



It must also be remembered that the Prime Minister has already assented to the request that the answers to the questions shall also be recorded. We presume this relates to correspondence and answers of a compendious character which car be published without unduly swelling the record and would not include copies of Road Board expenditures. Ever with this exception the record will b swelled considerably and must have a tendency to delay the up-to-dat nature of the daily report. We mention this matter because we think i is a matter of regret that a week ha already been lost in the publication of debates. Inasmuch, however, as there is no forecast in the Governor's Speech of any important legislation other than changes in the Tariff to make up the shortage on the revenue. it is likely that the session will not tomime that will astonish and delight legislative measures.



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

LISBON, Jan. 21. The arrest of 200 ringleaders in a general strike of railway men in Portugal, was carried out to-day by order of the Government. Warrants against 400 others were issued but the men evaded capture. The strike which was declared on January 14th, has been broken, and many men have resumed work. The passenger service is restored and in almost a normal

SYDNEY, N.S.W., Jan. 21. The whole face of Ambrin Island in the New Hebrides group, has been altered by volcanic upheavals during the last month, when it is estimated 500 natives perished. The site of the Mission hospital now lies beneath 80 feet of water, while there are two miles of hilly country, where ships previously floated, on approaching

OTTAWA, Jan. 21. Three persons were killed and six injured, through an explosion in the heating plant of the Howick Pavillon this morning, where the Eastern Ontario Live Stock Show was being held. The whole of the interior is a mass of wreckage, from which it proved a task to extricate the dead and injured. Scores of animals were killed and maimed. The property loss in buildings and live stock, amounts to \$100,000. The flames which broke out shortly after the explosion, theratened to consume the wreckage. Twenty-five horses, valued at \$65,000, were killed and many were injured.

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
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
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
