe, been welcomed by the community, in that it has enabled the sittings to be conducted with the least inconvenience of both branches, and to elicit the best of both branches, and to elicit the clearest interest in the proceedings from the public generally. The many important measures that you have considered should be productive of great good to the country at large, especially those which will aid in the establishment of an industrial policy of varied aspects. The encouragement which you have afforded for the development of Coal, Petroleum refining, Copper smelting, Wool manufacturing, Mineral discovery, and kindred lines of industrial activity, should result in greatly extending the avenues of employment for the people, and diversifying the pursuits upon which the prosperity of the Colony is based.

The measure for the extension of the Railway system of the Colony is one that should exert very beneficial influences on the future of Newfoundland. The unanimous testimony as to the advantages which the Railway construction thus far has bestowed on the Island justifies the conclusion that the proposed Branches will contribute in an important degree to the same direction. The reception which the measure has met at your hands gives confidence that the generous support of all classes towards carrying out a comprehensive policy for the well-being of Newfoundland will bear fruit in her attaining in the near future a degree of betterment far exceeding any she has yet enjoyed.

The policy outlined by my Ministers with regard to Agricultural development must commend itself to the Colony generally. Its details are so fully set forth, and it embraces all classes so completely that its benefits cannot fail to be widely diffused and to result in an effective stimulus being imparted to our Agricultural industry with marked good to those who follow this avocation, and to the country as a whole. The determination to make agricultural subjects more a feature of the educational system of the colony is a step in the right direction, and it is especially gratifying to observe that it has been found possible to substantially augment the vote for Education against this session in addition to the handsome increase which was voted in June last.

The widespread destruction to public wharves, breakwaters, roads and bridges caused by the storms in November and December last will, I am glad to say, be made good in a great measure by the appropriation of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) which you have provided for the purpose. The enactment of a measure for the prohibition of steam vessels engaging in the Labrador fishery, which has been advocated so strenuously for some years past by the thousands of our people who fish on that coast, will assure the permanence to them of the industry in the form it is at present prosecuted, unthreatened by the ruinous competition which the employment of steam power has wrought to similar industries in other countries. The unanimous adoption of this measure by both your Houses is a testimony to the manner in which questions affecting the great industry of the people are considered by you. Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Honourable House of Assembly:

I thank you for the liberal supplies which you have provided for the public service, and which shall be devoted economically. I am pleased to note that a substantial surplus is anticipated for the current fiscal year, and to realize that the various measures which have been determined upon this session can be effectuated without any increased taxation.

Bankers Getting Ready

All the banking schooners of Fortune, Grand Bank, Belleoram and other places near, are now getting ready for the banking voyage, and will leave for the Western Banks on the 1st April. There is a bountiful supply of fresh herring bait available and a good beginning is anticipated. All are fully crewed, and the highest wages has been given them for 10 years past, the average being \$190 with a share of the fish should the voyage average over this amount.

In Splendid Condition.

The s.s. Prospero hauled down to Bowring Bros. pier yesterday from the dry dock. She had been on the dock for a long while past and received a thorough overhauling and repairs. Fourteen plates which had become indented by surging against the piers on the northern service last winter were taken and replaced, straightened and newly riveted. The engines were taken abroad and given necessary attention, and the ship's well was cleaned and painted under the water line. The superstructure is to-day being chipped and painted, and the staterooms, saloons and steering apartments, Mr. W. R. Wren, painted and decorated. Her bows have been strengthened with heavy steel stringers and beams to enable her to better withstand the shock of contact with the ice, and everything has been done by her owners, Bowring Bros., to put her in first class condition for the northern service this season.

Small Pox and Diphtheria Increasing.

Three additional cases of small pox were reported this morning from Grand River, Codroy. This totals about 16 cases to date in that place. It is of the usual mild type of disease, nevertheless Magistrate McDonald and the doctor there are doing their utmost to stamp it out. All the people are submitting to vaccination and the infected houses have been placed under strict quarantine. In other patient, a female, was removed from the General Hospital this morning to the Fever Hospital. It is feared she is developing diphtheria, and she was placed there to be under observation. Two new cases of diphtheria were also reported to-day from Pouch Cove. The disease has been there for some time, the houses of Messrs. Ryan and Noseworthy being infected. Both these men had intended going to the States, but could not do so owing to the outbreak of the disease. Members of the families of Messrs. Flight and Williams to-day have developed the disease. Their houses are quarantined and efforts are being made to stamp out the malady.

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In the Council.

The sitting yesterday only lasted ten minutes, as the work of the session was finished. The President announced that His Excellency the Governor would prorogue the Legislature to-day. The Council will meet at 2.30 this evening.

C. E. T. S.

Rev. J. Bell delivered an address on Temperance at the C. E. T. S. meeting in the Synod Building last night. There was a fairly large attendance. The speaker made reference to the recent legislation passed by the Legislature whereby there would be a great hope of a lessening of the evils of drink. The credit system was now abolished, the time during which saloons could be open was lessened, and other reforms like the abolition of the C. O. D. system. Four new members were admitted and fifteen were proposed. The annual meeting will take place on April 4th. Benediction brought the meeting to a close.

LEGISLATION, 1910.

Synopsis of Bills Discussed This Session.

Railway Loan.
Loan for £800,000 stg. at 3½ per cent. for the new Branch Railway lines.

Law Society.
Provides for the admission of ladies to the practice of the law.

Dominion and Nova Scotia Steel Companies.
Contract under which these Companies agree to pay the Government seven and one-half cent a ton on all iron-ore exported by them for next ten years. No other tax to be imposed on the Companies or on coal purchased by them for the same period.

Dental.
Empowers Dental Board to make rules regulating and defining the class of work which unregistered paid assistants may perform.

Smelting Copper Ore.
The Government undertakes to pay the proprietor of any copper mine \$1 per ton up to 100 tons and 50c. per ton up to 500 tons on all copper ore smelted for him in any one year.

Trade Unions.
Legalizes the formation of Trade Unions, declares that such organizations are not in restraint of trade, and protects the funds of the Union from liability for wrongdoing by a member. Imperial Act 38, 39 Vic. Cap. 85, and the Act 6 Ed. VII., Cap. 47, are incorporated into the present Act.

Crown Lands.
Provides for issue of leases for 20 years with right to holder to dredge in any river flowing through Crown lands for valuable minerals. Rent, \$10 per mile per annum; greatest extent of river ten lineal miles. Gives owners of pulp and other factories right of way over private lands for the purpose of their business, and provides for compulsory arbitration if parties cannot agree as to amount of compensation.

Woolen Manufactures.
Offers premium of 5 per cent upon the original cost of all raw wool imported for the purpose of manufacturing wearing apparel, rugs, carpets, &c., also 5 per cent. on wool used for same purposes raised in this Colony; all machinery which cannot be made in this country admitted duty free.

Education.
The Diamond Jubilee Scholarship is raised from \$600 to \$1200. The Jubilee Scholarship from \$200 to \$400, and \$25,000 additional voted for various educational purposes.

Game and Fishery Board.
Appoints a Board for the protection of seal, coast and inland fisheries, the protection of birds, deer, moose, game or fur bearing animals; the issue of licenses to fish to persons not domiciled in the Colony and the fees for same; the appointment and dismissal of wardens; the expenditure of all monies voted by the Government for the purposes of the Act and the prosecution of offenders.

Retiring Allowances.
Provides pensions for retiring members of the Civil Service.

Coal Development.
Company agrees to expend on coal boring \$15,000 first year, \$10,000 second year. Government grants to Company in fee simple any coal areas discovered by them. After 10 years Company pays royalty of ten cents per ton. Price of coal to purchasers regulated.

Beaver Protection.
Extends close season to Oct. 10, 1913. Raises the money penalties and adds in some cases imprisonment.

Fishermen's and Sailors' Home.
Empowers the surviving members of the Old Fishermen and Sailors' Home Company to dispose of its property and after payment of liabilities to pay the balance to the Deep Sea Mission for the purposes of the new Fishermen's and Sailors' Home, St. John's.

Labrador Fishery.
Makes it unlawful to prosecute the fishery within three miles of the coast in steamers, carrying crews, obtaining and distributing bait excepted. Under this Act motor boats may be used.

Pilots and Pilotage.
Authorizes the Commissioners of Pilots to take from the funds under their control \$4,000 for the purchase of a steam pilot boat. Adds 10 per cent. on pilotage rates for her maintenance.

Mineral Discoveries.
Authorizes Government to pay the original discoverer of a mineral deposit, whether on public or private lands \$1,000. Provided, the deposit is worked continuously for one year by at least fifty men.

Railway.
Branch lines to Heart's Content, Bonavista, Fortune Bay, Trepassay, by way of Southern Shore, and Bonne Bay. Cost of construction, \$15,000 per mile. Consideration for operating 4,000 acres of land per mile of railway, and \$69 per annum per mile mail subsidy.

Solemnization of Marriage.
The authority conferred upon the Commissioners and Staff-Officers of the Salvation Army is extended to Captains of the Society.

Remission of Penalties.
Makes it lawful for the Governor to remit penalties, although the Act under which the penalty is imposed gives the whole or part of the penalty to some other party other than the Crown.

Cash Notes.
Provides for the issue of Cash Notes by the Government for payments in connection with the permanent and casual poor service.

Nuisances and Municipal Regulations.
Formerly all penalties imposed had to be sued for before a Stipendiary Magistrate residing in the town where the offence was committed. Present Act gives jurisdiction to Stipendiary Magistrate and Justices of the Peace wherever resident.

Municipal.
Gives Council authority to acquire land round the margin of Windsor Lake. Provides for compulsory sewerage where rental of building is not less than \$80. Imposes a tax on money lenders, collection agencies, theatrical, pictorial and other similar public performances. Provides for rules for regulating fires, escapes, ventilation and lavatories inspection of private houses. The extension of the new higher level water system and improved water supply to South Side.

Agriculture.
Provides for the formation of Agricultural Societies in all electoral districts, the granting of aid to such societies to carry out their objects, to pay school teachers an annual salary to act as secretaries; the holding of agricultural shows, to pay for prizes at such shows; the delivery of lectures on agriculture throughout the Colony; the compilation of farm notes for the local press; the encouragement of cold storage in agricultural localities, &c., &c.; the providing of a scholarship, and a bonus for opening and working lime kilns.

Incorporating Vicar Apostolic, St. George's.
A Bill for this purpose was passed by the House of Assembly, but an amendment to it having been made in the Legislative Council, the Bill was "laid aside."

Daylight Bill.
Introduced and passed by the Legislature but lost in House of Assembly.

Government Securities.
The provisions of the Imperial Act 63, 64 Vic., called the Colonial Stock Act, and the Act 5 Ed. VII. are made applicable to all Newfoundland securities in accordance with the Act. Messrs. Glynn, Currie & Co., bankers, London, are made the Colony's financial agents.

Magistrates and Justices.
Increases the jurisdiction to \$200 with right of appeal over \$20.

Oil Fields.
Ratifies a contract with the Newfoundland Oil Fields Company. All plant and machinery duty free. When Company in a position to produce sufficient for the local market, the Government undertakes to impose a prohibitive duty. No excise tax or export duty to be imposed for a period of ten years.

Marine and Fisheries.
Provides for a Fishery Board of fifteen members. The head of the Board shall be an officer appointed by the Governor, who shall be called the Deputy Minister of Marine and Fisheries.

Election Act.

Permits outport electors to vote in St. John's for the candidates for their respective districts.

Druggists' Society and Sale of Drugs.

Appoints a Board whose duty shall be to make by-laws, to examine candidates, and the regulation of its own business. Every candidate shall have served as an assistant to regular druggist for not less than four years and shall pass a successful examination. Present druggists not required to pass an examination. The Act regulates the sale of poisons.

Board of Trade.

Is granted power to appoint committees of arbitration for the settlement of matters and differences voluntarily submitted to them. The award of such committee shall be final and have the same effect as judgment of the Supreme Court.

Qualification of Firemen.

No fireman or stoker shall be employed in connection with any boiler or engine in any mill or factory unless he is the holder of a license. The Boiler Inspector is appointed examiner and the Government makes rates respecting such examinations.

Cold Storage.

It shall be lawful for the Government to guarantee any person engaged in the business of cold storage where the net annual profits on the capital invested is less than five per cent. a sum equal to five per cent.

Pebble Co.

The Company has the right to dig in the foreshore of Conception Bay for pebbles or beach stones; exclusive right for three years to export same. The Company agrees to expend in actual labor during the first ten years \$10,000 per annum; next ten years, \$20,000 per annum; last five years, \$25,000 per annum.

Revenue Bill.

Among the general provisions for annual taxation is the provision that not more than \$50 of clothing in addition to that taken away can be entered free of duty by a passenger returning to Newfoundland.

Man Badly Hurt

Jas. Taylor, of Duggan Street, received serious injuries while at work digging out a basement on upper Springdale Street shortly after 2 p.m. yesterday. Taylor with two young men named Martin had a contract to do the work for Mr. George Hall, who has a new house over the place where the men worked. The shelter of the structure, of course, kept the sun from playing on the ground, which was very hard and held the frost. The three men adopted the foolhardy proceeding of digging in for about 10 feet through the earth, leaving a roof of frozen clay above. This they did not even attempt to prop up, and they tumbled in imminent danger of their lives at every stroke of their picks. How the earth held so long without caving in under these conditions is a mystery. The Martins had just walked out from under the earthen roof, and Taylor was in the act of doing so and had his head and shoulders through the aperture, when the whole thing gave way and fully seven tons of frozen clay fell about him. He was caught in a stooping posture and was buried to the shoulders. The man's cries of pain were heartrending and he called loudly for help. It was fortunate that Inspector Bambrick and his men were at work near, and these set quickly to the task of extricating the poor fellow. With the carpenters who were at work there and neighbors, and also with the aid of Inspector Bambrick and Mr. Jesse Whiteway, the unfortunate man was released, but only after an hour's hard work. Mr. Whiteway brought stimulants from his house and these kept the suffering man's spirits up while the heavy weight of clay was being taken off his body. Frozen pieces of earth weighing as high as three and four cwt. were lifted off him. When taken out he was borne into the residence of Mrs. Irving near and carefully looked after. Going to Mr. Butler's school nearby Mr. Bambrick summoned Dr. Tait by 'phone, and he arrived quickly. He found that Taylor's right leg was broken in two places above the knee, and that his other leg was in a bad state, and that his body was badly cut and bruised. The ambulance was quickly called and the sufferer was removed to the Hospital. Taylor must have been a strong man to bear up for over an hour while suffering terrible pain as the men shovelled the clay off him. Had the three men remained where they were they would have been completely buried and killed when the ground fell in so suddenly. Consts. Martin and Hunter were also present and lent every assistance.

Tariff Agreement.

Special to Evening Telegram. PARIS, Mar. 21. The French Cabinet devoted all of to-day's session to a consideration of the Franco-American Tariff negotiations. Subsequently a semi-official note was given out which read:—The status of the tariff negotiation with the United States affords the hope that a satisfactory agreement will be reached. Nothing more definite was forthcoming to-day despite the fact that President Taft is quoted here as having announced last night that a complete agreement had been reached, and that he would to-day sign a proclamation giving to France the favoured rates as provided in the Payne-Aldrich Law. The influential Weekly Opinion warmly congratulates both Ambassador Jusserand and the Government upon the imminence of an agreement with the United States. It considers the result of the tariff negotiations as a compromise but argues that France is really the victor having forced the United States Government to abandon its demand for all of the French Minimums.

Glovertown.

The Missionary Meetings in connection with the Methodist Church have been held at the following places during the last fortnight:—Glovertown, Flat Island, Gooseberry Island, Deer Island and Bragg's Island. The meeting at Glovertown was presided over by Ambrose James J. P., who gave an address on the Bible. Recitations were given by the scholars of the Sunday School. The report was then read by Rev. J. Hurst who pleaded for an increase in subscribers and subscriptions. An address was then given by the Rev. J. A. Wilkinson, of Gooseberry Island, on the Charge given by Jesus Christ, and to win men by love said the speaker. Several aspects of the foreign missionary work were dealt with. Mr. Elijah Barry gave an address on "Giving to the Cause of God." A paper was read by Miss Wheeler on Africa and its need of the Gospel, illustrated by facts and figures. The meeting was brought to a close by an address from the Rev. J. Hurst on the Progress of Christianity. Special hymns were sung by the choir under the leadership of Miss Wheeler and Miss Parsons. The meeting was one of the best ever held in Glovertown. The Revs. Hurst and Wilkinson also visited the Gooseberry Island end of the mission.—Com.

Rev. Mr. Hannay's Lecture Last Night.


Rev. W. C. Hannay delivered a lecture on "Memory—its use and abuse" at St. Andrew's Hall last evening for the Literary Association. The lecturer spoke for an hour and a half. He divided memory into two kinds—automatic and philosophic. People could improve their memories by a systematic training. People who had remarkably good memories were often found deficient in other mental qualities. The lecturer then went on to show how the memory might be improved by training, concentration and a thorough understanding of the matter to be retained in memory. He then showed how the memory could be abused. He warned against overdevelopment of the memory. The knowledge of happenings is communicated to the memory by the eye and the ear. Most people had their memory best served by visual impressions, and others were best served by the impressions made through the ear. After a few interesting experiments were given a hearty vote of thanks was passed to the lecturer for having given the audience such a treat.

There were presented by Mr. Clapp, handed to him by the Premier, from Bonne Bay for \$100 for a road to Stanleyville; from South West Paquet for a Post Office; from the same place asking that that place be made a port of call alternately with North West Paquet; from Bonavista for a harbour light on Crowley's Point; from Birchy Head, Bonne Bay for a road; and from Brent's Cove and Harbour Round asking for a port of call in the vicinity; by Mr. Cashin from Aquaforte on bultows; by Mr. Davey from Lamaline and Lawn on bultows; from Lores and Point Crewe about a road; by Mr. Kent from Torbay about a road; by Mr. Goodison from Carbonar about a road; by Mr. Devereaux from Barron Island about telegraphs; by Mr. Morrison from Gambo on education; by Mr. Squires from Deer Harbour about education; from Lance Cove and Bluff Head Cove about bridges; and from Upper Lance Cove about a water supply.

The House was advised that the Legislative Council had passed all the bills sent up to them.

Mr. Kent gave notice of a question as to the action the Government intended taking on Mr. McNelly's report in connection with the telegraph enquiry; and also of another in connection with the petition from Ferryland in regard to the services of Dr. Giovanetti.

Hon. Minister of Justice gave notice that the House would be prorogued to-day at 3 p.m., and the House adjourned till 2.30 p.m. to-day.

Lost Lot of Logs.

Passengers by the express inform us that owing to a heavy N. W. gale which occurred a couple of days ago, the ice in Middle Brook, Port Blandford, gave way suddenly and going down on the wharf where the coastal boats moor damaged it considerably. Between 800 and 1,000 logs were swept away and lost. They were owned by Mr. Stone and their loss is a serious one for him. A man named Sexton also lost 100 large pine logs.

The Toll of the Sea.

Special to Evening Telegram. BOSTON, Mass., Mar. 21. Two hundred-and-twenty-five persons perished by shipwreck, and 83 vessels met with disaster off New England and British North American coast while engaged in the New England, Canadian or Newfoundland trade during the Fall and Winter season of 1909 and 1910, which ended at 7 a.m. to-day. Of the 83 vessels cast ashore, sunk, burned or involved in other mishaps, 21 were steamers or tugs, one was a full rigged ship, 4 barques, 3 barkentines and 62 schrs. A number of barges were lost but they were not included in the list. The financial loss exceeds \$17,000,000.

Cabinet Crisis in Italy.

Special to Evening Telegram. ROME, Mar. 21. The Italian Cabinet resigned to-day. The retirement of the Ministry which was formed on December 10th, 1909, with Baron Bonino, as Premier, was due to the realization that the Government's Mercantile Marine subsidies measure was doomed to defeat. The Italian Minister's programme announced on February 11, provided for a six million subsidy in aid of Italian shipping. The Government also proposed to give the Italian-Lloyd Steamer Company a twenty-five year subvention for the transportation of mail. The proposals proved unpopular and led to stormy scenes in the chamber, during which the Cabinet was sharply criticized.

Parliamentary Hooligans.

Special to Evening Telegram. BUDAPEST, Mar. 21. Stormy as have been the sessions of the Hungarian Chamber of Deputies, the Magyars to-day out-did themselves, and ink-wells, books and other handy missiles were hurled at the heads of the Ministers until the latter took refuge in flight. Both the Premier and the Minister of Agriculture were struck by flying missiles, and their heads were cut open. The trouble had been brewing for some time and the Premier and Ministry were unable to make headway against the Opposition, and this morning dissolved the Chamber by Royal decree. This was a signal for an outburst by the Opposition who claimed the dissolution was unconstitutional.

King Better.

Special to Evening Telegram. BIARRITZ, Mar. 21. King Edward has completely recovered from his cold and to-day resumed his usual outdoor excursion.

Expulsion of Priests.

Special to Evening Telegram. SANTIAGO, Chile, Mar. 21. The Peruvian Government to-day notified the Government of Chile of the withdrawal of the Peruvian legation at Santiago, because of the recent expulsion of Peruvian Priests from the Provinces of Tacna and Arica.

40 Killed in Train Wreck

Special to Evening Telegram. MARSHALLTOWN, Mar. 21. More than forty persons were killed and almost as many more injured to-day in the wreck at Green Mountain of two Rock Island trains running over the Chicago Great Western tracks from Marshalltown to Waterloo. Several of the injured may die. A number of the dead are so horribly mangled that identification may never be possible. Every doctor in Marshalltown and Green Mountain is doing everything possible in emergency hospitals to relieve the suffering of the injured. Around the various undertaking shops the citizens throng with tear-stained faces, each anxious to get some details of those who are within.

Big Libel.

Special to Evening Telegram. PARIS, Mar. 21. The Matin announces to-day that it will institute a suit against Le Journal for \$100,000.00 damages because of a series of articles which the latter paper published commenting on the management of the Matin with the Chartreuse affair. The litigation of the property of the Carthusian Monks is a part of the scandal now under investigation by the Government.

Notes From Harbor Grace.

Miss Phoebe Alcock is now enjoying a visit to friends in St. John's.

Miss Polly Kelly, formerly of this town but lately residing in St. John's, is here visiting friends and staying at the Cochrane House.

Dr. Brehm came by train Saturday night and we hear pronounced the man Bray suffering from a type of small pox.

Quite a number of people have the telephone installed and find it of great advantage.

A young lady of the East End in confidence to a gay young friend of hers the other day expressed herself as being a great admirer of a bachelor friend, who occasionally contributes to one of the St. John's papers. She better be on the alert or she may not get him.

The young man William Bray, who is suffering from small pox, was somewhat improved yesterday, although he has not as yet been taken

to hospital. The hospital was considered not fit to put a patient in. A sister of this young man, who had been much in his company during the past week, was on Saturday removed to the old-Police Barracks on Carbonear Road, where two nurses are placed to look after such doubtful cases. This old building is thus after a great number of years utilized for the very purpose it was at first intended. About 50 or 60 years ago, we are not old enough to be able to say definitely, this building was put up by the people of Harbor Grace by subscription to be used as an hospital. We have never heard of its being used for that purpose, but when the soldiers came here in the fifties it was handed over to them for a barracks. When they were removed the police were quartered there. It was considered too far from the town for this purpose and but a few of the family men were left there. The late John McKay lived there for over 26 years. But it seems the old place was destined to be an hospital, as even now in its old age it is turned into what it was originally built for.

The people in the neighborhood are complaining that the place is not fit for an hospital as it has no sewerage and is otherwise unfit. They claim that a board fence should be put around it, thus keeping dogs and other animals from prowling about. There is little cause for fear. The Board of Health is made up of the right sort of men to do everything for the best, and we have not the least doubt that everything possible will be done to wipe out the disease as quickly as possible.

The Rev. Thomas Godden occupied the pulpit in St. Paul's Church yesterday as Canon Noel is on quarantine, as Mrs. Bray, mother of the sufferer, had visited the Rectory during the week.

In Danger.

Mr. Pierce Dunne had a letter dated March 10th from his brother, James, who resides in Burke, Idaho, U.S.A., by the Bruce mail, in which he relates a story of losses and danger from avalanches which have occurred to himself and another Newfoundland named John Finlay. Five persons were killed and their houses demolished at Burke by the snow slides. One heavy avalanche fell only a hundred feet distant from Mr. Dunne's home, but he expected some such accident and had his family and furniture removed to a secure position. Sixteen persons were killed at Most, a town a short distance away, and both Messrs. Dunne and Finlay assisted in getting the bodies from the ruins. Finlay's family had a very narrow escape. He had only removed them a short while before the accident occurred when a heavy snow slide came and made matchwood of his residence, while another house which he owned, adjoining his residence, was also wrecked. The loss to him is a great one. Twelve houses altogether were destroyed, and the people fled in terror from the neighborhood of the mountains. Both Dunne and Finlay are well known here.


