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

ST. PIERRE BULLETIN.

May 10th. In German works captured yesterday near Lens we made hundreds of prisoners. At Bagatelle, in Argonne, out troops repulsed three attacks, one during night of 7th and 8th and other two vesterday.

Midnight:-Between the sea and Nieuport the Germans attacked but were repulsed suffering heavy losses. The British troops have advanced in Fromelles District. We realized substantial progress north of Arras, in direction of Loos and south of Carency; in the latter district we captured on a front of 7 kilometres two and even three lines of German trenches strongly fortified. We have captured the village of Targette and one half of Neuville Slvast village. Our advance in depth reaching on certain points 4 kilometres we have taken over 2,000 prisoners and 6 cannons. In Champagne we repulsed an attack near St. Thomas, on the border of Argonne. At Bagatelle we have been able to verify the importance of the losses sustained by the enemy during their attacks of yesterday. Germans again used asphyxiating bombs and fiery liquids without any success. On remainder of front, especially at Le Pretre Wood and Sillskerwasen, artillery contests.

GERMAN COMMUNICATION. BERLIN, May 10.





I stood on the bridge; when she sank, the Lusitania went down under me. She floated about 18 minutes after the torpedo struck her. My watch stopped at 2.36. I was picked up from among the wreckage afterwards, and was brought aboard a trawler. No warship was convoying us. I saw no warship and none was reported to me as having been seen. At the time I was picked up, I noticed bodies floating on the surface but saw no living person. "Was there a lookout kept for submarines, having regard to previous warnings?" "Yes, we had double lookouts." "Were you going a zigzag course at the moment the torpedoing took place?" "No. It was bright weather, and the land was clearly visible." "Was it possible for the submarines to approach without being seen?" "Oh, yes, quite possible.

LLOYD GEORGE'S LIQUOR BILL.

LONDON, To-day. The Commons, this evening, passed the second reading of Chancellor of the Exchequer Lloyd George's Bill to amend the Defence of the Realm Act the Exchequer Lloyd George's Bill to amend the Defence of the Realm Act. The Bill originally was designed to place a heavy surtax on wines, spirits and beer, but under pressure from the Irish Party, its provisions were amended, giving the Government control of the sale of liquor in areas where munitions of war are being made. Under the Bill, a Central Committee will be set up for Scotland and England. It will act on recommendations of local committees of employers and workmen in the disemployers and workmen in the dis-tricts affected. Lloyd George prom-ised to appoint a committee to in quire into the charge of drunkenness among workmen, and all parties, including Laborites, have expressed their satisfaction with the Bill. The Government will absolutely control the sale of liquors in selected districts, including that dispensed at clubs and dispensed at clubs and grocery stores. A Commission under the Chairmanship of Lord Dunedin, will deal with the question of compensation to liquor dealers for losses.






