SENATOR SANFORD DROWNED IN SIGHT OF HIS SUMMER HOME

Had Been Out Fishing, and, While Fixing the Anchor, Lost His Balance—Falling, He Capsized the Boat.

Miss Dowry Attempted to Save the Senator's Life, But Without Avail—Body Found Near the Shore—Hamilton is in Mourning—The Senator's Remarkable Career.

Windsore, Muskoka, July 10.—(Special.)—Hon. W. E. Sanford of Hamilton was drowned this morning while out fishing near his own island, in company with Miss Dowry.

It appears that Senator Sanford found some difficulty in lifting the anchor of his boat, and was about to leave it, when, turning round, he lost his balance, upsetting the boat, precipitating both himself and Miss Dowry into the water.

On hearing the cries for help, Miss Knight, a domestic in his employ, went to the spot and rescued the lady, but could see nothing of the Senator.

The Senator's body was supposed not to have been in the water more than half an hour.

Mrs. Sanford and her two daughters are at present in Germany, and were about to sail for Canada and spend some time at their island.

The remains will be taken to Hamilton tomorrow for burial.

Such sympathy is expressed by all visitors at this place as Senator Sanford was so well and favorably known.

THE NEWS AT HAMILTON. Senator Sanford's Sudden Death Cast a Gloom Over the Whole City.

Hamilton, July 10.—(Special.)—The man who more than any other typified the death of an enterprising business man of Hamilton was Senator Sanford, whose sudden death to-day cast a gloom over, and came as a tremendous thunderbolt to, the citizens of this city.

He had been expressed on all sides. The Senator had more personal friends, perhaps, than any man in Hamilton.

His death means a big loss to Hamilton. Over one thousand persons are employed, directly or indirectly, by his firm.

The big factory was closed down soon after the news was received. The Senator was half-mast on all the public buildings.

At a meeting of St. George's Society this evening a resolution of deep regret was passed, although the deceased senator was a member of the society.

The City Council also passed a resolution of condolence to the Senator's wife and family.

Messrs. Joseph Green and George Sweet of the Sanford Manufacturing Company left this afternoon for Windsore, to arrange for the bringing of the remains to this city.

Alleged Disturbances in the Police Court—More Arrests Made—List of Those Injured.

London, July 10.—(Special.)—Apart from the fact that the riots on Saturday and the absence of the militia and cavalry on the heights are the topic of conversation everywhere throughout the city, the excitement has calmed down and affairs have apparently resumed their normal condition.

It is evident that the determined steps taken by the authorities have dampened the ardor of the riotous element, which chiefly made up Saturday's mob.

The militia arrives. The outside militia, consisting of four companies, one each from Essex, Col. Gulliver, 21st Essex Fusiliers, Windsor, Major Alcherson, 20th Infantry, Galt; Col. W. W. White, 30th Infantry, Guelph, and Col. Hegler, Oxford Rifles, Woodstock, reached the city this morning.

The estimate damage done. The estimate damage done by the mob Saturday is nearly \$500,000, of which is to the company's property, and the balance to private property, nearly every place of the trouble being broken.

How the strike will be ended. THE ALASKAN BOUNDARY AND COPYRIGHT.
 The heading of our despatches of yesterday morning referring to the Alaskan boundary dispute implied surprise at the United States authorities being credited with desiring to ignore Canada in the negotiations on this question. And yet, why should we be surprised? We know that the United States politicians are sharp, shrewd fellows, ready to take advantage of any and every argument they can turn to their advantage. During the past few years they have seen Canada so bluffed and slighted on the question of copyright that we are not surprised that they should hope for similar results in the Alaskan question. A great many people look on the question of copyright as one of little public interest, as affecting only the writer and the publisher; but it really affects a very large proportion of our people; while the principle at stake is of the greatest importance, viz., the right of Canada to enforce such legislation as may be enacted by the Canadian Parliament. In 1889 the Canadian Parliament passed a copyright bill. The Colonial Office refused assent thereto. Sir John Thompson answered the arguments advanced by the Colonial Office in that disallowance, but without effect. In 1892 a departmental commission was appointed in London to consider the question of Canadian copyright. The strangest thing about this commission was that, although appointed to consider Canadian copyright, there was no representative of Canada on the commission. It was not, therefore, surprising that the report of the commission fairly dripped with false and misleading statements—not, perhaps, with any intent to deliberately misrepresent the case, but simply because of the absence of a Canadian representative who could have set the case of Canada before his brother commissioners in its proper light. This report was ably answered by Sir John Thompson in his report of 1894. This report of Sir John Thompson was submitted by the Colonial Office to the Copyright Association (London), and was answered on Mr. F. B. Daldy on behalf of the Copyright Association. A single sentence from Mr. Daldy's statements will serve to show the value that Canada has at least would be inclined to place on the majority of its arguments. Mr. Daldy says:—

"The Berne Convention had nothing to do with England's statement to America, but if America chooses to object to the Copyright Act by publishing in Canada—which she can do under the acts of 1862 and 1869—why America should have something to say to Canada's withdrawal from the Berne Convention."
 Examine that statement for a moment. Understand that the United States has been repeatedly urged to join the Berne Convention, but has steadily refused to do so. And yet, sensible people in the United Kingdom actually dare to say that the United States should have something to say about Canada's withdrawal from the Berne Convention.
 For, unfortunately, Mr. Daldy is not alone in that statement. It was made before the approval of the Copyright Association of the United Kingdom, while the secretary of the London Chamber of Commerce, which comprises in its publishing sections over 100 firms in the publishing business, writes to the Colonial Office, endorsed the views of Mr. Daldy.
 When our friends in the United States are thus plainly told in official communications to the Colonial Office, by the leading industrial bodies in the United Kingdom, that the United States should practically have a right to interfere in Canadian legislation, what need we wonder if our friends in the United States act on this plainly given? This action on the part of the Copyright Association and the London Chamber of Commerce is regrettable. The meaning of what they are asserting to the proper thing for the Colonial Office to do is to cease opposition to Canada enforcing its own copyright legislation. The right must eventually be granted. Why recusing the difficulties of the case by refusing to?

ONE MAN "MUTILATED."
 George Grant of Walkerville Declined to go to Suppress London Strike.
 Windsor, Ont., July 10.—Forty men picketed from the local companies of the 21st Essex, 6th and 7th Regiments, and Capt. Gordon Gaultier and Lieut. D. J. Cheyne, his second in command, were met by a mob of ten or twelve men on the morning of the 10th inst. in response to the call from the district officer for troops to quell the disturbance in the city caused by the striking street car employees. George Grant, a member of the 21st, was ordered to take a point blank to go with the soldiers to London, and an information has been laid against him. He refused to do so, and join his corps to act in assisting the civil police. He was ordered to leave the city on Thursday.

Borne to the Tomb.

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THINGS WENT WITH A RUSH.
 His Excellency Assents to Sixty-Nine Bills in About as Many Seconds.
 SUPPLY BILLS FOR \$9,500,640
 Put Through in Order That the Government Might Have Cash to Pay Expenses.

Ottawa, July 10.—(Special.)—The feature of today's session of the House was the summoning of the Commons to the Senate Chamber by His Excellency the Governor-General, where assent was given to all the bills so far passed this session, 69 in number, and the Supply Bills for 1898-99 and 1899-1900, amounting to \$2,522,564.44 and \$4,975,587.72 respectively. The whole ceremony occupied about a quarter of an hour, and it was exactly three minutes from the moment when the Speaker of the Commons raised his voice that the Governor-General had assented to the bills. The Governor-General had had "certain sums of money" for the service of Her Majesty, and the bills were passed by the Senate in the name of Her Majesty, "accepts the bills." In those three minutes the rate of over \$3,000,000 a minute, which is a very quick work, even for an "economical" Liberal Government.

THE ALASKAN BOUNDARY AND COPYRIGHT.
 The heading of our despatches of yesterday morning referring to the Alaskan boundary dispute implied surprise at the United States authorities being credited with desiring to ignore Canada in the negotiations on this question. And yet, why should we be surprised? We know that the United States politicians are sharp, shrewd fellows, ready to take advantage of any and every argument they can turn to their advantage. During the past few years they have seen Canada so bluffed and slighted on the question of copyright that we are not surprised that they should hope for similar results in the Alaskan question. A great many people look on the question of copyright as one of little public interest, as affecting only the writer and the publisher; but it really affects a very large proportion of our people; while the principle at stake is of the greatest importance, viz., the right of Canada to enforce such legislation as may be enacted by the Canadian Parliament. In 1889 the Canadian Parliament passed a copyright bill. The Colonial Office refused assent thereto. Sir John Thompson answered the arguments advanced by the Colonial Office in that disallowance, but without effect. In 1892 a departmental commission was appointed in London to consider the question of Canadian copyright. The strangest thing about this commission was that, although appointed to consider Canadian copyright, there was no representative of Canada on the commission. It was not, therefore, surprising that the report of the commission fairly dripped with false and misleading statements—not, perhaps, with any intent to deliberately misrepresent the case, but simply because of the absence of a Canadian representative who could have set the case of Canada before his brother commissioners in its proper light. This report was ably answered by Sir John Thompson in his report of 1894. This report of Sir John Thompson was submitted by the Colonial Office to the Copyright Association (London), and was answered on Mr. F. B. Daldy on behalf of the Copyright Association. A single sentence from Mr. Daldy's statements will serve to show the value that Canada has at least would be inclined to place on the majority of its arguments. Mr. Daldy says:—

"The Berne Convention had nothing to do with England's statement to America, but if America chooses to object to the Copyright Act by publishing in Canada—which she can do under the acts of 1862 and 1869—why America should have something to say to Canada's withdrawal from the Berne Convention."
 Examine that statement for a moment. Understand that the United States has been repeatedly urged to join the Berne Convention, but has steadily refused to do so. And yet, sensible people in the United Kingdom actually dare to say that the United States should have something to say about Canada's withdrawal from the Berne Convention.
 For, unfortunately, Mr. Daldy is not alone in that statement. It was made before the approval of the Copyright Association of the United Kingdom, while the secretary of the London Chamber of Commerce, which comprises in its publishing sections over 100 firms in the publishing business, writes to the Colonial Office, endorsed the views of Mr. Daldy.
 When our friends in the United States are thus plainly told in official communications to the Colonial Office, by the leading industrial bodies in the United Kingdom, that the United States should practically have a right to interfere in Canadian legislation, what need we wonder if our friends in the United States act on this plainly given? This action on the part of the Copyright Association and the London Chamber of Commerce is regrettable. The meaning of what they are asserting to the proper thing for the Colonial Office to do is to cease opposition to Canada enforcing its own copyright legislation. The right must eventually be granted. Why recusing the difficulties of the case by refusing to?

ONE MAN "MUTILATED."
 George Grant of Walkerville Declined to go to Suppress London Strike.
 Windsor, Ont., July 10.—Forty men picketed from the local companies of the 21st Essex, 6th and 7th Regiments, and Capt. Gordon Gaultier and Lieut. D. J. Cheyne, his second in command, were met by a mob of ten or twelve men on the morning of the 10th inst. in response to the call from the district officer for troops to quell the disturbance in the city caused by the striking street car employees. George Grant, a member of the 21st, was ordered to take a point blank to go with the soldiers to London, and an information has been laid against him. He refused to do so, and join his corps to act in assisting the civil police. He was ordered to leave the city on Thursday.

Borne to the Tomb.

FELL 45 FEET TO HIS DEATH STEAMER PORTA WRECKED

Was Standing at the Base of a Red Cross Liner Went Ashore Last Night on Finn's Island, Nova Scotia Coast.

Derrick When It Topped Him Off.

LIVED FOUR HOURS AFTER FALL HAD 75 PASSENGERS ON BOARD.

Had Been Married But Four Months Accident at Gowan, Kent & Co.'s Premises.

Thomas Williams, a bricklayer's laborer, fell 45 feet yesterday morning and died four hours after in the Emergency Hospital from the terrible injuries he received.
