It is also understood that ome weeks before Collins was execut ed he pract cally admitted to one of the attendants in the jail that he had taken Miss McAuley's life, but no mention was made of this at the time pending the result of the appeal for clemency in Collins' behalf and of the prisoner's sanity. At the time of the execution Rev. Mr. Thomas was asked as to whether Collins had left a con fession and it should be said in just tice to him that he did not say tha the doomed man had not acknowledge ed the crime, but that he had left no confession for publication.
