

As Sir Edward Watkin said at Westminster Palace, the French company, known by the name of "Submarine Railroad Company," has already spent 2,000,000 francs. This company has for President M. Leon Say, for Vice-President M. Raoul Duval, men who devote their satergies to the success of the scheme. The project of connecting Dover with Calais by a submarine railway is not new. The structure is not to be a suspension bridge but a viaduct, built of stone and iron. The piers will be 30 by 150 feet, and will rise 30 feet above the sea-level. From pier to pier will be a distance of five hundred to six hundred yards, and the weight of the iron works will be about twenty-five thousand tons. I am responsible for a new feature in bridge construction: We do not build half the span from one pier until it meets the other half, but we have a whole span made of iron on store. The Polish National Alliance is a benevolent as well as political organization. While taking care of its sick and dead members, it also labors for the ultimate freedom and independence of Poland. The organization has a special emergency fund, which cannot be touched unless there is a movement tending to liberate Poland which needs pecunifiary support. The constitution says all Poles, regardless of their religious beliefs, can become members. It is this principal of religious toleration that chiefly meets with the antagonism of the American clergy. tional Alliance.
