RUSSIAN DEAD WERE 1,700,000 ITALY LOST 500,000 KILLED

Copenhagen, Dec. 22.-Russia's war casualties total 9,150,000 men, according to a telegram received here today from Petrograd. Of this number 1,700,000 were killed. The disabled men number 1,450,000, while 3,500,000 other soldiers were wounded. The Russians taken prisoner totaled 2,500,000.

Figures compiled by The Cologne Gazette, and published November 25, placed the total German casualties at more than six million. Of this number it was estimated that about 2,000,-000 were killed.

Paris Dec 22 - Five hundred thousand Italians lost their lives in the war. Of this number 200,000 were killed in action.

This statement was made to the correspondent today by Salvatore Barzilai, former member of the Italian cabinet, who accompanied King Victor Emmanuel to Paris. To those actually killed in battle must be added 300,000 who died of disease. The severely wounded numbered 300,000, while 500,000 of the five million called to the colors were taken prisoner.

A VEHEMENT RESOLUTION.

Councillor Peter Wright of the Brit-ish Seaman's Union last night so roused a packed audience at the Oakwood The-atre, Earlscourt, by recounting some of the inhuman cruelties of the Germans on shore and afloat that the following resolution, moved by Frank Wise, secre-tary of Navy League, and seconded by Sgt. Wm. Arthurs, was passed unani-mously:

The people of Earlscourt, Toronto, in mass meeting assembled, Dec. 22, 1918, as follows: Resolved that on or before the conclusion of peace terms those alien enemies who are at present interned in any part of Canada be forthwith repatriated to their country of birth or allegance without permission to return to canada, and resolved that no German, Austrian, Turk or Bulgarian be allowed to land on or enter into any port of Canada, nor any person who, by any of the allied nations or by the United States has, during the war, been interned as an alien enemy, and resolved that the War Times Election Act, insofar as it disenfranchised alien enemies in Canada, be not repealed for a period of not less than ten years after the war, and resolved that this meeting hereby approves of the action of the British Seaman's Union in boycotting Germans from the seas which they have polluted. And be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be forwarded forthwith to Sir Robert Borden.



Annexation of unimproved sub-divisions and districts on the outskirts of the city is in no small way responsible for the heavy debt charges we face today.

Our first duty should be to the citizens and districts within the corporate limits. We should adopt the policy of Toronto seeking annexations, instead of annexation projects seeking Toronto. In other words, Toronto should grow out, instead of sub-divisions growing in to the city.

Citizens, in certain districts, who have borne high tax rates for several years, are greatly in need of local improvements. Until their districts receive the improvements to which they are entitled, outside sections should not be annexed and improved.

Hereafter, sections seeking annexation should first be required to instal improvements and services on a par with those in the city.



Open Tonight Game of the Year.

Montreal, Dec. 22.—The professional hockey season was ushered in at the Jubilee Rink on Saturday night when Ottawa Senators scored a well-earned victory over Canadiens, 5 to 2, over sticky and heavy going. The match, the first of the National Hockey League schedule, was to have served as an introduction for two new rules, the forward pass and the delayed penalty rule. In the absence of rough play only the off-side pass at centre ice was introduced, and it will, no doubt, have a tendency to make the game faster.

Owing to the heavy condition of the ice,

Owing to the heavy condition of the ice, making passing almost impossible, it would be unfair to criticize the new rule. Being strangers to it, the players refrained from taking chances and depended on individual rushes almost thruout the game. The exhibition of hockey furnished was the best witnessed in Montreal in some seasons, the result being in doubt until the final quarter.

Ottawa showed the better condition and thru it were enabled to out-skate their opponents in the final period, when they assured their victory after seventeen minutes of the scheduled twenty in the period had expired. Both teams sent out newcomers to their club. Odie Cleghorn playing at centre ice for Canadiens and Doherty on the wing as a substitute, while Ottawa used Sprague Cleghorn, the one-time star of the Wanderers, on the defense. Both acquitted themselves in a creditable manner, playing more unselfish hockey than they have ever done before.

With Nighbor and Sprague Cleghorn as two regulars, the Ottawa team is much stronger than a year ago, while they also have a good string of substitutes. Canadiens were without the services of Joe Malone, who is still in Quebec, and Bert Corbeau, who was unable to reach Montreal thru illness in his family. In vast contrast to former seasons, rough play was conspicuous by its absence, and the penalties imposed were only for minor offences, which prevented the public from witnessing the usage of the new penalty system.
