



THE MILK CAN DISPUTE. Both Sides Lay Their Views Before Con-

There is a dispute between the Milk Producers' Association, composed of farmers, and the Milk Dealers' Association, who and the Milk Dealers' Association, who handle the milk in the city, in regard to a standard can for conveying the milk from the farm to the wagons of the dealers. The farmers are agitating, and have been for years, for a standard eight gallon can stamped by the Government. Mr. Wood, Controller of Inland Revenue, who has charge of this department of the Government, heard a representative delegation of farmers, headed by Mr. Congdon of Etobicoke, at Markham yesterday and listened very carefully to their statement of the case. He pointed out the difficulty that would follow from a can used for transport being declared a measure of capacity, and also that what might be found convenient in the neighborhood of Toronto would prove inconvenient in other parts of the Dominion. He thought, however, that some arrangement could be reached, especially if each can were stanged as holding so many gallons or a multiple of a gallon.

After having heard both sides of the question, owing to the number of intricacies involved, Mr. Wood decided to come back to Toronto in about two weeks, bring Commissioner Miall with him, and hold a joint conference with both the milk producers and the dealers in the city, and to give his very bestendeavors to arrive at a compromise. This seemed to be eminently satisfactory to both sides, and due notice of the meeting will be published in the papers.

An interesting discussion took place between the Controller and the dealers in regard to the methods of analyzing milk pursued by the Dominion Analyst. The dealers showed that it was very hard to define what constituted a test of pure milk, as the milk varied in butter fat and solids under at least four conditions, namely, the breed of cattle, season of the year, class of feeding and locality. Furthermore, they alleged that insome cases it was known to be a fact that the Government analysis did not always agree, though taken from the same sample. 





From every point of view Canada seems to have the advantage. It cannot be long before the superior advantages of our great outlet to the sea are utilized by the people of the Northwestern States. But whether Toronto is to profit by the diversion of the traffic through Canada is another question.

New Style Ferry Bridge.

We commend to the attention of the city engineer a new style of ferry bridge, a cut and description of which appear in another part of this issue. This ferry system has been in operation for a short time in Spain, and so far it works all right. It seems to be the very thing for connecting our Island with the mainland at the Queen's Wharf. If a swing bridge were built it would be an expensive plees of work. 


