After an Address from the Chairman, and the reading of an Abstract of the Report by the Secretary, the Rev. C. DEWOLFE, A. M. ; the following Resolutions were unanimously adopted :—

Moved by Rev. J. TOMKINS, seconded by Rev. J. BROCK,

I.—That the Report, an abstract of which has been read, be adopted, printed, and circulated under the direction of the Committee.

Moved by Rev. J. C. DAVIDSON, seconded by Rev. J. BORLAND,

II.—That this Auxiliary, while it rejoices in all the good that has been done by other Evangelical Societies, would especially record its gratitude to Almighty God, for his continued sanction and blessing to the operations of our own Society, and would earnestly implore a more copious outpouring of the Holy Ghost, "the Author and Giver of life," upon all the Missions of the Christian Church.

REPORT.

THE return of another Anniversary calls for renewed expressions of gratitude to the Almighty for his continued blessing on the Parent Society and its Auxiliaries. The past year has not been unattended with trials of various kinds to the friends of Wesleyan Missions, but amidst the trials so much of Divine support has been enjoyed, that we may well sing of mercy rather than of judgment.

The attachment of many of the contributors to this Institution has been evinced by increased donations, and the cause itself has made, in some parts of the Mission field, very delightful and marked advancement. Comparatively few of our valued Missionaries have been removed from their posts of usefulness by sickness or death, though some have been placed in scenes of fearful and extensive mortality. The income of the Parent Society for the year ending December, 1850, was £104,661 15s. 4d. And though it was reasonably expected, (considering the very extraordinary amount of legacies received during the preceding year, in connexion with the large amount of *special* donations then spontaneously offered,) that the aggregate *ordinary* contributions of 1850 would not fully equal those of 1849, they do, we believe, present an increase of more than £534 over the income of 1848. The income of this Auxiliary for this year has been nearly equal to that of the preceding; and it is sincerely hoped that by the circulation of Missionary intelligence among our people to a greater extent than before, the funds will increase both at home and abroad, that this great Society may be enabled more fully to embrace the various fields of usefulness that now open and widen to the view of the Christian Missionary.

The Wesleyan Missionary Society differs from some other great Missionary Societies in the larger extent of the field it attempts to cultivate, and consequently in the greater amount of responsibility which it assumes. It is at once an Irish Society, a

Continental Society, a Colonial Missionary Society, and a Society for Missions in heathen lands. Each of these departments might, with propriety, claim a separate interest and a distinct Committee and Executive, as is the case with some other departments of the Church of Christ in England. But it has been the aim of the Conference to concentrate and harmonize the whole of these large interests and responsibilities under one economical management and direction.

We now proceed to give a brief review of the operations of the Society for the past year, but would most urgently press on all, who wish for detailed and interesting information on this subject the perusal of the large Report and of the monthly notices.

EUROPE.

Ireland is still the scene of great commotion, arising from various causes which have been long in existence, and particularly at this crisis, from the interest taken in the Anti-Papal struggle in England. Our Missionaries have, in most places, been allowed to pursue their evangelical work without serious molestation, except in some few districts, where the rabid fury of the Romish population has been aroused against them by the priesthood. It is highly gratifying to learn that some thousands of Romanists in various parts of Ireland have, during the past year, abandoned their hereditary superstitions, and embraced "the faith once delivered to the saints." Among this happy number are found some of the Priests.

Though political matters present a clouded aspect in France, our Missions continue to extend their influence, and as the number of pious ministers in the National Protestant Church is on the increase, and the Bible has free circulation, it is hoped that there are blessings in store for this people, that will shortly be dispensed among them in all the comforts of a pure and undefiled religion. The Mission among the Waldenses, to which reference was made in last year's Report, has been continued; and the Mission in Switzerland promises to be a fountain from which living waters shall flow to refresh the valleys of Popish Italy.

The German work is efficiently conducted by Mr. Müller, who, aided by sixteen coadjutors, holds religious services weekly at about sixty places. This work is likely to be very important in its results, and is sustained with a very small outlay from the Committee; the sum expended last year from the General Fund being only £55 19s. The Gibraltar station is spoken of as yielding promise of future good, especially in the Spanish department. Mr. Altor has been actively engaged in visiting from house to house among the Spaniards, and thus disseminating the word of life.

ASIA.

The accounts from Ceylon are highly encouraging. In the Southern part of the Island within the last two years 8 new chapels have been erected, and the members in Society are over 1,200, chiefly native converts. In North Ceylon, lectures on Hinduism have been delivered by the priests in the temple of Siva, with a vain attempt to arrest the progress of light. The Ceylon Mission has an interest of its own, both present and prospective. "Budhism is the most gigantic form of error with which the Society has to contend. But the Southern District of Ceylon is at once its cradle and its strength. Strike it here, the wound will be felt to its very centre. Budhism is a connected system; its doings in other lands are reported here, and occurrences in this land are told in the courts of kings in Siam and Burmah, and travel wherever its connected machinery is found. The progress and triumph of Christianity here would tell in every part of the system, and be a prelude to its entire downfall. Prospectively also this Mission has an interest—it is the first-fruits to all future Missions of the Society in Budhist lands. The Budhism of China is only a reflection of that of Ceylon, which was its source. The Missionaries on the Continent of India have the task of contending with Heathenism in its most subtle and injurious forms; but there are signs of promise, and we invite attention to the following letter from the Rev. John Pinkney of Negapatam.

"You will doubtless be glad to hear that we are getting on in this part of the great Mission field. Though we are not permitted

to see many forsaking the worship of imaginary deities for the worship of the one true and living God, yet we cannot but think that a brighter day is about to dawn upon this benighted country. Hitherto the Hindoo, by the abandonment of the religion of his forefathers, and by a cordial reception of Christianity, has been liable to the loss of the property which he possessed previously to his conversion; but it affords me unspeakable pleasure to be able to state that this law has been abolished, and the Act for the establishment of liberty of conscience has become the law of the land. The editor of the "Friend of India," in an article on this subject, says, 'The Act for the Establishment of Liberty of Conscience became the law of the land on the 11th of April, 1850, a day which will be as memorable in the annals of British India as the 4th of December, 1829, when the rite of suttee was abolished, and, for the first time in twenty centuries, 'the Ganges flowed unbloodied to the Sea.' Henceforward every man throughout India will be at liberty to profess whatever creed his conscience may incline him to, without being reduced to beggary through the instrumentality of the courts of justice. The inestimable value of this boon will be at once seen by a reference to the law of the land as it previously stood, and which was thus expounded by Sir William Macnaughten: 'Whatever property the individual, previously to his conversion, was possessed of, will devolve on his nearest of kin who professes the Hindoo religion.' It was impossible that so monstrous a violation of the first principles of religious liberty could continue to be tolerated under the enlightened Government of Britain in the middle of the nineteenth century; and the wonder is, not that it has been abolished now, but that it was not abolished before. One of the effects of this new law will be to remove all penalties from the profession of Christianity; and it is possible that when the profession of that creed becomes safe, it may also become more common.'

"I know you will rejoice with us at this important change, which I cannot but regard as a token of the future triumph of Christianity. Another encouraging circumstance to which I would refer, is the determination of the Committee of the Madras Auxiliary Bible Society to give to the whole population of

Southern India a portion of God's blessed word, at the suggestion of the Rev. William Arthur. At first the Committee regarded Mr. Arthur's proposal as impracticable; but they thought much more might be done to increase the circulation of the Scriptures among the Christian, Mahomedan, and Heathen population of Southern India. They resolved to print large editions of the Gospel by Luke and the Acts of the Apostles in Tamul, Telugu, and Hindustani, especially for the Heathen population; and also to apply to the Parent Society for permission to draw upon them to the extent of £1,500 in the coming three years. In a letter recently received from the Parent Society, they have most cheerfully granted that request of the Committee. The Rev. W. Porter, the Secretary, has since written to me to ascertain in what way and to what extent I can aid them in carrying out this glorious design. I have written to the Committee, and expressed my great pleasure in having an opportunity of co-operating with them in a work of so much importance to the welfare of thousands around us, who are perishing for lack of knowledge. Colporteurs will be employed to visit the towns and villages in each District, and to furnish those who are able to read with portions of the Bible. This, also, we regard as a pledge of prosperity. Such a step seems most opportune at the present crisis. The Jesuits, as you are aware, have established themselves in Negapatam, and it is their intention to imbue the minds of the natives with the principles of Romanism. The circulation of the Scriptures will, in a great measure, I trust, counteract their pernicious influence.

"In this Circuit we are endeavouring, to the best of our ability, to spread abroad the knowledge of Christ and Him crucified. We have services in the streets of Negapatam almost every day. On these occasions we distribute tracts, with which the Madras Tract and Book Society have supplied us; and we trust that these silent monitors will tend to lessen the prejudices of the people, and prepare them for the reception of the Gospel of our Redeemer. We beg to be remembered in your prayers. You are not ignorant of the difficulties with which we have to contend in this seat of Satan's empire. The certainty of victory nerves our arm for the conflict. The Gospel which it is our privilege to make known

to this people shall, ere long, be embraced by thousands who are now the slaves of a degraded superstition."

Gladly would we refer to other departments of the work in Asia, especially in Australia, did the limits of this Report admit, but even at the risk of occupying a little more than the usual space we cannot withhold the following letter from the son of the late lamented and devoted Waterhouse:—

"On December 14th, when in South Australia, I received a letter from the Rev. Walter Lawry, urging me to proceed as soon as convenient to New-Zealand, *viâ* Hobart-Town, in order that I might take the first opportunity that might present itself of embarking from Auckland for Feejee. From the bereaved state of that Mission, I felt it my duty to comply with Mr. Lawry's request; and in six days I was on board the vessel which conveyed me hither. On the morning of the day of my departure from Adelaide, I attended a breakfast, to which the officers of the church had invited me and some of my personal friends. I seized the opportunity of pleading for poor Feejee; and suggested that the company present should engage to subscribe, at least, £50 sterling per annum for five years. To my great joy £86 were raised in this manner.

"Since my arrival in this island, I have, at the pressing request of the friends, attended the Missionary Meetings in Launceston, Longford, Evandale, Westbury, Campbell-Town, Ross, and Oatlands; and have been much encouraged by the interest which has been re-awakened in the Feejee Mission. In the course of my journeys, I have often been deeply affected at the remembrance that I was visiting the very spots in which my late father engaged in his last public acts. I felt deeply as I entered the chapel in which he made his last Missionary speech; and I was thankful to hear many a deep sigh ascend from amidst the congregation as I advocated the cause which lay so near his heart, and which he has bequeathed to me,—that of cannibal Feejee. My departed parent went home from that place of worship to die. By the grace and providence of God, I go to Feejee to devote myself, unreservedly, to the responsible, but sublime, and heavenly, work of preaching Christ crucified to the Anthropophagi of Polynesia. May the God of my father bless my labours abundantly!

"I hope to sail for Auckland early in April. I trust my honoured fathers will not forget to pray for their unworthy son in the Gospel."

The king of Lakemba, one of the Feejee Islands, has professed Christianity, and with him several of his influential friends, and people who had long stood out against the calls of the Gospel.

Indeed the work among the Feejees presents one of the most striking episodes in the history of Modern Missions, and we subjoin the following extract, as another proof of the humanizing effects of the Gospel among the most barbarous and savage of the human family. Mr. Calvert says:—

"Since I last wrote, Elijah and I have interceded with Tui Viti for the lives of the people of the town doomed to death. He consented for the removal of all the people to Vewa, and undertook to spare their lives. The day for their removal was fixed, and Elijah borrowed three large canoes of Tui Viti, and several small vessels of foreigners; but the people of the town feared to risk their lives. Several have lately begged to be brought here. I suppose about fifty have arrived; and, should the attack on the town be delayed, I yet hope for the removal of all to this refuge. I preached at Bau last Sunday in one of Tui Viti's houses, to some visitors from Lakemba. I was surprised at the attendance of many Bau women, who still maintain their profession of Christianity, though we have not had preaching at Bau for many months, having been prevented by a brother of the Chief. The Chief complained of the bad conduct of some of his women who are professedly Christian. I said they ought to have a Teacher.

"A few days ago we were surprised to learn that the Chief of Lavuka, Ovalau, (where many white men reside,) had abandoned Heathenism. A few weeks ago I sent a Teacher to instruct the children and wives of white men. The Chief then was angry, and said he would leave his town if the white men would not send the Vewa Teacher away. He soon became reconciled to the Teacher's remaining; and has now, with many of his people, attached himself to us, opened his house for preaching, and has sent to me desiring that a Missionary may reside in his town, so that the Teachers may be spared to the towns which are subject to him. Here we have a piece of ground bought by the Purser

of the American Exploring Expedition, and given to the Mission. The Chief is an influential man, and another intimate friend of Tui Viti. I trust that peace will be fully restored in that long-contending island.

“I was much pleased with my visit to Lakemba. The blessing of the Lord has abundantly rested upon the labours of my successors, Messrs. Watsford and Lyth, and my colleague, Mr. Malvern. The change and improvement were very manifest. It was a great cause of rejoicing to me to worship with the King and people among and for whom I so long laboured. The appearance of the large school of children was most pleasing.

“On the visit of the Somosomo people to Bau, only one person was cooked by them. Besides that, some pieces of three sent by the Chief of Lavuka, (now *lotu*,) were brought cooked from Ovalau. Tui Viti promised the Commander of H. M. S. the ‘Bramble,’ that he would not have any more killed for eating; and though he would not promise to bury any that might be brought from a distance during the stay of the Somosomo people, yet he engaged that, after their departure, any that might be brought without his knowledge of their murder should be buried. The urgent entreaties of the Commanders of ships of war who have visited Feejee, have had a powerful effect on the mind of the Chief, showing him that their practices are most disgraceful.”

In the FRIENDLY ISLANDS a great work of God has begun, and an influential Chief of the island of Mua has recently embraced Christianity. The Missionary observes:—

“We have been pleased to witness one mark of improvement in the members of our Societies; that is, their willingness to do something more towards the cause of God, both among themselves and in the world at large. In our quarterly visitations of the classes, we have urged upon the members the duty of doing more towards the support of the work of God; and some have given two, three, four, or even ten yams when they received their quarterly-ticket, and others have given from one quart to four gallons of cocoa-nut oil: so that you will find there is a considerable sum brought forward as class and quarterly money. In this respect our brethren at the Haabais have done the best, and deserve all praise. Perhaps five tons of oil have been made in the Haabai

Circuit during the past year; but most of it has not yet been disposed of. You will see from our Minutes, that we have made a calculation as to what we think may be collected in the way of oil. But before we can do much in this way, we must be supplied with tanks in which to put the oil, and then we must have some means of taking it to a market; and if we took it to any market but an English market, we should generally have to sell it for half its value. We have, therefore, recommended, in conjunction with the General Visitor and the Captain, that the 'John Wesley' be allowed to visit England every four years. We have often felt, when the 'John Williams' has returned home, and has taken so much oil and arrow-root, and has added so much to the funds of the London Missionary Society, somewhat ashamed that we could not have the same means of sending something which would tell upon the minds of the Christian public. Now we seem to be doing nothing; but that is not the case. We are doing something in our quarterly subscriptions, &c. The yams which the members give for their tickets are put into our store, and we buy them from the Society; so you will find in our Circuit Accounts so much taken out of store by the brethren in yams, books, &c. I do not say that all has been done in this way which might have been done; but we are determined to put our shoulders to the work. We see that the claims of the world demand this from us, and demand from the members of the churches in every part of the civilized world, that they do more towards sending the Gospel into all the world to meet the necessities of perishing men. We hope you will allow the vessel to return home, to bring us out tanks for our oil, and then to take the collections of the infant churches in these seas, and pour them into the treasury at home, that they may aid you in benefiting the world.

"During our District-Meeting we held a Missionary Meeting at Neiafu, and a most interesting time it was. The chapel was well filled, even to overflowing; and every one, even the children, seemed to partake in the general feeling of delight which was manifested on the occasion. Most of the assembly were clothed in European garments. The men had shirts and waistcoats on, and some few appeared in coats. The women appeared quite respectable, and joy beamed in every countenance. It was quite

a treat to have with us so many of our brethren from Tonga and Haabai, and the General Visitor. At Mr. Lawry's request the people brought shells, and a few other curiosities, to be taken to England; and the people came forward cheerfully to throw in their mite. There were about fourteen casks and cases of shells collected on the occasion, and four pounds in money. Just before the vessel came in, we had begun to have our Missionary Meetings in different parts of the Circuit, and the people came forward very liberally with yams, fowls, oil, gatu, and pigs. These will be sold for what they will fetch, and the money handed over to the Missionary Society. We feel the want of money on these occasions, as the people have to make their subscriptions in yams, &c., which gives the Missionaries much extra trouble. It is somewhat novel also, in giving tickets, when saying to each, 'What can you give towards the cause of God?' to be answered, 'One, two, or five yams, or oil,' &c., and to mark it so in the class-book. But, like our friends in England, we have to try all fair means to raise money to benefit the world. For though this seems more especially for the church, yet wherever a church is established there are the ordinances and the sacraments to be administered, and these all benefit the world at large."

AFRICA.

The Missions in Southern and Western Africa have continued to rise in interest and importance, but they are so extensive and diversified, as to render the task of selecting information difficult. The Report from Cape-Town is very satisfactory, both in reference to the general work and the state of the schools. War has, we lament to say, recently occurred among the Kaffirs.

"We have no doubt that the Missionaries and their families and churches, who are again afflicted with the proximity of war, will be remembered by the friends of Missions in their intercessions at the throne of grace. We have intelligence from Graham's-Town to the 25th of January. At that time our Missionaries and their families, through Divine mercy, were unhurt; and each Mission Station had supplied a band of Kaffirs and Fingoes for the defence of the colony, whose conduct had called forth the

public commendation of the Governor, Sir Harry Smith. One of the Stations, Fort-Beaufort, had been the scene of war. But Mr. Ayliffe and his family remained at their post of duty, and were uninjured. There had also been attempts at robbery near D'Urban, Fort-Peddie. The Native Chiefs Pato at Mount Coke, and Krelit at Butterworth, remained faithful to the British Government. The 7th of February had been appointed as a day of special humiliation and prayer throughout all the Wesleyan congregations in the eastern provinces, and a collection was to be made for the relief of widows and orphans, and others, whom the war had plunged into distress.

"In Kaffraria, at Butterworth, the effect of the faithful ministration of the Gospel has been, in part, seen in the admission of Thirty persons into the Church by baptism. The service was rendered especially interesting by the public profession of one of the counsellors of the Chief Rili, who was one of the number thus received within the Christian pale. This individual was one of those who were sent to recall the Missionaries after the former war; and since that period he has resided at the Station, and manifested 'a spirit highly becoming his situation.' The choice which he has made involves him in persecution from his kindred, and separation from his heathen wife; but 'none of these things move him.' The baptismal service was accompanied by a very gracious and hallowing influence. At *Faku's* great place, a public religious service is now held every fortnight, under encouraging circumstances. One of the brothers of *Faku* died some time since, as it is believed, 'in the Lord.' He had become a resident near the Station, and invited the Missionaries to make his village one of their regular Preaching-places. He became much afflicted, and in his affliction called upon God. He often sent for the Missionary and Native Preachers to converse with them about 'that Saviour who died for Sinners.' For three days, the principal men of his tribe endeavoured to persuade him to send for the 'Witch-Doctor,' to ascertain the cause of his illness, with the view of having those murdered on whom the charge of bewitching him should be fixed; 'but no argument could induce him to consent;' and a little before he died, he charged his sons to take care that no man should be killed on his

account: 'For,' he said, 'I am a man of the word of God.' The wife of one of the Native Teachers, who, when young, suffered severe injuries under a charge of witchcraft, from which she never fully recovered, has also died in great peace and holy triumph at the Station during the year. It is further reported, that about sixteen other persons, who had been marked out for death on charges of witchcraft, have been kindly advised by their Chief to take their property and flee to the Mission Station for protection. They have, in consequence, become residents, and some of them are already 'sincere seekers of salvation.' Every Mission-house in Kaffraria is thus a house of mercy for the body as well as the soul.

"By letters from the Rev. James Cameron, dated December 6th, 1850, and January 11th, 1851, we learn that the Missions in that country are much disturbed and injured by war among the native tribes. The two Mission Stations, Mirametsu and Umpukane, have been destroyed by a marauding party, and four thousand head of cattle stolen. One of the Missionaries, Mr. Ludorf, being thus set at liberty, has proceeded further into the interior to the Barolongs, who some time ago migrated from the Thaba Unchu Station, and have ever since been importunate in their entreaties for a Missionary. Mr. Cameron says, 'He left Bloom Fontein last Monday. Trials, doubtless, await him; but what African Missionary is without trials? They go forth weeping, bearing precious seed, having little to cheer them but the hope of coming again rejoicing, bringing their sheaves with them.' Brethren in this part of the Mission-field have a special demand on the sympathies and prayers of the church at home."

The Mission at Sierra-Leone continues to enjoy much prosperity. A Missionary recently sent to that very interesting field of labour, thus writes to the Committee, of his impressions the first time he preached to the coloured people:

"This night I shall never forget: the sight of the coloured people, together with their singing, and their order in God's house, caused me to drop a tear of joy, while I thought, 'What hath God wrought!' The Missionaries, under the Divine blessing, have done great things in this part of the world,—far greater than I expected, from what I have heard and read. To God be

all the praise! On Sunday morning I preached to more than a thousand people. The chapel could not hold them, so they were obliged to remain in the sun. We want larger chapels here; some of our chapels will not contain the members of our Society; but from what I have already seen, I am led to hope we shall soon have them. With the co-operation of our people, and the blessing of God, we must succeed. The Rev. Mr. Edney has already made a move in the right direction with reference to the Buxton chapel. We have had one Committee Meeting with reference to this chapel, and a very good one it was. Ever since, money has been coming in from every direction. We intend to have a bazaar after Christmas, which will be the first ever held in Sierra-Leone. I trust that it will accomplish the end for which it is designed: the people are taking it up in good earnest. On Sunday evening I preached to a large congregation from Isaiah xlv. 22: 'Look unto me, and be ye saved, all the ends of the earth: for I am God, and there is none else.'

"With reference to Sierra-Leone,—its town, its people, and the climate, I must say that I am agreeably disappointed; everything exceeds my expectation, except the chapels. The town is better than I thought it was; the people, also, are better; and, with reference to the climate, time and experience will prove what that is also. I think that I shall have my health here. At present, I am quite well, and so are my brethren. The work of the Missionaries here is great, as it is in all other parts of the world. I feel my weakness; but with the help and blessing of God, I trust that I shall be made a blessing to this people. I feel that I am in the path of Providence; and I can say, at the present time, that I have no other aim than the glory of God, and the salvation of men."

At the Gambia there are evidences of progress. The schools are large, the society peaceful and flourishing, and the services rendered seasons of grace and refreshing. Several conversions have taken place lately. A Krooman—one of a class thought by some to be almost beyond the reach of the gospel—has been awakened, and experienced the efficacy of that blood which "can make the foulest clean." We regret to have to report the death of Sir William Winniett, the late Governor-in-Chief of the British

Dependencies at the Gold Coast. Mr. Freeman thus refers to his lamented death :

“ The melancholy event took place at James-Town, or what was called, until the recent purchase of the Danish settlements, British Akrah, on Saturday, the 24th of November last.

“ The proximate cause of Sir William’s death was dysentery, brought on by excessive fatigue sustained by him while conducting an expedition from Cape-Coast-Castle to Adda, a place in the newly-acquired territory ; the people of which had refused to give up to public justice an individual who had been guilty of murder.

“ The expedition was, happily, bloodless and successful ; but, in the fatigue of long journeys by land down the Coast, from Christiansberg-Castle to Adda, and back, his constitution received a shock, from which he never recovered.

“ In the death of Sir William Winniett our Missions have lost a warm friend and patron, who, on every and all occasions, manifested a most sincere interest in their prosperity. The welfare of our distant Stations, beyond the reach of his every-day observation, was often the subject of interested inquiry on his part, when, on my return from visits which I had made to them, I used to call at the Castle to pay my respects to him ; and after the departure of the Colonial Chaplain for England, some months back, on account of domestic affliction, the interesting scene was often witnessed in Cape-Coast, of the Governor-in-Chief mingling with the native congregation, in our chapel, in acts of Divine worship on the Sabbath-day ; and, in that most effectual of all modes, giving countenance to our Missionary operations.

“ Active and energetic, far beyond what might have been expected from his advanced age, in the discharge of his duties as Governor-in-Chief ; dignified in deportment, but always accessible ; he has left behind him, upon the native mind generally, a deep and salutary impression ; and in our family at the Mission-house here, his memory will be cherished with many deeply-gratifying reminiscences. We deeply sympathize with his bereaved Lady and family in the severe loss they have sustained.

“ Our old and tried friend, Mr. Bannerman, now occupies the position of Lieutenant-Governor.”

AMERICA.

The Reports from the West Indies present some startling accounts of the awful ravages of the cholera, which visitation has not been in vain, however, as will be seen from the subjoined letter :—

“ The cholera, which had been long talked of and much dreaded, but by none prepared for, made its appearance at Port-Royal early in the month of October last. It soon passed over to Kingston, where, for several weeks, it raged with fearful violence, and then, gradually subsiding, passed on to other places, east and west, and is now doing its work of destruction at the extremities of the island.

“ To convey anything like a just impression of the scenes that transpired, of the feelings that were experienced, of the consternation that prevailed, and of the efforts that were put forth by the intelligent and influential, while the epidemic was raging in Kingston, would be impossible. From two or three per day the number of deaths rapidly rose to a hundred, a hundred and fifty, and, on one day, it is said two hundred and eighty interments took place, and this in a population of not more than forty thousand. The dead-carts might be seen in all directions bearing the fallen to the different places of interment, while medical gentlemen, and Ministers of religion, and the visitors of the Merchants’ Benevolent Society, were going from house to house, inquiring for the sick and necessitous, and ministering to their wants. One scene that I witnessed can never be erased from my memory. It was at a house of ill fame which, in company with the Rev. Mr. Oughton, Dr. Allman, and one or two other gentlemen, I visited, having been informed that the inmates were in a fearful state. In that wretched abode we counted not fewer than fourteen females, most of whom were in the last stages of the disease ; and there was one seated in a chair, her head reclining on a table, whom, when we came to touch, we found dead, and stiff, and cold. O how terrible are the judgments of God ! For a time little or no business was attended to, and even the means of grace were comparatively neglected, such was the consternation that prevailed. The whole has now passed away like a fearful dream,

and things are again wearing their wonted aspect. Our loss of members in this Circuit during the prevalence of the appalling scourge has been great; for, besides those who died of other diseases, four hundred and twenty-five have fallen by the cholera alone, of whom twenty-seven were Leaders. The loss of so many members, together with the general, though temporary, stagnation of trade, very seriously affected our receipts; and, at the December Quarterly-Meeting, the account presented a deficiency of some £94. An effort is being made, if possible, to raise this sum, and upwards of £60 have already been realized. We are anxious to keep the Circuit self-supporting, if possible. Matters throughout the Circuit are, I am happy to say, again looking up. Our congregations have greatly improved, and four hundred and forty-four were reported on trial for membership at our December Quarterly Meeting."

Another Missionary writes that he never, during seven years in Jamaica, witnessed such attention to the Word of God as of late, nor ever saw more evident indications of the approach of a general revival of religion. We have reason to hope, and believe that these old and interesting Missions are about to receive special tokens of God's mercy "according to the days wherein they have been afflicted."

The accounts from the Indian Missions of Upper Canada shew that a great and glorious work of evangelization and civilization is in progress among many tribes of the Aborigines.

In Newfoundland the scattered Missionaries of the Society continue to pursue their holy work, not without privations and difficulties arising from climate, want of travelling facilities, the isolation of the settlements, and, in some places, the virulent activity of the emissaries of Popery, but amidst them all the Lord makes his word to run very swiftly. Very gracious and extensive revivals of religion have been experienced during the past winter in Montreal, St. John, New Brunswick, and Charlotte-Town, and in many other parts seasons of refreshing have been enjoyed, and "much people added unto the Lord."

CONCLUSION.

If any godly man saw a great work of grace in progress in his own neighbourhood, the ignorant instructed, the profligate reclaimed, sinners converted, the church enlarged, joy and happiness diffused around, and God glorified, would he not give, out of his plenty, or, if poor, out of his poverty, to maintain the agency by which such a work is carried on? Let him only see the work, let him see its progress and results, and its claim on him would be irresistible. No consideration of indulgence, or of penury, would prevent his practical interest in it: "Let my right hand forget her cunning," he would say, "and let my tongue cleave to the roof of my mouth, if I prefer not Jerusalem above my chief joy." But this work is as really going on by the agency of Missions, among the most depraved and barbarous and idolatrous of men, as if we saw it with our own eyes. The African, and the American Indian, are enlightened by the Gospel. The Feejee Islanders are won from their cannibal propensities, and are living in holy love and joy. The Singhalese and Hindoos cast away their idols. God's word has free course, and is glorified. In Jamaica alone Three Thousand Five Hundred persons have been received on trial, for Christian fellowship, since the awful visitation of the Cholera in October last! Let it be known that many thousand persons are every year added to the living church of Christ on earth, on the Mission Stations, to fill the places of those who are removed to heaven! Let it be known that the enlargement of this great work depends on the united aid of the members of the Societies and Congregations; and where is the man, or woman, or child, whose heart God has touched with His grace, who would not desire to contribute towards it? It is in the multitude of those who do not yet regularly contribute to the support of Missions that we see, not any cause of despondency as to the enlargement of Christ's kingdom on earth, but a reasonable ground of hope for its speedy and indefinite extension. We are inspired with confidence for the future, by contemplating the work yet to be brought forward to the world cannot remain as

of the army of the church militant still to be brought up to the help of the Lord, "to the help of the Lord against the mighty." The great Head of the church alone knows all the good effected by His servants all over the world. Only eternity can reveal what the Mission cause has already effected for the spiritual benefit of the world. The amount of its influence for good upon the churches at home is vast and incalculable. The encouragements to pursue this great work appear to increase from year to year, the Lord opens the field, beckons on his labourers, causes the call to resound loud and long in their ears to come to his help, that the wilderness may become a fruitful field, and the fruitful field be counted as a garden of the Lord. Are these our encouragements, says an eloquent writer, to expect success? Then "be silent, O all flesh before the Lord; for he is raised up out of his holy habitation." Be hushed the language of complaint and unbelief; be silenced the taunts of infidelity, inquiring, when is the promise of His coming? be stilled the din of opposition to the progress of His cause, and the shouts of frantic superstition in every idolatrous temple. Then, "the idols he will utterly abolish." Kalee, Vishnu, Juggernaut, your shrines are doomed—your days are numbered—your end draweth nigh. Then *it is* the voice of Him that crieth in the wilderness which we hear,—“Prepare ye the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert a highway for our God. Every valley shall be exalted, and every mountain and hill shall be made low; and the crooked shall be made straight, and the rough places plain, and the glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all flesh shall see it together.” Islands of the sea, ye shall not wait in vain for his law. Africa, there is hope in thine end; the hands of all thy children shall soon be stretched out to God. All thy myriads, India, shall rejoice in a true incarnation, “God manifest in the flesh.” And, China, thy very walls shall be salvation, and all thy gates be praise. All for which the Saviour endured the Cross, dispising the shame, all for which and the past has been preparing, and which the present is needing to be accomplished. The great trumpet of mercy roll round the earth, and the people shall be saved.

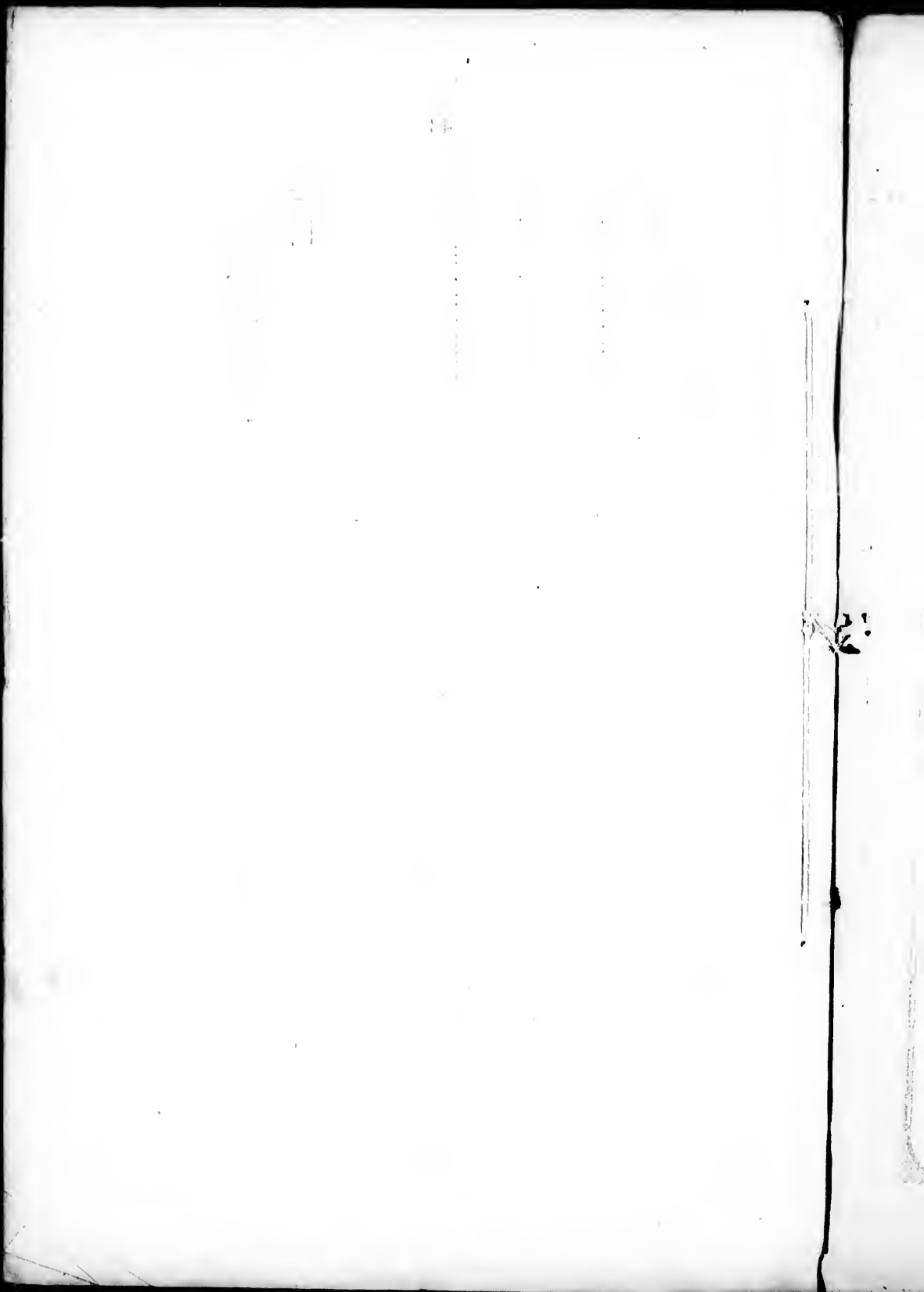
