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RIOTALISM IN POLITICS

English Electors Take a Rest from Stock Themes and Give Attention to Church.

Leader of Commons Arraigned for His Support of Catholic University Scheme.

Liberals Largely Identifying Themselves with the Movement Against Ritualism.

London, Feb. 4.—British politics on the eve of the re-assembling of parliament show that the old war cry of "No Popery" so long silent, has suddenly burst forth in all its old-time vigor.

How fiercely the people are wrought up was hardly realized until Mr. A. J. Balfour, the movement leader in the House of Commons and first lord of the treasury, perhaps personally the most popular publicist, addressing his constituents at Manchester on Monday last, endeavored to ignore ritualism and re-thrashed the stock themes of politics.

On Wednesday an influential delegation led upon Mr. Balfour and arraigned him for advocating the establishment of a Catholic university in Ireland.

The mass meeting on Monday, which was not representative save in the numbers attending, hooted the names of Lord and the Archbishop of Canterbury.

REGINA VERSUS NICHOL

Trial of the Action Entered Against the Editor of the Province.

Selection of a Jury and Preliminary Sparring Concluded Yesterday.

The trial of Regina vs. Nichol, the proceedings instituted by Messrs. H. F. Nichol, editor of the Province, for criminal libel, was commenced yesterday before Chief Justice McCall and a special jury. The trial was adjourned from the forenoon in London had not then reported. Mr. Charles Wilson, Q.C., and Mr. R. Cassidy appeared for the plaintiff, and Mr. P. C. Davis, Q.C., and Mr. W. H. Langley for the defence.

The court did not sit long yesterday, a very short session being held in the forenoon, and the afternoon session lasting but two hours. The case for the prosecution, however, was closed, they having introduced the full number of challenges allowed, the defence challenging Messrs. J. R. McKenzie, Charles Langford, E. A. Poole, James Angus and the prosecution Messrs. Alexander Wilson, John Piercy, M. Bantley and W. Dickford.

On the first challenge made by the prosecution, Mr. Davis contended that the prosecution must show cause for challenging the witness, and contending that the prosecution had shown cause, Mr. Davis's objection was overruled.

The failure to attend of two jurors, both of whom were required to make up a jury, caused an adjournment for half an hour.

The jury, as finally selected, was composed of the following: Samuel N. Reid (foreman), John Swainson, George P. Webster, John Colquhoun, Ernest A. Harris, G. H. Seelig, Charles N. Cameron, E. A. Morris, George J. Jackson, Wm. Chalmers, Joseph Somers and P. C. Davis.

The indictment was read to the defendant. It includes the whole article published in the Province, numbered 12, referring to the appearance on the direct-orate of mining companies of Messrs. Langford, E. A. Poole, James Angus and the prosecution Messrs. Alexander Wilson, John Piercy, M. Bantley and W. Dickford.

Mr. Davis formally applied for an extension of the time fixed for the return of the verdict, and the court granted him one day after the time set.

Mr. Wilson objected, but the objection was overruled. In order to save the time of the court, Mr. Davis made five admissions to the effect that the article had been published by the defendant Nichol in Victoria; that it was published as set forth in the indictment, and that the parties referred to were Messrs. Turner and Poole, the time premier and president of the company.

Having made these admissions, Mr. Davis said the burden of proof now rests on the defendant, and there was nothing for the prosecution to open with. The Chief Justice then asked the jury to place themselves in the position you might have placed yourself in before entering your verdict. The prosecution then opened the case directly before the Chief Justice, reminding the case until 2 o'clock, remarking that he did not intend to open the case until 2 o'clock.

Mr. Cassidy quoted from the article, commenting on the same in passing, and said there was no doubt as to what the charges meant. He also quoted from the defendant's plea of justification and held that in such a plea the defendant could not justify only parts of the article but the whole article.
