Nothing in the document, "There is nothing in these documents, from first to last," said the Colonial Secretary, who then dissected most of the documents, pointing out that they afforded no ground for charges against the Colonial Office.

"If this matter had not been complicated by political matters and personal animosities no man in the House would have said there was a shadow of ground for such an inquiry. The object of these persons is to addle the brains of those who are participating in the Transvaal settlement."
