ASSASSINATION OF CANOVAS

Press of All Countries De-
nounce the Crime.

A RATHER HEARTLESS VEIN

Adopted by the Socialist Newspapers
in Their Comments.

La Patrie Says All the Plans of Such
Murders Have Been Arranged in Lon-
don—German Papers Advocate Com-
bined Action Against Anarchy—Pre-
parations for the Funeral—Touching
Letter From the Queen Regent—Sym-
pathy of Spaniards in Cuba.

London, Aug. 10.—Foreign comment
upon the assassination is less occupied
with the political than with the anar-
chist aspects of the case. The press of
all countries gives vent to the strongest
denunciations of the crime, and advo-
cates stern measures against Anarchists.
Some of the Socialist newspapers indulge
in a rather heartless vein. For instance,
La Petite République says: "He who
strikes shall himself be struck. The
history of the Canovas Ministry is writ-
ten in blood. He revived antiquated
barbarisms, and deserved his fate."

This, however, is exceptionally cynical.
All the respectable journals express sym-
pathy. The Temps and the Journal des
Debats think that the murder will have
but little effect on politics, as from
considerations of respect for the deceased,
if for no other reasons, the Queen Regent
is not likely to call the Liberals to power.

La Patrie declares that all the plans
of such murders have been arranged in
London, and suggests that the powers
should combine to watch the country
that protects these criminals. Without
going so far as this, many German and
other papers advocate combined Euro-
pean action to suppress anarchism. The
Berliner Tageblatt asserts that Goll was
chosen by ballot for the deed by the
London Central Anarchist Society.

Preparations for the Funeral.

Madrid, Aug. 10.—The Queen Regent
has decreed that the military honors
observed in the case of the funeral of a
marshal shall be accorded to the remains
of the late Premier of Spain, Senor
Canovas del Castillo. The body of the
Spanish statesman will arrive here on
Wednesday morning, accompanied by his
widow, the Minister for the Colonies,
Don Cos-Garayza, and the Chief of Mar-
Domo, the Duke of Sotomayer, represent-
ing the Queen Regent. The pall-bearers
will be an academician, an admiral, the
President of the Senate, a Knight of the
Golden Fleece and Marshal Martinez de
Campos. The interment will take place
in the Pantheon.

Funeral services will take place simulta-
neously in all the churches throughout
the country, and the official mourning
will last three days.

The Queen Regent is greatly affected by
the tragedy, and is still consoled to
her room.

The body of the late Premier lies on
his bed in the apartments which he oc-
cupied at Santa Agueda. It is covered
with a shroud, two tapers are burning
at the foot of the bed, an altar has been
erected in the room, and masses for the
repose of the soul of the dead are being
constantly celebrated.

Senor Castellar, the Republican leader,
in an interview is quoted as saying he
will not join any Cabinet unless it is
Republican, adding that Senor Sagasta,
the Liberal leader, ought to be a mem-
ber of the new Cabinet, with the pledged
support of the Conservatives.

The Queen Regent has written a letter
to Senor Canovas del Castillo, widow
of the Premier, in which her Majesty
says:

"I am so affected and grieved by the
horrible misfortune that I cannot find
words to express the pain I feel,
like to seek consolation, but
I can only weep with you for the
dear being you have lost and who loved
you so much. I, too, have lost by great
deal. I have lost a loyal counsellor who
helped me, and of whom I stood so much
in need. The eminent services which
he rendered to my husband, Alfonso,
have him a claim to all of my respect,
and all his fresh services will be
remembered by me and to the
fatherland. The country and history
will affirm justice.

Sympathy Expressed in Havana.

Havana, Aug. 10.—The official an-
nouncement of the assassination of
Senor Canovas was published to-day in
The Official Gazette and the other local
newspapers. As a mark of respect for
the deceased statesman, the stores are
closed and the Stock Exchange and
Producer Exchange has suspended busi-
ness. The leading thoroughfares are be-
ing hung with black drapery and other
signs of respect are being displayed for
the dead Premier of Spain.

The crime of Goll is being earnestly
discussed on all sides and expressions
of sorrow are everywhere to be heard.
The dying exclamation of Canovas, "As-
sassin! Long live Spain!" is the sub-
ject of considerable comment in the
newspapers. They all print editorials
expressing the great sorrow felt by the
Spaniards at the death of the Prime
Minister, and for the great loss sus-
tained by the Spanish nation and dwell
upon the public and private virtues of the
deceased, while respecting his disap-
pearance in these critical times. The
future is referred to almost with ap-
prehension, although the people are ad-
vised to trust in the patriotism of the Span-
ish statesman and in the loyalty of the
Spaniards in both hemispheres in order
to prevent further trouble for Spain.

Cuba Will Have to Go.

Berlin, Aug. 10.—Great sympathy is
felt here with Spain, but the outlook is
considered very ominous. All sorts of
sinister prophecies are advanced. It is
held here that the monarchy will
doubleless survive, but Cuba will have to
go. No one puts much confidence in the
surviving Spanish statesman, while the
country's finances are at a very low
ebb.

THE BONDING PRIVILEGE AGAIN.

A Discovery in the New Tariff Law Which Will Make Business for the Cana- dian Roads Interested.

New York, Aug. 10.—A Washington de-
patch to The Sun says to-day:
Secretary Gage has asked the Attorney-
General for an interpretation of the clause
in the new tariff law relating to the as-
sessment of discriminating duties. The con-
ference who made the final draft of the act
added a hitherto unnoticed provision to
section 15, which promises to open up a
field that will keep the courts busy for
some time, and upon the final construction
of which will depend the settlement of the
question which has long agitated the
Treasury Department with regard to the
bonded privileges enjoyed by the Canadian
roads. The section in question is the
one imposing an additional discriminating
duty of 10 per cent. upon all goods im-
ported in vehicles not of the United States,
except such as are of countries having
special treaty relations with this govern-
ment, by which products carried in them
are entitled to admission under the same
rate of duties as those imposed upon car-
goes carried in American vehicles.

Trying to Catch Canadian Roads.

If the opinion of Attorney-General Mc-
Kenna as to the construction to be placed
upon this provision in the tariff law, it
shall give the effect to them that was in-
tended by the American legislators, the
opinion of the Treasury officials, will have
won their fight. The imposition of an ad-
ditional 10 per cent. duty upon all goods
coming into the country over Canadian
roads, for more than offset any advantage
in rates that they can possibly offer.
If the courts sustain this view of the
law, the Canadian roads must necessarily
retire from the international carrying
trade.

The Question was First Called to the At- tention of the Treasury Department on Saturday last by the collector of the port of Detroit, who received an invoice of im- ported goods through the mails, and was asked whether or not the additional 10 per cent. duty was to be levied on it. The question was referred to Attorney-General McKenna by Secretary Gage for his opinion. To-day the case was referred to the depart- ment by the collector at Chicago, that of thousands of Japanese goods coming under consular seal from Vancouver over the Canadian Pacific Railroad.

Expects to Be Heard Ever.

Pending the decision of the Attorney-
General, the collectors have been advised to
delay final liquidation of the entries, and
England and the Northwest are interested
in this question to almost as great an ex-
tent as are the Canadian railroad managers,
and the opposition to the efforts to do
this with advantage to the Canadian roads
is possessed of some largely from Senators
representing these States. What is known as
the Soo Line, in Minnesota, and the

in this traffic with their Canadian connec-
tions, and will suffer with them from the
effect of an adverse ruling by the Depart-
ment of Justice. Some idea of the extent
of this carrying trade may be had from the
fact that millions of tons of bonded freight
into and through the United States.

GRAND TRUNK EMPLOYEES.

There Will Not Be a Strike—At the Same
Time Some of the Men Are
Not Satisfied.

The Grievance Committee of the G.
T.R., that has been in Montreal for
several days, returned yesterday. All
the grievances, with one exception, were
waived by the committee, the remaining
one being that of a raise of wages. It is
understood they got no definite an-
swer on this point, but that the
matter will be considered. It may be
put down as a certainty that there will be no strike,
the decision of the committee to waive the
other matters has not met with general
approval. It is alleged that the com-
mittee, although fewer in number than
the brokenmen, had a larger representa-
tion on the committee than the broken-
men, and that they outvoted the latter.
The brokenmen are anything but satisfied
with the turn affairs have taken, and
the present outcome of the conference
may be the cause of trouble between
the conductors and the brokenmen. The
brokenmen find fault with the manage-
ment for the inadequate number of brake-
men that are now sent out on each train,
there being only two brokenmen on a train
that is composed of from anywhere be-
tween 20 and 30 cars, and only one
man on special trains. This, the men
claim, is absolutely unsafe to the travel-
ing public. Another bone of contention
is that the men are compelled to wear
a uniform similar to that of Church
of England clergymen, which they have to
purchase themselves, while under the old
management they were provided with
one suit and a pea jacket in the fall.
There is anything but unity between
the men and the company, which, while
it is overcome for the present, may break
out afresh at any time.

BURNED THEM WITH TORCHES.

Fearful Cruelty Resorted to by Robbers on
a Couple of Brothers Who Had
Money.

Johnstown, Pa., Aug. 10.—Four masked
robbers entered the house of Philip
and John Dever, aged and wealthy
bachelor brothers, living in Munster
Township, Cambria County, and de-
manded their money. The two brothers
and a nephew aged 30 years were bound
and gagged and the house ransacked.
Failing to find any money, the robbers
took lighted sticks and burned the feet
of the three men to compel them to
tell where the money was secreted.
While the burning sticks were being
applied to the feet of Philip the nephew,
who had managed to slip the blindfold
from his eyes, turned to see what was
going on. One of the robbers saw him
move and ran to him, striking him a ter-
rible blow on the mouth with his re-
volver, knocking out his teeth, splat-
tering the lower jaw bone and spitting
the upper lip. All their efforts failed to
obtain the information as to where they
could find money, and the four men final-
ly departed, leaving their victims tied.
They are terribly injured and Philip,
who is 78 years of age, may not recover.
There is no clue to the robbers.
