WHAT IS GOING ON IN SPORTING CIRCLES THE WORLD OVER.

The Glass Ball Tournament - Pencil Club at Hamilton-Toronto... Wood of London, with a flying start, made a mile on a bicycle in 2m. 31.2 sec.

The Galveston known was knocked out at the Old Home in the New Home in the Bowers, in two rounds.

The Japanese wrestler has challenged Bibby, through an interpreter, to wrestle, Asiatic style, for \$250 a side.

G. H. Beach opened 200 oysters at Philadelphia 9 min. 30 sec., defeating Frank Cobine fifteen oysters, and winning \$250.

Plunger Walton will go to England early in April, taking with him the well-known jockey, William Donohue, to ride his flyers in some of the big stake races.

Mark Lamb of Newburg, and George Ross, Scotch athlete, wrestled in Cleveland two bouts, and won two catch-as-catch-can. Ross won all but one fall.

George Smith, a professional pedestrian now at Springfield, Mass., says he can run any man in America 75 to 100 yards, for any amount of money from \$1000 to \$5000 a side.

At a chicken dispute near Schenectady fifteen birds were shown on a side. There were ten battles at \$100 each, and \$1500 stood on the main. Albany defeated Troy 15 to 4.

Tom Henry, an Englishman, beat Jim Murray in a hard glove fight in Westchester county, New York, Wednesday. Murray was badly used up. Both were arrested.

Canada has 15,000 lacrosse players, 5000 cricketers, 4000 snowshoers, 3500 cricketers, 2000 football players, 1000 rowing-men, 1000 baseballists, 1000 bicyclists and 10,000 given to other sports. So says a United States exchange, but you mustn't take it for gospel.

The sport of dog racing at Pastime park, Philadelphia, continues to be a very popular amusement among certain classes in the quaker city. Noah Makinson offers \$100 for a 200 yards dog handicap, to take place March 1 and 2, Echo park rules to govern.

During the winter months fishing is not entirely suspended at Lake Hopalong, N.J. Anglers from Newark and elsewhere visit the lake and enjoy good fishing through the ice, the principal being the species of fish most frequently taken, though bass are occasionally caught.

A meeting of the Angler's association of the St. Lawrence will be held during the present month at Utica, N. Y., when a large attendance is expected. The association proposes, in addition to enforcing the laws against net fishing, to devote its energies toward stocking the St. Lawrence with black bass.

The West end rowing club (professionally of Buffalo, Ontario) has 10 members, 100 is the limit. A crew of four, consisting of William Crimmins, William Ware, George McDonald and Dennis Cotter, will go into active training soon. They will represent the club at this summer's aquatic struggles.

The handicap glass ball tournament at Olcott's, Eglington, commenced yesterday and promises to be a success. The majority of the pigeon shooters in Toronto find they have not much to do with glass balls. Mr. J. Bell, who won the Barrie tournament leads the party so far, with a score of 14 out of 20. Shooting will be continued till 10 a. m., to-day. Vans leave the usual places at 9 a. m. and 1.30 p. m.

At the meeting of Hamilton gentlemen interested in the formation of a fencing and boxing club last evening, L. McQueen was elected president. A large number of members of those wishing to become members was handed in. The meeting then adjourned till next week, when the remaining officers will be elected and the question of procuring a suitable room for the purpose discussed.

George Huber, says the London Field, has now won all his late matches with such ease that it is clear he has improved immensely in pace, and his staying powers are of the highest class. Judged by the way in which he rows his opponents down, he is likely to prove a dead sea weight to Wallace Ross, who has to concede him ten seconds at the start of a race for \$200 a side on the March 10. The Putney sculler is not a fast starter, but he should be able to put fifty-five or sixty yards between himself and Ross before the latter gets off, and, as Huber is quite as good a stayer as the New Brunswick sculler, good match may be anticipated.

An Editor Bitten at Billiards. St. Louis, Feb. 22.-A match game of cushion-carrom billiards between T. J. Gallagher, sporting editor of the Globe-Democrat, and Eugene Carter of Cleveland for \$500 a side, 40 points, was played last night at Baldwin's turf exchange. It was won by Carter by a score of 408 to 327. Carter's average was 4 32-92, the best on record. Gallagher's average was 3 54-91.

Racing in England. LONDON, Feb. 22, 1884.-At Sandown park the Sandown grand prize, a hurdle handicap, was won by Mr. T. Cannon's (formerly Mr. Lorrillard's) five year old horse Sackens' Lord Hastings' Zou was second and E. Hobson's Rough Diamond third. The betting was 3 to 1 against Sackens' 9 to 2 against Zou and 8 to 1 against Rough Diamond.

The Sandown grand prize (handicap hurdle race) of 25 sovs. each, 10 furlongs, with 400 yards any winner of a hurdle race, value 100 sovs. After the publication of the weights, to carry 7 lbs.; twice or once of 400 sovs., 12 lbs. extra; the second horse to receive 20 sovs. out of the 25; and the third to save his stake. About 1000 miles over eight furlongs of hurdles; (49 sbs.)
