"Cardinal Vaughan."
Sir,-In a recent issue you refer
to the never varying fidelity of the
family of Vaughan, of Courtield, to
the Catholic Church. They have
also been conspicuous for their loy-
alty to the exiled Royal House.
Between 1745 and 1747 nearly 3oo
Jacobites in all ranks of life suffer-
ed upon the scaffold or the gallows
for their adherence to their lawful
Sovereign. In 1747, having become
somewhat ashamed of themselves,
Parliament, passed an Act of Am-
nesty. But even then some 85 per-
sons were by name excluded from
the benefit of the Act, and among
them the only English name is that
of William Vaughan, of Courtfield.
The family is fortunately in no im-
mediate likelihood of extinction, as
the late Cardinal's brother, who re-
sides at Courtfield, has several
children, of whom the eldest is, I
believe, Mr. C. J. Vaughan, of the
7 th Dragoon Guards. That the late
Cardinal was eminently fitted to

| THE MANITOBA SCHOOL QUESTION. <br> The movement lately set on foot the minority of Winnipeg seems have added a new vim to the atholics' persevering efforts in demanding the restoration of their chool rights in Manitoba. It has lso brought to light details so far autiously kept hidden from the ublic. Nobody, at least among the atholics of the province, had enrtained, the least suspicion that he school settlement arrived at beween the Federal and Local authcities was a final one. That mysrious cloud which has kept hoverg over our heads ever since 1897 as at last burst out, and we are entering an altogether new hase of the question. <br> The settlement, it is true,-for we W have the documentary evience of it all-has been signed as al by both Sir Wilfrid Laurier as presentative of the Federal Govnment, and the Hon. Clifford Sifn, acting on behalf of the Local overnment, but we claim that it nnot be final. Had the matter sted solely between the two govmments, we might perhaps have submit to the worse for the time ing, as of the two political wers now ruling neither seem to willing to undertake the redress our grievances, but what a difrent light is thrown on the whole bject when we look to the judgent of their lordships of the Privy Cuncil. <br> That judgment clearly sets forth at the minority of the province $s$ suffered a grievance by the hool Act of 1890 , and instruction given to the Governot-GeineralCouncil to see that such a grievce be redressed. Therefore, we ve a right to pray that justice be ne, and that right holds good til justice is done. <br> But it is now more than ever arly proved by facts that the setment of 1897, although it added me new features to the School $t$ of 1890 , did in no way redress grievance. <br> It may be argued perhaps that nnipeg is the only place where grievance still exists. Were that be granted, we would still be in position to ask why it is that redress did not begin, as it ould, at the very centre of educan in the Province, for Winnipeg ne has always and still does resent at least the one-fifth of Catholic school popalation of initoti, But Winnipeg is not ne to suffer.
