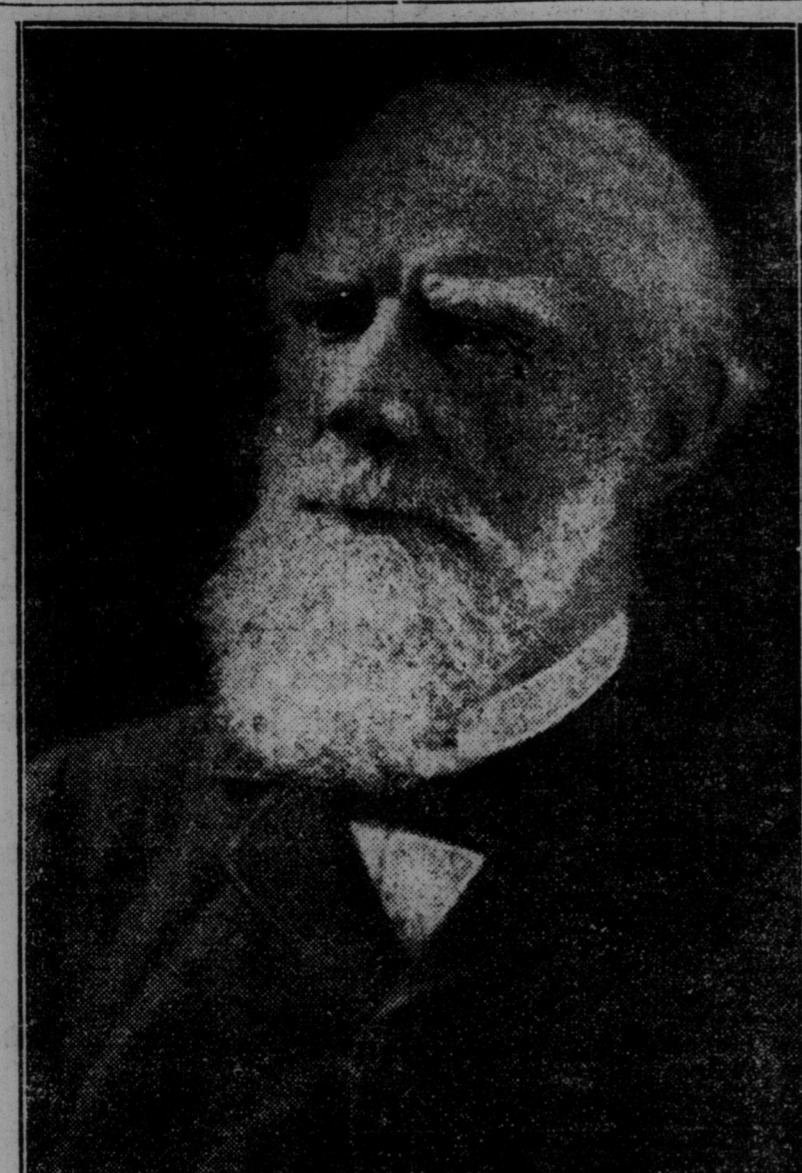

Canada's Grand Old Man Sir Wilfrid Laurier Announces Retirement of Lord Strathcona To Lay Down His Burden

Brilliant Gathering at Dominion Day Dinner in London—Duke of Connaught Alludes to His Coming Occupancy of Rideau Hall—Not a Stranger to the Dominion by Any Means.

PRINCE OF WALES MAY PAY VISIT TO CANADA

LONDON, June 30.—Two important announcements were made to-night at the Dominion Day dinner, which was attended by 600 Canadians. The first was by the Duke of Connaught, who said that the Prince of Wales probably would visit Canada, and the other by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the Canadian premier, who said that Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal, high commissioner for Canada, was about to resign his high office.

Strathcona Presided.

LONDON, June 30.—(C. A. P. Cable.)—The Dominion Day banquet of the Imperial Institute was the most brilliant in many years. Lord Strathcona presided. There were over 600 at the chairman's table, including the Duke of Connaught, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the Archbishop of Canterbury and the minister, Hon. L. P. Brodeur, Sir Joseph Ward, the German ambassador, Sir Frederick Borden, Lord Minto, Sir E. Morris, Sir Mackenzie Bowell, Lord chief justice, Mr. Belland, the Netherlands minister, Sir C. Macdonald, Lord Mayor Guthrie, A. W. Smithers and Hon. G. E. F. Carleton.

W. K. McNaught Thinks Him Too Shrewd—Power Companies Seeking Bigger Market.

W. K. McNaught, M.L.A., is not deeply concerned over the story circulated on Thursday to the effect that the interests behind the Toronto Electric were endeavoring to secure control of the Ontario Power Company.

PLEASURABLE ANTICIPATION. The duke alluded to his own previous connection with Canada. "I have had the honor," he said, "of serving the troops 41 years ago. I also had the pleasure of passing thru, 21 years back, returning to Egypt. It is no idle expression of mine when I say that for years I have held the strongest affection for the Canadian people. I know I shall hardly know the country again, but I can't tell you how keenly I look forward to making a closer acquaintance with Canada. At the present day there are probably in the great empire few more important positions than that of governor-general of Canada. It was the wish of my dear brother that I should be appointed to this post, and I am happy to think that our present sovereign has been able to spare me from England to undertake the great duties of this position. Not only so, but the Duchess herself looks forward with the greatest pleasure to our sojourn amongst you."

THE TOAST to the Dominion was proposed by Lord Strathcona. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who was received with loud cheers in responding, said: "This gathering will be remembered as the occasion still more memorable when I tell them that it is probably the last time that this annual banquet will be presided over by his noble lord, who for 15 years has filled the position of Canada's high commissioner with so much acceptance to the government and people. Lord Strathcona has given notice that his advancing years and the orders of his physician compel him at an early date to relinquish the position. You will all agree with me that no words of mine can adequately convey sense of gratitude that the Canadian people owe Lord Strathcona a manner in which he has discharged the duties imposed upon him, and when the times comes for him to take leave of those duties everyone will say, 'His like we will never see again.'"

LOVES NATURE UNADORNED. Sir Wilfrid Laurier then proceeded to make a graceful allusion to the coming of the Duke of Connaught, and remarked, about the occasion of the present gathering: "After 44 years of experience of Canadian federation I am not shocked to much when I say that we are 41 times prouder of our country." An eloquent testimony to the "England followed," that declaration of Laurier, even England, with 600 years of tillage, does not appear to my heart so much as nature unadorned in Canada. The great republic which shears with us the northern portion of the American continent.

**HAMILTON HAPPENINGS**

**BECAME SO ATTACHED TO HORSE, WOULDN'T SELL IT**

Sixteen Year Old Lad Stole It To Satisfy Girl Who Was Pressing Him for Money.

HAMILTON, June 30.—(Special).—Because he needed money with which to satisfy the demands of a girl who was pressing him for funds, it is alleged that John Horning, a 16-year-old farm hand of Beverly, stole a horse and buggy from James Ashton, a Glanville farmer. According to a witness in the police court this morning, the lad became so attached to the horse that he had stolen that he changed his mind about selling it, and would not part with it. The boy was before Magistrate Jeffs this morning, and was committed for stealing the horse and wagon. Horning's mother attempted to end her life by taking carbolic acid when he was arrested a few days ago. Her condition was considered serious at first, but it is now thought she will recover.

Because Isaac Robinson wrapped his leaking gas pipes with common twine in an effort to stop the escape of gas and did not notify the company of the matter, Judge Monck this morning gave judgment against him for a gas bill amounting to \$28.85. Robinson claimed the bill was exorbitant.

Henry Dunham bought from W. A. Ross a mare, which, according to Mr. Ross' advertisement, any lady could drive. Mr. Dunham could not make the mare go, and to-day asked the law to compel the return of \$220, the purchase price of the animal. Judge Monck reserved his decision, and suggested that Mr. Ross refund the money and take back the mare.

John J. Cline, 527 East Barton-st., was painfully, but not seriously injured, by being thrown from a rig which he was driving, when he collided at the corner of Main and John-sts. this evening with a wagon driven by Silas Flower of Caledonia. He was taken to the city hospital, where Dr. Rennie dressed his wounds.

Short circuiting of two wires in an electric landing by Sheriff McDillon, set fire to the machine on South James-st. this evening, and before the arrival of the fire department, the vehicle was badly damaged.

The Baptists of the city propose to occupy a new church in the south-western part of the city. There are now seven churches of that denomination in the city.

Joseph Haze, a laborer, lost the fingers of his left hand this morning by the explosion of a dynamite cap with which he was playing.

Nothing has been heard of the whereabouts of Chas. Widdicombe, who disappeared from his boarding house here on Tuesday, under peculiar circumstances.

An extra holiday schedule will be in effect on the lake to-day, to provide for the traffic. The Modjeska and Macassa will leave Toronto at 9 and 11 a.m., 3, 5.30 and 10.15 p.m., and leave Hamilton at 8 a.m., 12 noon, 2.15, 7.30 and 8.30 p.m. A 75-cent fare is in force good on all trips.

**VICTORIA-ST. EXTENSION WIDER.**

The works committee yesterday decided to make the Victoria-street extension 71 feet wide. It developed that if the width of 66 feet were adhered to there would be an unsealable strip 5 feet wide left on, so this will be added to the width of the proposed new section of the street, and will not call for any additional expenditure.

**THREE NEW CIVIC AUTOS.**

The works committee have approved of the purchase of three new cars for the city engineer's department, one for the waterworks staff and two to replace horses in the roadway branch.

**HAVE STRUCK OIL.**

The Electrical Development Company have struck oil on their right of way a couple of miles this side of Brampton. Nine wells have been sunk and about fifty barrels of oil are being pumped a day.

**They Are a Disfigurement.**

On recommendation of the city engineer, the works committee have decided to ask the city collector to apply for the authority necessary to compel the C.P.R. and G.N.W. Telegraph companies to remove some old wooden poles from Yonge-street. The engineer calls them a disfigurement to the street.

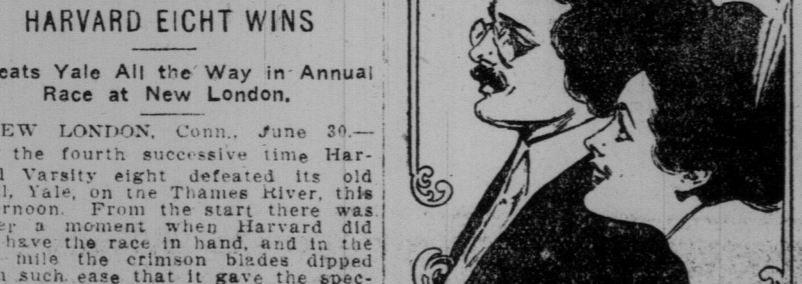

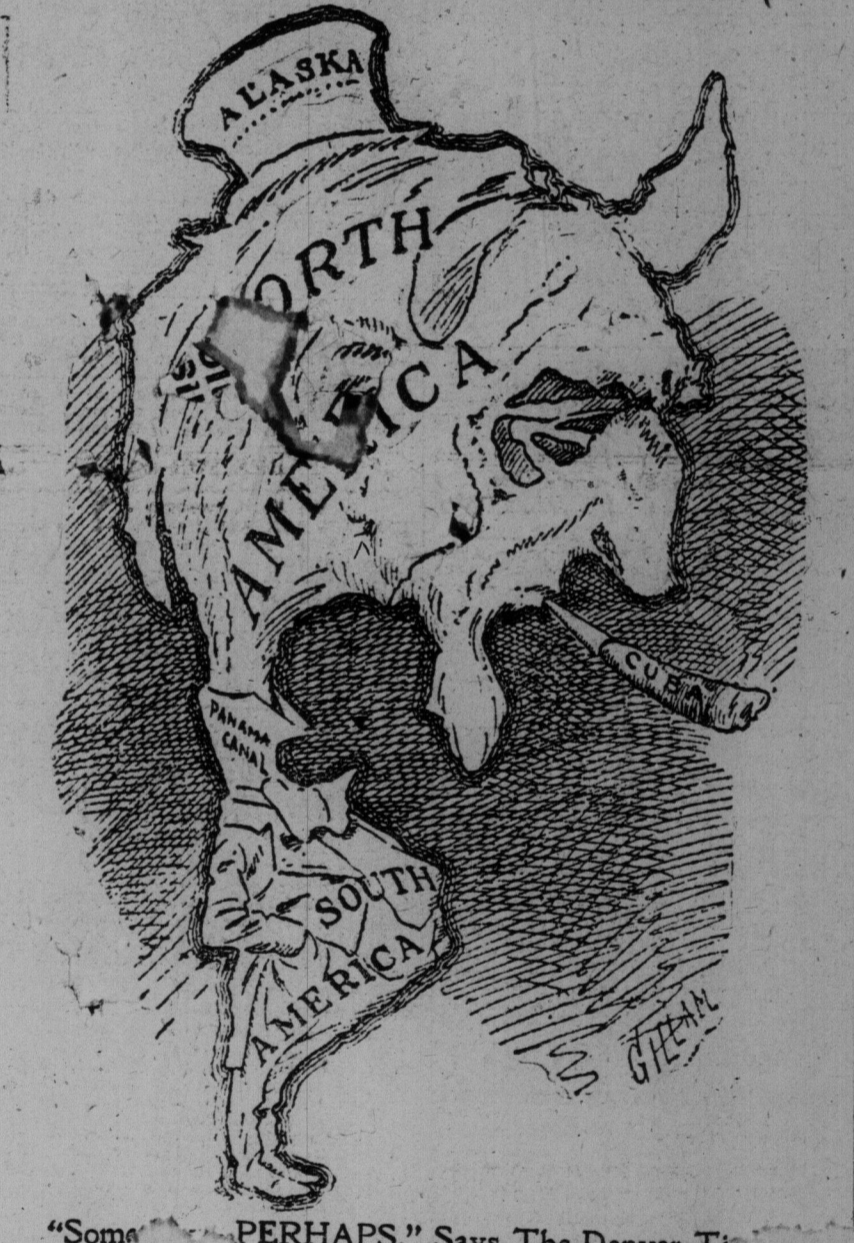
ARCHBISHOP O'CONNOR SINKS QUIETLY TO REST. Distinguished Prelate's Body to Lie in State Until Monday—Life of Self-Sacrifice.

The Right Rev. Archbishop Dennis O'Connor passed away at St. Basil's Novitiate early yesterday morning. The aged prelate has been rapidly growing weaker for the past few days, and also conscious almost to the last moment, the end was not unexpected. Surrounding the death-bed were the Rev. Fathers Frachon, Christian, Claver, Dumoulin, Donoghue, and two sisters of deceased, as well as his nurse, Miss Long. "The end was most peaceful," said Father Donoghue, "and without a murmur he passed to his reward." The last rites of the church were administered by Rev. Father Frachon, who, with the other fathers of the Novitiate, were in constant attendance on the archbishop during his last days on earth. The body will lie in state in St. Basil's Novitiate until Monday, when definite arrangements will have been made regarding the funeral masses at St. Michael's Cathedral. The musical portion of the service will be in charge of E. Jules Brazel, musical director at the Novitiate. Interment will take place in the Basilian plot.

His Career. Archbishop O'Connor was born in the Township of Eckerling on March 28, 1841, and at the age of twelve entered St. Michael's College, being one of the first students to start at that institution. Graduating from there he made his Novitiate with the Basilian Fathers in France and was ordained priest in 1869. He then returned to St. Michael's College, where he taught a class for seven years. In 1870 he was appointed president of Sandwich College, which position he held till his consecration as bishop in London Cathedral on Oct. 19, 1890, as successor to the late Archbishop Walsh. In 1892 he was created a D.D. by the P.A. The deceased prelate again succeeded Archbishop Walsh as Archbishop of Toronto, and remained head of diocese until compelled on account of ill-health, to retire from active life. This was in 1908, after nine years. He was succeeded by the late Bishop McEvoy, since whose death, despite his illness, administrative duties were performed by him until the sacrament of confirmation in St. Michael's Cathedral and St. Ann's. A few days before his death he expressed a desire to see the Right Mgr. McCann, who, during the course of his charge as head of the diocese was his vicar-general.

Simple Mode of Life. Altho on resigning his see the late archbishop could have entered private life and comparative seclusion, he instead spent the latter days of his life in meditation and prayer. He observed most assiduously the strict Basilian rule of life, arising at five o'clock every morning, when, if health permitted, reading the office of the church every day and directing the novices in the choice of their vocations. He furthermore, altho at the time director of one of the most wealthy and opulent dioceses of the Dominion, was satisfied to live on a mere \$500 a year. Archbishop O'Connor was regarded as one of the most learned members of the priesthood.

JAMAICA LOOKING IN DIRECTION OF CANADA

If Not Linked With Dominion, Says One Paper, Must Have Reciprocity With U. S.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, June 28.—A discussion of the annexation of Jamaica to Canada is being carried on by the local newspapers. The Telegraph Guardian urges the linking of Jamaica to Canada, or the giving by the home government to the colony of power to negotiate a treaty of reciprocity with the United States. The newspaper argues that it is impossible for the island to remain in its backward position when Cuba and Porto Rico are flourishing.

Another section of the press says that annexation with Canada is out of the question, declaring that Jamaica first must look to Britain and then to the United States, the latter for the natural markets. Public feeling strongly favors a commercial understanding with the U. S. or the annexation of the island to Canada. American capital is developing the northwestern end of the island at a rapid rate in the laying out of farms. The erection of a big hotel is under consideration.

Whitby Summer Conference. The Whitby summer conference of the Young People's Missionary Movement opens at the Ontario Ladies College, Whitby, on Monday evening next, under the presidency of Rev. Dr. R. F. Mackay. A large delegation has already registered, and much interest is being manifested in the conference.

Extreme Heat in the Corn Belt Keeps That Staple on Up Grade

Damage Reports from Nebraska and Kansas Pour into Wheat Pit—Irregularity in Wheat Values.

CHICAGO, June 30.—A black rust scare caused the wheat pit to-day. The plague was reported in Manitoba. The wheat was reported from Winnipeg, but the wheat here closed at 6-30 to 6-40 advance over last night.

Wheat traders here would not be surprised if the talk of black rust in Canada should prove accurate. There has been the heat and moisture which induce a blackish growth. This condition would favor the development of spores. Although the denials were explicit in regard to the dreaded rust having actually arrived, the possibility would be watched.

With the west persisting in alarm about corn, the wheat market was looked for. The cry was chiefly concerning high temperatures and no rain. An official report gave the condition of the crop in Oklahoma as 60 per cent, and 52 a month ago.

Receipts at Primary Centres: Receipts of wheat in car lots at primary points, with comparative week by week figures.

Argentine Shipments: The weekly shipments of grain from the Argentine are as follows: Last year, 1,246,000 bushels; this year, 1,246,000 bushels.

World's Estimates: World's estimated wheat shipments for the week are 10,000,000 bushels, exclusive of North America, according to Broadhull's figures.

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Damage to Corn Crop: Snow is out with a report on corn indicating that it is near the damage line for part of the crop. He says that in the south half of Kansas, Missouri and Arkansas the crop is in a position such as to sustain periods of drought in Nebraska and parts of Iowa its vitality is being severely tested because of the intense heat and lack of rain.
