RECIPROCITY WITH JAMAICA.

The Island Commissioners Address the Beard of Trade. The handsome rotunds of the board of rade was yesterday afternoon filled with

members gathering to hear the distin-guished commissioners from Jamaica on guished commissioners from Jamaica on the matter of established reciprocal trade relations between the island and dominion. The commission comprises Hon. H. H. Hockin (not Hocking, as previously pablished), attorney general; Hon. C. F.

Hockin (not Hocking, as previously pab-lished), sttorney general; Hon. C. F-Farquharson, member of the legislative council; Hon. Richard GHiard, collector-general; and Charles Levy, a prominent mercantile man. They are all of the British type and dress, and apeak with a decided English accent. They were intro-duced by President W. H. Darling and accorded a hearty reception. The commissioners explained their mission in clear if not eloquent speeches. They want a commercial convention between the two colonies of a reciprocal character. The statement of their case may be summarized as follows: Jamica numbers about 600,000 sculs, but bulk of the population exist on fruits, yams and other ground provisions, coupled with sait fish. What is capital? I think every one will agree that by a "capitalist" is meant one whose income consists of the interest or profitearising from the accumulate Lawings. Capital is, therefore, easily defined as this accumulation of savings, or wealth, which is devoted to the production of income. The distinction between capital and other wealth is not a distinction of kind, but of uses.
