It contains about 60,000 square miles. This district comprises three presby-tenies, viz: Calgary, Red Deer and Lacombe. It has 77 mission fields and emented charges. It draws \$3 14 augmented charges. It draws out.
723 from the home misison funds, being a little less than what the same district contributes to all the schemes of the church. Mr. Shearer expressed the hope that before very long the synod of Alberta would support its own mission work, without aid from the churches.

May Insist Upon Deposit When Service Is Put in—Banks May Be Used to Help

Commissioner Graves, who has been investigating methods of collecting electric light and water accounts, will recommend to the council next Monday night that an arrangement be made if possible, with branch banks in out-lying parts of the city to collect these bills and issue receipts, or in the event of these arrangements not being pos-sible, that the city open offices of its own. The corporation had no sooner taken over the system than it reduced the call rate to one penny and the subscriber's annual rate to twenty-five dollars. This resulted in the installation of so many additional telephones that the price was later still further reduced. At the present time all city calls cost but a halfpenny, and a working man can have a telephone in his house for the astonishingly low price of \$7.50 a year.

"In spite of all these concessions Glasgow is able to realize a substantial profit. You can imagine from this what enormous profit the telephone company in this city must be making, since it charges

five and ten cents for city calls." The street railway charges are much cheaper in well governed Glasgow than in New York.

The regular charge now is a halfpenny for two miles, one penny for four miles and so on, the maximum beilng twopence halfpenny. Special reductions are made to workingmen during morning and evening hours, and even during lunch time so that they may eat at home if they wish to. Special benefits are extended to women and children during holidays. Wages of employees have been raised. In spite of all these changes the Common Good Fund is enriched by large sums annually from the profits realized by this system.


