TAHURE TOWN AND HILL TAKEN BY ASSAULT IN CHAMPAGNE

French Infantry and Artillery Score Notable Success, Advancing Mile, Capturing 1000 Germans-Progress Made in Environs of Navarin Farm to West

DARIS, Oct. 6. French infantry whose advance was preceded by a violent artillery bombardment, captured Tahure and Tahure Hill, to the north of the town, today, thereby carrying a supporting point of the second German line. Tahure is on a metaled road running from Souain to Cernay and from it forks off another highway which connects with Sommel-Py on the Grand Pre Railway. The hill, which was taken, is about a mile south of the railway line behind the second position of the Germans, and its height is given as 192 metres, or about 600 feet. This gain represents an advance of about a mile since last week.

The French official statement follows: "Our action in Champagne obtained today new results. Our infantry troops, after strong artillery preparation, captured by assault the Village of Tahure, and reached the summit of the small hill of the same name constituting a point of support in the second line of the enemy resistance. We likewise made progress in the environs of the Navarin farm. The number of prisoners taken exceeded 1000.

A stormy meeting of the school trustees and ratepayers of school section 15, Fairbank, was held last evening in Vaughan Road Public School. Alex. Harvie occupied the chair. The chairman stated that the object of the meeting was for the reconsideration of the issuing of debentures for \$87,500 to build a new school in the section and to rescind a motion of previous meeting to defer action for six months. School Trustee Duncan Hood said a census had been taken of the children between the ages of 9 and 16 years, and it was found that there was a total of 991. The present school accommodation is for 551, and a considerable number will be added by the time the new school will be completed. At present there are about 500 children without school accommodation, and in four years' time a further. 140 children would be added.

"If the meeting this evening refuses to sanction the issuing of debentures for the purchase of the school site, the owners of the land can legally ask for the completion of the purchase, and the school trustees can levy to provide the money. This is the legal aspect," said Mr. Hood.

W. D. McPherson said he was legally retained by the school trustees in the northern part of the section for the purpose of having the school section divided. Arbitrators were appointed on both sides and the decision was given to divide, the northern portion to be known as section No. 34, and the southern portion, as section No. 15.

KELLY DOCUMENTS **BROUGHT TO COURT**

Letters, Cheque Stubs, Parliament Building Plans Secured in Raid.

BOOK CONTENTS GONE

Many Pages Missing, But Evidence Not Produced in Winnipeg Hearing.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 6 .- Bundles of cuments taken by the crown, on the uthority of search warrants, from the office of Thomas Kelly & Sons, were produced this afternoon at a halfhour session of the preliminary hearing of Sir Rodmond Roblin and three of his former cabinet colleagues. The

of his former cabinet colleagues. The documents included check stubs, letters, some empty letter files, parliament building plans, etc. The contents were not revealed.

R. W. Craig, the only crown counsel present, endeavored to have the testimony of the officer who had obtained the documents taken as to some alleged missing papers, and Mr. Craig stated that certain books taken from the contractors' office and afterwards returned, were in a condition from which the inference might be fairly drawn that part of their contents was missing. Magistrate Macdonald ruled that evidence as to these missing pages could not be introduced unless the books themselves were on hand.

hand.

Results of Second Raid.

The result of another raid on the same day, Sept. 2, a letter from the Kelly Company to Sir Rodmond Roblin, and a sheet covered with figures, which were seized in a dresser drawer in Charles B. Kelly's suite, were produced.

Count DeBury, aide to the lieutenant-governor, was the first witness. He stated that just before, or just after, Christmas of last year, he delivered to Malcolm McLean, a clerk of the executive council, Sir Douglas Cameron's copy of an order-in-council. The order in question was the one approving of the \$802,000 contract for the parliament building dome, and Count DeBury's evidence, fixed the time at which the lieutenant-governor's copy was produced was after "the war session" of the legislature. Mr. McLean swore before the royal commission that he secured this copy after the short session, acting at the request of Sir Rodmond Roblin, In his evidence at the present hearing he was unable to fix the time.

Prof. Brydone-Jack, the only remaining crown witness, will be examined tomorrow, to which time the court adjourned, and it is expected that the hearing will be brought to a close with brief addresses from the counsel in the case.

TRUTH WINS OUT IN LIQUOR CASE

Commissioners.

Lengthy Report Handed Out by Chairman Gives Reason for Acquittal.

The candid confession of the three St. Catharines hotelmen that they did sell liquor after hours on one or two occasions influenced Chairman Flavelle and the board of license commissioners to suspend sentence. The men are Samuel Powers, William Gordie and Curtis Copeland, and on Tuesday they appeared before the commiss answer charges of selling liquor on Sundays and after hours. Each confessed and practically threw himself on the mercy of the board.

The decision is explained in a

lengthy report handed out by Chairman Flavelle and Commissioner Dane,

man Flavelle and Commissioner Dane, as follows:

"The charges made in these cases against the parties above named that they were in the habit of gelling liquor during prohibited hours, especially Saturday nights and Sundays, led to an investigation which showed that they were substantially true, and being called upon to answer them the aforesaid parties admitted that they had broken the law as alleged.

"Owing to these admissions, which rendered unnecessary the taking of evidence which would have involved considerable expense and delay, and the fact that the new policy of the board in reference to the punishment for offences against the license law has not become generally known, the board has decided to treat these offenders leniently and to give them another opportunity to conduct their business in accordance with the law—in other words, to practically suspend the sentence which under other circumstances the offences would warrant.

"In taking this course the board desires it to be understood, not only by the aforesaid parties, but by all license holders in the province, that the present action is intended as a warning, and any further violation of the law will be more severely dealt with by the board, having regard to the gravity of the offence.

"Will Exercise Powers.

"Attention is called to the fact that these cases might have been prosecuted before a magistrate and a money penalty imposed, but the board intends in certain cases instead of taking this course to exercise the powers conferred upon it by section 13 of the Act of 1915, under which license issued under the Liquor License Act may be cancelled or suspended for any cause which the board may think expedient. This provision

pended for any cause which the board may think expedient. This provision of the act will not remain a dead letter, which all persons interested had better bear in mind before violating the law."




