## General Summary.

The Ohio report estimates condition is 12 per cent below the general average.

In whale oil the market remains bare of crude with no change in quotations. Bleached is also dull and unchanged.

The reported improvement in the leather industry is confidently expected to increase the trade in nearly all varieties of fieli oils, although at present dealers do not note much change in their business.

In cod oil the demand holds its own, being in no wise improved over last week's report. Newfoundland is quoted at 26c and 27c and domestic almost stationary at 25c in New York.

In sperm whale oil there is an extremely light demand for bleached, and of crude there have been no sales to speak of. The price of crude, owing to the fact that supplies have not been increased, remains nominally at 44c.

In 1892 the visible supply of wheat on March 1st was 23,000,000 bushels, or 20,000,000 bushels, or 20,000,000 bushels less than this season; about July 10, 1891, the visible was 11,805,000 bushels, Minneapolis and Duluth then holding more than half that amount. We perceive no reason why the visible and in visible supply will not be reduced to a very low point the coming summer.

Duluth millers report they have made careful estimate of the amount of wheat tributary to Minneapolis and Duluth to be 35,000,000 bushels, including country elevators and 12,000,000 bushels in farmer's hands; that the two cities and interior mills will require 43,000,000 bushels pror to September 1, 1897. This only leaves 4,000,000 bushels for Eastern shipment and export requirements.

Net-top laces are still excellent property, says a lace importer, particularly in the narrower widths, in six-inch goods and under. The only thing, he continues, is that we can't get them tast enough. It is an excellent lace season with all styles of light effects in laces selling. Veillings are selling well also plain and chemitle dots in face goods. Fancy veils in point d'esprit fancy borders are also popular this season goods with good quantities going forward.

The creditors of J. R. Ayer. Sickville, N. B. have not yet accepted his offer of 30 cents and he has assigned to William Ogden and F. McDongall, of the Merchants Bank of Halifax, Sackville, who have placed Mr. J. M. Baird in charge of the business. The factory has been shut down and over 110 hands thrown out of employment. The e is some talk of forming a joint stock company and several local capitalists have signified their willingness to take stock in the enterprise.

The Allen Seed Company, of Picton have given the farmers notice that they could not pit out a hushel of peas to be grown this year as the McKinley tariff has put a duty of 80 cents a bushel on this seed. The company has paid as high as \$2 a bushel for peas to the farmers in that district, many of whom realized \$1,000 on the sale of the peas. The Allen Seed Company has supply at as much as \$0,000 bushels of seeds to the farmers in Ameliasburg and Hastings county.

The Illinois State report says: "Winter wheat crop in 1896 was 28,000,000; in 1895 it was 19,000,000 bushels." The State Superintendent now estimates the 1897 yield wil not be over 10,000,000.

Minneapolis and Duluth receipts since January 1st have been about 11,000,009 bushels against about 20,000,000 hushels in 1896. Same time Chicago receipts were about 11,000,000 against about 20,000,000

Canada hat year exported 6,221,670 dozens eggs, of which 5,585,725 degree were sent to Great Britain and 894,989 dozens to the United States. Of the total Ostario contributed 2,231,648 degree 3,433,111 dozens, and Nova Scotia 56,739 dozens.

There is every pr spect of a large make of botter in Manitoba and the Northwest Territories this approaching season. Several cheese factories are being changed for the manufacture of butter. An establishment which has turned out 300 and 400 pounds per day last year will double its output this season.

The salt industry around Lake Winni pegeoris may develop into quite a business this aummer. A salt mining outfit was taken to Dauphin last week and will be set in position at once. Manitoba may therefore soon become self sustaining in the matter of salt.

The Calgary Herald declares that it has received information from a reliable source, that the C.P.R. not only intends building a road through the Crow's Nest Pass, but also one through the K-a tensy Pass which is about 50 miles further to the south, and is hesides a much casier pass through which to build.

Owing to the large amount of work to be done on the Cornwall canal, of the St. Lawrence canal system, this spring, by the canal constructors, the water will and continue out until the lat of May, Nearly all the manufacturing establish ments in Cornwall will be closed down for that period.

Fitting out has been begun on the R. & O. fleet, which consists of twenty-four vessels, and two new steamers are to be built for the company. These will not be ready to go into commission, however, until the season of 1898. Most of the R. & O. western fleet are undergoing repairs at Social

Russia's total wheat shipments since January 1st are 12,000,000 bushels, compared with 15.624,000 in 1896 same time. Argentine shipments pastaix weeks were but 880 (40 bushels, against 6,118,000 bushels in 1896. The world's shipments to Europe a year ago averaged about 6,500,000 per week; of late the average is but about half that amount.

Elizabeth Island in Black Lake together with the club hot—and all other buildings thereon was sold at sheriff's sale the past week, the property bringing \$732. This property was owned by the Black Lake Fishing Club, a company of prominent politicians and its sale was the result of disruption among the members.

Inspector Stark, of the Dominion detective department, has received a counterfeit 25 cent coin of the date of 1891. It is made of an alumina alloy, and bears a remarkable resemblance to the genuine article. In rize and workmanship it is almost identical. It is a little light weight, and from this fact its detection will be made comparatively easy. Another way by which the spurious coin can be recognized is a peculiar oily feeling noticed when tubbed between the fingers.

The crop damage report form Illinois as reported received by the Illinois State Board of Agriculture says: The mount of damage is placed at 59 per cent of the area, reducing the tetal area to 682,000 acres for harvest; in many counties it is claimed the entire area will be ploughed up.

The Market Record says:—Instead of 88,000,000 bushels there are probably some 125,000,000 bushels in the farmers' hands, an i, even with that, supplies would be 60,000,000 smaller in all hands on July 1st next than on July 1st, 1896.

The imports into the United K ngdom last week were 2,128,000 bushels of wheat, 3,058,000 corn and 208,000 barrels of flour. The imports and the farmers' deliveries made an aggregate of 4,031,500 bushels for the week's supply, indicating a decrease of 608,500 bushels in the English visible supply.

The State report of Or gon says that farming operations were presented during February with much vig.r. Unusual activity prevailed in sowing more than usual acreage of grain. Winter sown grain was in excellent condition and the weather has been favorable for a success ulyear.

A largely at ended meeting of the farmers of Manitoba, and business men of Birtle was held at Bulah to protest against any further extension of charter or the granting of other privileges to the Great Northwest Central Railway company nless a pledge is given that twenty miles of line will be constructed this year.

In Teron'o the following stocks were sold en bloc:—W. McWh'nney, Allaton, general, \$9.845; M. C. Dale, Mitchell, dry goods, \$5.500; Endico't Bros., Orangeville, general, \$7.500; H. S. Wilcocks. Picton, grozeries, \$6.4-0; J. W. Walker, B-lleville, hardware, \$10.000; Ed. Potts, Toronto, fancy goods, \$1,070.

Some statistics gathered by Sir Julius Vogel show that since 1840 the British Empire has increased in population from 112 100,000 to 306,312 000, while the yearly value of its "foreign" commerce has grown from £49,050,000 to £483,055,000. Compared with that record, the much vaunted development of other nations becomes picayune.

Quite a fleet of steamers has been chartered to load at St. John, N.B., for the other side during sprig and summer at 40 to 42½ shillings. Three Spanish steamers have just been chartered for July, loading at 40 shillings. The rate from ports up the bay is about 42½ shillings. The first vessel to load up the bay for the season arrived at Hop-well cape last week.

Those insurance companies who were interested in the Murray fire have settled with the firm, the amount raid over being \$95,022.70 on a total of \$378,500 insurance carried on property valued \$417,944. A committee, which was appointed by the insurance people to investigate into the probable cause of the fire report that they are unable to arrive at a conclusion thereon.

The catch of lobsters in the Bay of Fundy and around the Yarmouth shore has been small thus far this season. The Yarmouth News states the shipmen's of live lobsters from that pers during the months of January and February of the present year were 4.772 crat s, as against 5.777 crates in the same period of 1896. The amount received for them was \$51.105 this year, compared with \$72,893 in 1896.







The St. Elmo is said to be a true fissure.

The Ruth is shipping a carload of ore a day.

Some fine ore has been struck in the Ajax.

Arlington stock is selling at 12 cents in Spokane.

Twenty men are working on the Wonderful.

The R. E. Lee has shipped two more cars of ore.

Judge Spinks is interested in the Arlington now.

The O. K. mill has treated 929 tons of ore since January.

The Elise mine has been secured by Rossiand parties.

A mill is to be put in at the Cameronian on Lemon creek.

The IX L shipped twelve tons to the smelter last week.

Bruce White has let a contract for 100 feet on the Noontide.

The Canadian has been bonded to C. W. Callaghan for \$10,000.

The Two Friends mine has declared a dividend of 21 per cent.

The Iron Mask has started a new drift and is getting some nice ore.

A rumor that the War Eagle is working off the lead is stoutly denied.

The tunnel of the Victory is now in 140 feet and the face is in good ore.

The west draft of the Iron Mask tunnel is showing steady improvement.

A rich strike has been made in the Edmonton group, 10 mile creek.

Fifty thousand tons are blocked out in

the War Eagle, averaging \$25 a ton.

The C. P. R. will put in a telegraph line from Rossland to Midway very soon.

Work will not be resumed on the Blue-

bird until all the snowslides are down.

Evans Coleman & Evans have an option on the major interest in the Lillie B.

The paystreak in the Payne mine is now four feet wide of clean and high grade ore.

The Heather Bell on Sullivan Creek is turning out splendidly. It has 30 feet of solid ore.

It is reported that a fine ore body has been struck in the Sovereign, on Lookout Mountain.

Cabins are being fitted up at the Crusader, and preparations made to commence work.

It is rumored that the Kansas City Smelting Co. will shortly build smelting works at Nelson.

The Lily B. is improving. As the work progresses on this property the ore is becoming wider and more solid.

Rossland men have protested against the new companies act, asking that mining incorporations be treated separately.

7 Hon, Geo. E. Foster has purchased 10,000 shares of Reco stock at \$1,35 and bunded 10,000 more for sale at Ottawa.

Work will be commenced on the Regins, director of on Springer creek. A test shipment will be sent to the smelter as soon as possible.



A good deal of the responsibility for this state of affairs lies necessarily upon the Board of Directors, whose knowledge of mining is often very superficial, and whose control over the actual management is correspondingly meffective. #### THE BANK STATEMENT.

The statements of the chartered banks for the month of February indicate but little change in the mercantile situation from that ruling during the previous month. What fluctuations are shown are of a trifling character, and it is evident that the business conditions of January extended through the past month also.

Circulation shows an increase of \$201,400 only; but, as this item depends largely upon the movement in agricultural produce-which is always at its lowest level in February -no marked change for the better could be anticipated. In deposits on demand there is a decline of \$1,927,-609. This is also a usual feature in February, as the heavy payments falling due in that month always affect mercantile balances unfavorably. Deposits bearing interest show an increase of a little over half a million on the month, and have now reached the unwieldy figure of \$126,938,000. Conservative bankers would be well pleased to see this amount reduced, now that money is so cheap and plentiful, and opportunities for satisfactory investment so few. Nothing occurred during the month to tempt any considerable volume of stocks out of holders' hands, and as the margin available for speculative purposes is unusually small, brokers preferred to hold off and await developments-more especially as there is every prospect that rates for money will rule low for some time to come.




# DUPLEX SINGLE STEAM POWER PUMPS.

Mr. John Poucher, of the Yonge street arcade, wants tenders for building a farm house 30 miles west of Toronto.

The Montague Mill Co. will erect a building on the site of the old one at an early date to continue clap-board work.

A butter factory is to be added to the industries of Vallevfield. Messes. Geo. M. Loy and D. D. McBain are the promoters.

It is proposed to place a steamer on Br inpton Lake during the coming season to accommodate the numerous visitors to this romantic spot.

Plans have been prepared for a new building to be erected by the Toronto Street Railway Company at the corner of King and Church streets.

The Canadian Pacific Railway on Saturday last, closed a contract with Thea. Tompkins, of Brockville, to build a large hotel for them at Revelstoke, the entrance to the West Kootensy mining country.

Mr. McDonald, of Galt, has made arrangements with the Grand Trunk Railway Company for the lease of property near the Western cattle market, Toronto, on which he will erect an abattoir, to cost form \$15,000 to \$25,000.

Tenders will be received by registered post only, addressed to the Chairman of the Board of Control, City Hall, Toronto, up to noon on Thursday, April 1st, 1837, for the supply of Stationary and Blank Books required by the Corporation of the City of Toronto, for one year from the 1st day of May next.

Darling & Pearson, architels, Toronto, have been commissioned by the solicitors of the Lawlor Estate to prepare plans for the new building to be erected at the north-west corner of King and Yonge sts. The new structure will be five stories, of brick and stone, and fire-proof as far as possible. The cost will be in the neighborhood of \$50,000.

The Building Committee of the Hamilton Board of Education has awarded the following c ntracts for furniture and fittings for the new Collegiate Institute laboratories:—Furniture, Joseph Hoodless & Scn. \$1,415; galvanized iron and copper work, J. E. Riddell, \$165; plumbing and gas fitting, W. J. Walsh, \$277. The contract for blinds has been awarded to Simmons & Evelat \$120, and for motor and fan to Lowe & Farrell, \$155. W. J. Walsh's tender for electric fixtures, \$500. has been socepted.

The Holland and Emery Co., of East Tawas, Mich., will commence to move their targe mill from East Tawas to Byng Inlet, Ontario, as soon as the ice leaves the bay.

The Ottawa Gold Milling and Mining Co. propose to erect a large stamp mill at Keewatin. The promoters, among whom are John Mather and A. W. Fraser, of Ottawa, propose to expend \$100,000.

A permit has been granted C. Evans, 436 Markham street, Toronto, for the exection of a two-storey brick house on the west side of St. George street, near Sussex avenue, to cost \$6,000.

From the frequent talks of building this season which are heard about Neepawa it is concluded that from \$50,000 to \$70,000 will be expended. Several husiness blocks on the avenue and residences for rent are proposed.

Mr. T. A. Keynedy of Toronto will have the contract for the erection of a block at Wabigoon, which will be built to suit the requirements of a bank and the postoffice. The other stores are intended for general business purposes.

A Kaslo despatch says the owners of the Montezuma have decided to build a concentrator and have about arranged for its construction. Work upon it will be commenced as soon as a road can be made for hauling the machinery and materials to the ground.

Calgary is the latest aspirant for a smelter and an influential deputation is arranging to wait on the mayor to urge the erection of a smelter there by the Horne-Payne syndicate which is said to be looking for a suitable point for shipments of ore.

G. S. Martin, of Athenia, Oregon, has made arrangements with the citizens of Wild Horse, on the Nelson & Fort Sheppard railway to put in a weekly newspaper, the first number of which will appear in about ten days or two weeks. It is to be called the Salmon River Review.

The Vancouver council has decided to adopt the recommendation of the especially appointed committee to accept the offer of the English syndicate represented by one of the Rothschilds, to build a smelter in Vancouver to cost \$750,000 and capable of treating 500 tons a day, for exemption from taxation and free water. The free water will represent an expenditure of \$50,000 for a new main. The site has been chosen and it is thought that the smelter will be running within eight months, as the people will be sure to carry the by-law with a large majority.

During the past few days the Citizens' Committee of Goderich, has been busily engaged negotiating with several steamboat lines, with a view of placing a line of really first-class boats between Cleveland and Sault Sta. Marie, calling at Tolado, Detroit, Windsor, Sarnia, Port Huron, Goderich, Kincardine, Southampton and all ports on the north channel of the Georgian Bay.

A petition which will contain the signatures of several hundred owners of property in and about Wabigoon is being prepared to be sent to the Post-master General, asking for the establishment of a post-flice at Wabigoon, and the Wabigoon Land Agency has offered to fit up one of the stores in a new block, rent free, for the department.

A Nelson despatch states that Civil Engineer Perry, in charge of the location survey of the Crow's Nest Pass railway along Kostenay Lake reports his work completed to within 10 miles of Balfour. He has gone to Slocan City to superintend the construction of the Slocan river branch, more especially the wharves at different points on Slocan Lake.

A new building company has been formed in Summerside, P.E.I., and they expect to build their mill on the land opposite Mr. Ronald Campbell's steam grist mill at the east end of the town Some of the members of the company are; Mesers. Nathan McFarlane, Geo. W. Robinson (Clark's Mills), E. H. Wright Clarence Jones, Thos. Hudson, Geo. Easter (Wilnot), D. Kirk, Jos. Brehaut and W. Waugh.

It is asserted that the Government has awarded the contract for the fast Atlantic Line for a period of ten years to the first of Messas. Peterson, Tait & Company of Newcastle. 




