The Debate on the Address.

Without any delay, the Legislature proceeded to discuss the Ministerial programme contained in the Speech the day following the commencement of the session. The different speakers confined themselves pretty closely to the subjects referred to in that Speech, although two or three members of the Opposition betrayed their old propensity by repeating the stereotyped charges against the members of the Government. It was not, of course, to be expected that they would allow the opportunity to pass without having a fling at the Premier, or without once more airing the well-worn sophistries about his desecration of the sanctity of the Bench in leaving it for the more stirring and active arena of politics. Mr. M. C. Cameron, while taking this ground, did not go so far as some of the high-toned Tories and Tory papers, in charging Mr. Mowat with acting unconstitutionally in accepting office. Mr. Cameron well knew that that ground was untenable, and Mr. Mowat in the course of his speech, in reply to Mr. Cameron's, showed in the most clear and conclusive manner that there was no desecration of the sanctity of the Bench in leaving it, and in again entering political life. Nay more, he took even higher ground, and maintained that there was as much sanctity in his position as leader of the Reform party and of the Government as in any other in the land. He argued that if it was a degradation and a descent for a man to engage in the work of perfecting the government of a country, then some of the noblest and best men this or the mother country had produced, were altogether wrong in the work they had accomplished, and the life they had chosen to lead. He capped the climax of his argument by the noble sentiment that as Premier of the Government and member of the Legislative Assembly of Ontario, he was as much discharging his duty now, and acting upon as high moral principles, as he possibly could on the Bench. And we are satisfied that such sentiments will be echoed by a very large majority of the people of this Province. The only other charge worth mentioning made by Mr. Cameron, was that the members of the Government who remained in office after Messrs Blake and Mackenzie had resigned, had violated the constitution in not going back to their constituents for re-election. This charge Mr. Mowat squarely met and effectually answered. He pointed out that the reason their seats were not vacated by any act of theirs. The statute declared that whenever any member holding a certain office resigned that office, and afterwards accepted another office within one month, he did not thereby vacate his seat in the Assembly, unless the Administration, of which he was a member, resigned, and he accepted office in a new Ministry. A new Ministry had not been formed; the resignations of the old members had not been received, but they were asked to hold their offices until the new members were appointed. The effective manner in which the Premier replied to the attacks of the leader of the Opposition made most favourable impression on the supporters of the Government. They felt that, though lacking the commanding power and extraordinary ability of Mr. Blake, though not possessing the great experience and lengthened parliamentary practice of Mr. Mackenzie, he yet displayed a readiness in debate, and an intimate acquaintance with parliamentary usage, as made him more than a match for the ablest man on the Opposition benches. And as the session progresses, we feel satisfied that he will more and more command the respect of the House, and give ample evidence that he is in every respect well qualified to lead the Government, and to retain the support of his followers. There are scarcely any other features of the debate which demand special notice. Mr. Fauder was, as usual, conspicuous in the blistering, biting, and tone of his speech. Mr. Prince said enough to satisfy both parties that he had made up his mind to continue to support the Government. Mr. McKellar replied in plain and earnest words the foul charges made against him with respect to the Elgin Association affair, and promised to bring such evidence before the House as would thoroughly satisfy the members that they were utterly groundless. Mr. Wood expressed his confidence in the Government, and in their ability to deal with the Municipal Loan Fund indebtedness, and took the Dominion Government severely to task for their unwarranted tampering with the constitution in granting subsidies to the Lower Provinces, which were alike an injustice and an injury to Ontario.

The Orphan of the Wreck.

CONCLUSION.

Thus the truth was brought to light, and justice was done at last. For well nigh twenty years the fraud had prospered, and the orphan of the wreck had been deprived of his inheritance. So long had the imposture prevailed that the doers of the wrong had come to the belief that detection would never take place, that they should be allowed to enjoy with impunity the fruit of their unrighteous designs. Yet, in an hour when they thought not their palace of fraud had crumbled into ruin, at the moment when they had filled up the measure of their iniquity by the foulest crime which man can commit, and when they were about to demolish the altar, and consign an innocent and helpless maiden to life-long misery—all in the furtherance of their selfish purposes—the veil of concealment which hitherto they had managed to keep around them was rent from the top to the bottom, and they stood conspicuously revealed in all their naked guiltiness, with no rag of pretence to shelter under, and no craven or shadow of subterfuge into which to crawl. The revelation of their fraudulence, their circumvention, and criminal deception was so clear that they made no attempt at denial, and sought not to modify their position by fighting against the claims of the youth to the name and the property of George Morrar. Had nothing beyond civil liability being involved they would most certainly have taken every step the law allowed them to keep the youth from his inheritance; but Stephen Gibson and Nathan Garrett knew full well that were a legal investigation to be opened, it would end only in entailing on them a heavy punishment. For this reason they accepted their defeat as hopeless, and tacitly admitted all that the revelation had made manifest.

And now the work of restitution and rectification had to follow. Here Harry was firm and stern, much more so than George was inclined to be. In the heart of the latter, love and friendship prompted him to deal very leniently and forbearingly with Captain Gibson, and his strong desire and decided resolution were to avoid a public exposure, and keep from human knowledge the iniquitous imposition of Garrett, in which the Captain had so largely shared. The open dishonor of Stephen Gibson must of necessity cast a dark shadow over his family; therefore, for the sake of Lillias and Harry, George would do nothing to publish the Captain's guilt.

Harry, however, would not suffer the matter to be settled so. He insisted on Nathan Garrett being banished from Ardgowan—yes, from Glenfask altogether. The public might be induced to suppose that Captain Gibson had been kept in ignorance of the truth till now; but Garrett's guilt could not be screened, and Harry determined that his expulsion from the place should be taken as the infliction of his punishment—that he should be made yield up his gains, and sent forth with so much of his ill-gotten gains as would carry him and Rangoon to another land. Nathan Garrett was inclined very decidedly to demur to this. He wished and tried to make a much better bargain for himself, and believing that rather than incur family dishonor they would deal more liberally with him, he showed some signs of being obstinate, and resisted till Harry, with a stern inexorable mien, told him that rather than abate these terms one jot he would bring down upon him the vengeance of the law at whatever cost. So Nathan Garrett, chagrined, mortified, and baffled, had to yield and depart.

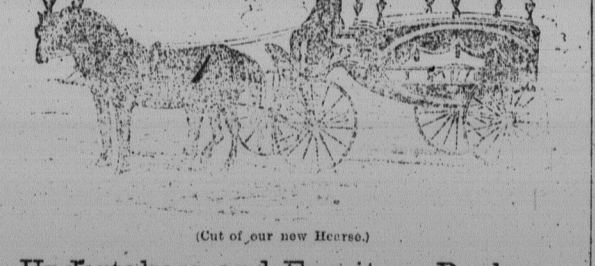
