

WILL THEY DROP THE BILL?

Speculation over Sir Donald Smith's mission.

The venerable knight is canny when the details of his conference with Premier Greenway are spoken of.

Ottawa, Feb. 24.—(Special.)—Every body was on the tip-toe of expectation to-day with reference to a possible change in the school situation.

Sir Donald Smith, accompanied by his medical man, Dr. Stewart, arrived from Winnipeg this morning.

His visit to the Prairie Provinces was a vast improvement in health, as compared with ten days ago.

There was a sprightliness about his movements, which seemed to indicate a degree of satisfaction, possibly in the outcome of his visit to the Prairie Capital.

To all and sundry who spoke to him in reference to the school question, Sir Donald had only words of hope, although he was not prepared to enter into any details.

Your correspondent had ten minutes' talk with Sir Donald, this afternoon and gathered from him that the prospects for an amicable solution of the difficulty were very bright.

That Sir Donald believes. Speaking to your correspondent, he remarked, "I found an unquestionably better feeling prevailing in Winnipeg. The people there seem to realize the gravity of the situation, and I have every reason to believe that an entirely satisfactory solution of the school difficulty is possible.

The question is one for the application of common sense, and viewed in this light there should be no difficulty in reaching a solution. Mr. Greenway is a man of common sense, and I believe is prepared to do what is right."

"It is a pity that previous efforts for a compromise were not more successful long ago," your correspondent observed.

"Indeed it is," Sir Donald replied, "but as I have already said, I see no reason why a satisfactory solution should not now be reached."

Mr. Greenway came to Ottawa. "The report was current here yesterday that Mr. Greenway would likely visit Ottawa soon. He was asked, 'Is that so?'" the knight was asked.

"I have good reason to believe that Mr. Greenway will be here shortly," Sir Donald replied.

Your correspondent then gently pressed the member for Montreal West to indicate what, in his opinion, Mr. Greenway was prepared to do, and at once Sir Donald was as dumb as an oyster.

He wanted to know the weather, or the winning ways of Winnipeg newspaper men, or other topics not quite so interesting as to what Mr. Greenway would offer he was silent.

Sir Donald, during the afternoon, saw some of the Ministers and a private c-a-n-a-b with them, and at 4:40 o'clock for Montreal.

Two questions were asked of politicians to-night. One is, who asked Sir Donald to go to Winnipeg to act as part of a friendly intermediary at this critical time?

The other is, how far has he been successful, and what proposals, if any, has he to submit to the Federal authorities? The first question, it is abundantly clear that the aged knight was not charged with a direct mission to the Government.

The more reasonable view is that he took advantage of his visit to Manitoba to seek to bring about an amicable settlement of the school question. 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WILL CHINA PAY JAPAN?

Winnipeg, Feb. 24.—(Special.)—In the Legislature to-day Attorney-General Sifton gave notice of a resolution protesting against the passage of the measure by the Federal Parliament re-establishing Separate Schools in Manitoba.

After reciting the various steps taken in the controversy between the Government and the people of Manitoba, he stated that the establishment of State-aided Separate Schools and in said document earnestly requested the advisers of His Excellency the Governor-General to extend to this House to them to make a full and complete statement of the facts relating to the past or present school situation.

"That it sincerely regretted that those reports and earnest invitations for an inquiry have been refused, and that the advisers of His Excellency, who proposed to the Government to establish Separate Schools, and did also suggest that the scope of the enquiry should be sufficiently wide to ascertain all available facts relating to the past or present school situation."
