



On July 1st the St. John's Municipa Council will present Field Marshal Earl Haig with an Address, giving him the Freedom of the City. The widress will be enclosed in a beautiful casket, which is being made by the firm of J. T. Lamb. The casket is of solid silver and is encircled by a Grecian border. This border is a patorn from the iron railing encircling the Monument which the Marshai will unveil. On the front is an enamelled crest of the Municipality.
