



The British Attack Again.



To the terrific onslaught and glorious victory of the British army at Arsucceeded the necessary

interval of rest and fresh preparation. The inevitable rejoinder of the enemy most outrageous and revolting cleame in the form of counter attacks ever heard of in this country that Germany is making a desperate stand, betraying in her frantic efforts her knowledge of the dire necessity of making them; and it means that her army is being reduced by the one terrible process that will alone bring the Reid Nfld. 



He left London for Ireland with the 12th Field Co. of Royal Engineers, shortly after returned to Cambridge with his Company, a Unit of the 6th Division and embarked for France early in September. 1914. At that time he was Sub-Lieutenant and for his devotion to duty was made a Captain in 1915. He was then transferred to the 36th Division, of which he acted Adjutant for several months and then rejoined his own former Company with the rank of Major. In the King's Birthday Honours list last year he appeared as Major Jackson, M. C., the honour having been conferred on him for distinguished services rendered in the field. On several occasions he had been mentioned in despatches. Not-




