Milner Says War Can End  
By Applying Constant  
Pressure.

'TIS USELESS TO THREATEN  
Clemency Should Be For Surrendered  
Instead of For Those  
Who Fight.

MEN BREATHE MORE FREELY  
James Bryce Would Welcome a Minis-  
try That Would Conclude  
an Honorable Peace.

London, Jan. 10.—At a local banquet given in Johannesburg last night Lord Milner, the British High Commissioner in South Africa, made a long speech on the situation, and expressed his belief that the storm cloud overhanging Africa had burst, that the great crisis was now behind instead of before, and that men breathed more freely.

After strongly denouncing the tactics of the British pro-Boers, Lord Milner declared:

"The war will end all the sooner if we apply a steady physical pressure without flinching about the lawfulness of it. It is useless to threaten and useless to wheedle. The only thing is imperitubly to squeeze and to keep our clemency and consideration, both excellent in their proper places, for the Boers who surrender, instead of lavishing it in blankishments upon those who continue the fight."

CHAMPIONS PEACE WITH BOERS.  
London, Jan. 10.—James Bryce (Liberal), member of parliament for Aberdeen, in the course of a speech to his constituents at Aberdeen yesterday advocated making generous terms with the Boers. He said he was more concerned for the country than for the Liberal party, and would welcome any ministry, however composed, that would conclude an honorable peace.

ARTIFICIAL OESOPHAGUS.  
Remarkable Invention That Allows  
Mastication and Swallowing.

Vienna, Jan. 10.—At the Vienna Physico-Medical Society yesterday a young physician gave a demonstration of a remarkable invention—a substitute for the oesophagus when the patient is affected with stricture caused by poison or carcinoma malignum. The patient is put under a general anaesthetic and a tube is inserted into the stomach. This artificial oesophagus, which is worn under the clothes, allows for both mastication and swallowing.

BOERS LOOK FOR PEACE.  
Amsterdam, Jan. 10.—The Boer delegates in Holland evidently anticipate that some kind of peace overture will shortly be forthcoming, they are reticent as to their reasons for this belief. They maintain, however, that the demand for an unconditional surrender must be abandoned. It is privately admitted that none of the delegates will reject what they call "any fair offer of terms."

BAREFOOTED BOER STORMERS.  
Durban, Jan. 10.—Private information states that Dewet's surprise of the British at Tweedfontein was complete. Leaving 300 men to guard his laager, Dewet headed south with the bulk of his force on a clever feeding movement. Doubling back after dark the Boers climbed barefooted up the dangerous precipice, upon which Col. Fynn's force had pitched its camp, and which was the head of the blockhouse line going to Bethlehem.

ON WEDNESDAY NEXT.  
Ottawa, Jan. 10.—The following from the British army orders applies to Canada: "The war services of officers engaged in South Africa from the outbreak of hostilities until Nov. 29, 1900, will be recorded in the official army list, and officers commanding units should include in their regular returns an appendix showing the services of officers under their command."

CALL FOR MORE MEN.  
London, Jan. 10.—The War Office has issued a call for 9396 infantry volunteers gradually to replace those now serving in South Africa.

WANT COMPETITION WITH C.P.R.  
FARMERS IN MANITOBA COMPLAIN  
TO THE GOVERNMENT.

Two Hundred and Seven of them Depute C.N.R. Extended.  
Winnipeg, Jan. 10.—A deputation, representing the farmers of the Boissevain district, made a long speech to the Hon. J. H. Cameron, M.P., in the Senate today. The representatives, W. Milner and A. S. Barton, presented a petition signed by 207 farmers, and pointed out that the farmers of that district were very anxious to have the C.N.R. extended. In reply the Ministers promised to take the views of the deputation into very careful consideration, and thanked them for laying the matter before them. Subsequently the deputation waited upon D. B. Hanna of the C.N.R.

COW CHARGED BAYONETS  
Obstreprous Bovine Nearly Routs  
a Company of French Soldiers.

Paris, Jan. 10.—At Langres, while a local fair was in progress, a cow which was being led thru the town took flight at an electric trolley, and broke away from the driver. In his mad gallop the excited animal knocked over everybody who got in the way, and made desperate efforts to reach a boy who climbed a lamp-post to escape its fury. A party of soldiers was called out and charged the cow with fixed bayonets, but in the conflict two of the soldiers were disarmed, thrown to the ground and trampled on. An inhabitant of the district next fired two shots at the desperate beast, but, altho it bled freely, the animal still showed fight, and it was only after a policeman had plunged a bayonet into its body several times that the exciting conflict, which lasted an hour, came to an end.

DEWET'S CLEVER SCHEME.

Oshawa, Jan. 10.—Mr. Arthur Courtenay, who was severely injured about the head and neck in a railway collision on the C.P.R., near Saint Steeple, on Jan. 29, has been recovering, and has arrived in Toronto, where he will remain with his parents till entirely well again. His injuries were very severe, and it was only by the aid of three doctors working on the spot, that he was able to be brought back to consciousness and life. At the time of the collision he was an express messenger on the train between Saint Steeple and Scarborough.

WIRELESS READY FOR CONJUNCTION  
MARCONI'S AMBITION IS TO REPORT  
THE KING'S CROWNING.

Vessels of Dominion Fishery Department to Have Apparatus.  
Ottawa, Jan. 10.—It is Mr. Marconi's ambition to have his wireless system working across the Atlantic in time to furnish reports of the coronation of the King on June 28. After doubling the electric power at his Cornwall station, Marconi will return to Canada in two or three months, and get his station at Cape Breton in working order with this object in view. Mr. Marconi is to be the guest of honor at a banquet to be given by the Electrical Society in New York Monday evening.

WILL RETURN IN JUNE.  
Marconi Selects Cape Breton  
and Shores of Red Sea.

Montreal, Jan. 10.—Signor Marconi passed thru here to-day en route for England. He was stowed at the St. James' Club and announced that capital had been offered both in Montreal and Ottawa to complete his enterprises. Besides the Cape Breton station, he says he will establish a station on the shore of the Red Sea. Mr. Marconi also promises to return to Canada in June, and will read a paper before the Canadian Electrical Association at Quebec.

FORTY THIEVES AT HOME.  
Police Find Them in Old, Unseen  
Subterranean Reservoirs.

Paris, Jan. 10.—The police have just discovered the hiding-places of a band of thieves whose whereabouts have for a long time puzzled them. The jail birds learned that the old subterranean reservoirs of Montmartre were left uncovered, and they made their abode. The police, however, got wind of this strange retreat, and yesterday they tracked one of the thieves to his cave dwelling and apprehended him as he was hiding the traps which he had taken to the lower regions. When they descended the officers found themselves in a kind of grotto made habitable with straw and old carpets, and the various rooms were furnished with chairs and tables.

CANADIANS PARADED.  
General O'Grady-Haly Called Them  
a Fine Body of Men.

Halifax, N.S., Jan. 10.—Every available man of the Second Canadian Mounted Rifles paraded this afternoon. They were all mounted and equipped. They first marched in squadrons and then formed, headed by Col. Evans, they marched down the principal streets. The parade was one of the finest ever witnessed in this city, and the general appearance of the men was most favorably commented upon.

JUDGE COMMITS SUICIDE.  
"Souls of Innocently Condemned"  
Will Bear Witness Against Him.

Vienna, Jan. 10.—Dr. Heisterger, vice-president of the Vienna Criminal Court, committed suicide to-day by shooting himself. He was 65 years old, and for the last 20 years had presided over all the most important trials in Vienna. He was universally feared by criminals on account of the severity of his sentences, and was especially famous for his great ability in detecting the guilty. The morning's news will be devoted to a story of the judge's life. No doubt the crowd will be large, and it will be advisable to attend early. Seats have been provided for the morning.

THE DEFENCE OF LONDON.  
London, Jan. 10.—The approximate strength of the army corps to defend London will be 38,000 officers and men, and over 15,000 horses, with 120 machine and field guns.

SMALLPOX IN CORNWALL.  
Picture Dealer and His Wife Have  
Disease in a Hotel.

London, Jan. 10.—Smallpox has broken out in Cornwall. The disease was brought to Cornwall by a man named O. Yates, who is said to have come here from Ottawa. He made his headquarters at the Carlton Hotel, and for several days was around town selling pictures. His wife and himself took ill, and the doctor was called and diagnosed the disease as smallpox. Dr. W. H. Hoilett, prison inspector, is here, and every precaution is being taken to prevent the spread of the disease. Mrs. Yates is seriously ill, but her husband is in a fair way to recovery. The patients will be removed to the smallpox hospital as soon as the woman's condition will permit.

Three Members of the Old Board Will Very Likely Be in the Field.

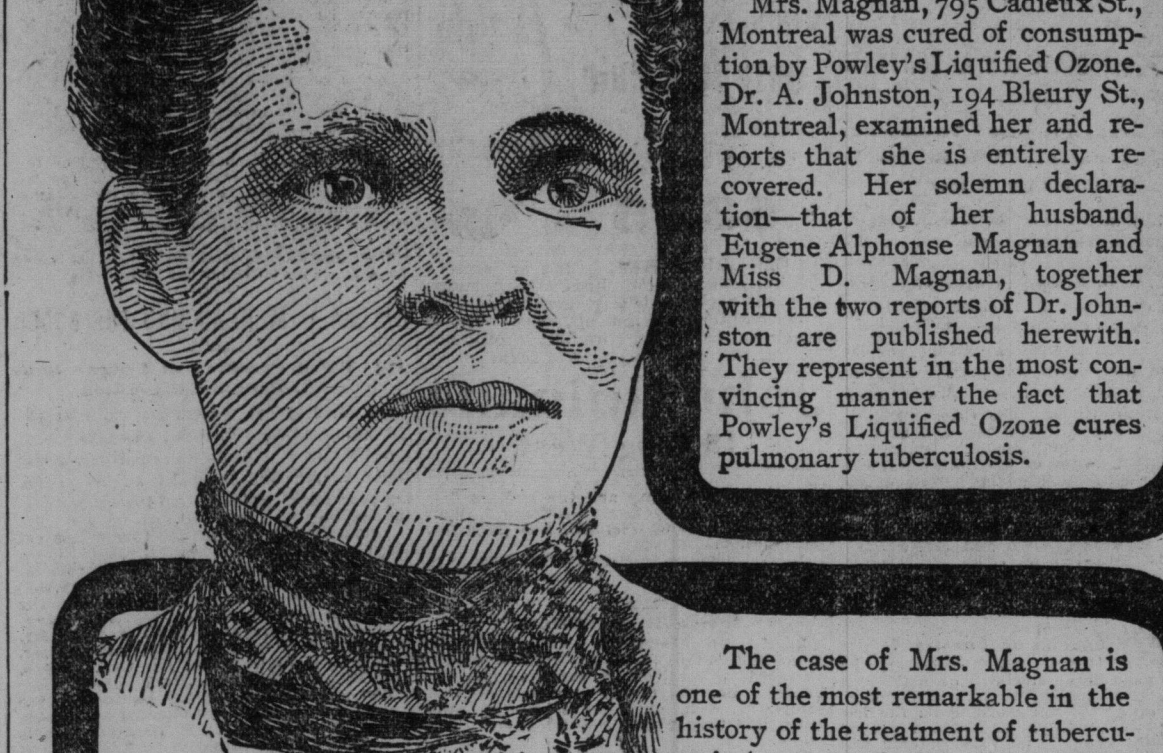
FOSTER, LOUDON, CRANE, GRAHAM

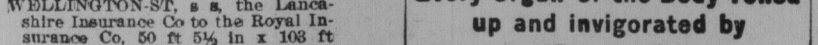

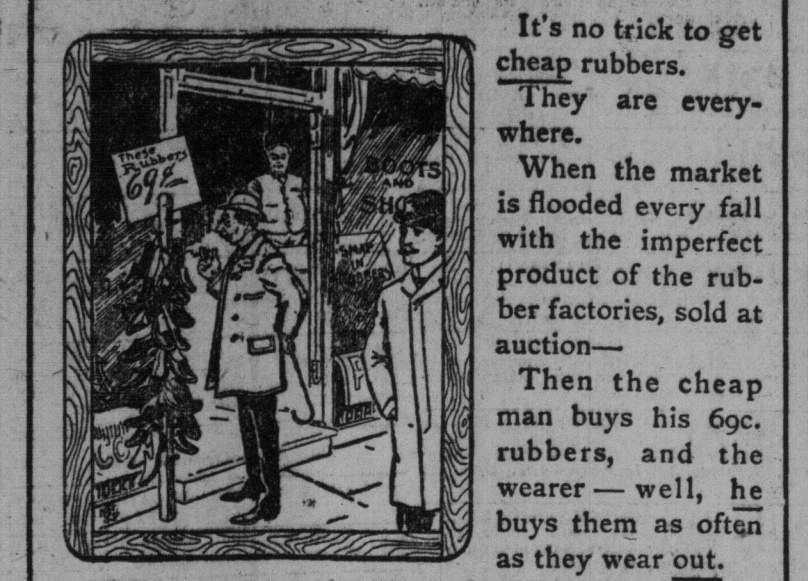

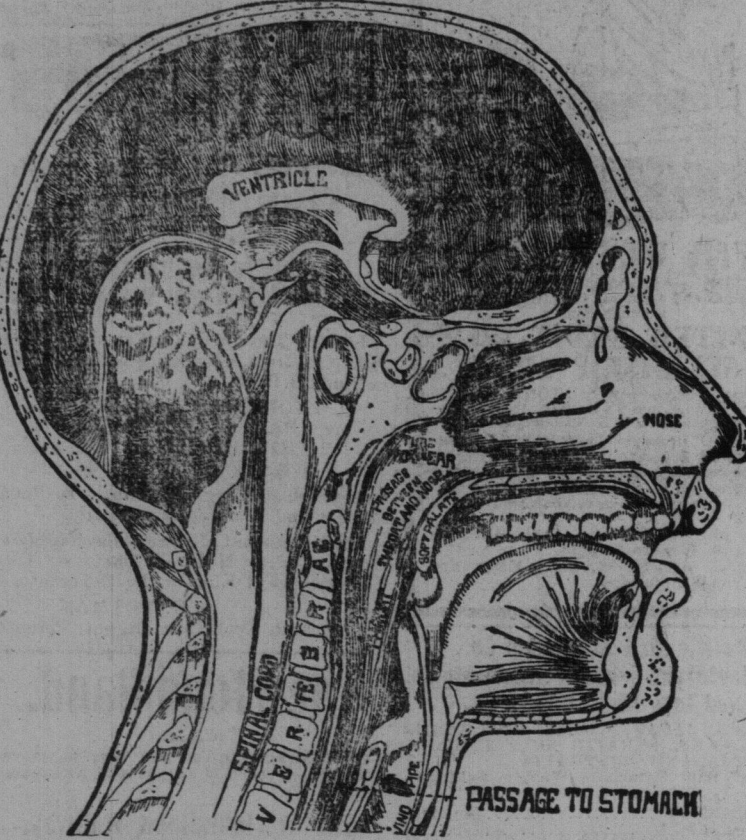

**YONGE-STREET ASSESSMENT.** Judgment of the Court sustains the Assessment Department. His Honor Judge Macdonough has handed out the figures in the Yonge-street assessment. The section affected by these appeals is from King-street to Albert and Shuter-streets. The net result of His Honor's findings sustains the Assessment Department in its assessment for the year 1902, as compared with 1901, of \$615,301.

These appeals were brought before the County Judge on appeals by the Assessment Commissioner and C. W. Laker against the decision of the Court of Revision, which reduced the Yonge-street properties from \$3,496,073, as returned by the assessor, to \$4,496,073, or a reduction of \$900,000.

The assessor's figures made a total increase in assessment on the various properties of \$920,112. This was reduced by the Court of Revision to \$335,057, but the judge's figures are \$615,301, which, therefore, constitutes the increase in the assessment for the year, and at 20 mills on the dollar this means an additional revenue of \$123,060 to the city.

The police at the station advised that the furmant was a chaitelaine bag which was found yesterday. Owners were wanted for both articles.

**Satisfactory Report.** The Health Officer reported a credit balance of \$124,000. "Most satisfactory," remarked the Mayor, "particularly considering the number of epidemics that have been dealt with during the year." The Board concurred in the Mayor's criticism.

**Overhead Wires.** The danger from overhead wires, which was reported by the chief of the Fire Department, came up for discussion. Controller Sheppard said some concerted action should be taken to have all wires laid underground.

The City Engineer will report on the number of overhead wires owned by the various companies.

The city will commence litigation against the Toronto Electric Light Co. and the Incandescent Light Co. to annul their franchise on the ground that they have amalgamated.

**Can Charge What They Like.** City Solicitor Caswell reported upon the complaint of a citizen that the Bell Telephone Co. was charging a rate in excess of that allowed by statute. He was of the opinion that the rate was not a right to a subscriber nor to a municipal corporation to compound them with their existing rates, and with the knowledge of the fact that there were a large number of existing rates at that date in different municipalities, and possibly in the same municipality, Mr. Caswell saw the wisdom in the action.

**After Another Term.** A few minor matters had been disposed of. Ald. Lamb referred to the coming election of aldermen to the Board of Control, and he asked why the members of the Board of Control should not offer themselves for re-election. He did not think he was too ambitious, but he intended that he would be in the running. Ald. Hubbard agreed that there was an unwritten law against aldermen sitting more than two years on the Board of Control. It looked as if he was also going to run.

Ald. Frane said he was in the race again, but Ald. Sheppard said they could count him out of it.

The controllers told each other for a few minutes how well they had conducted the business of the city and reviewed the work of the year and its results.

His Worship the Mayor suggested that the city was greatly indebted to the Board of Control of 1901, and he was fully in accord with the suggestion of Ald. Lamb that the Controller should be elected to the Board of Control as a second term. He favored a second term for the Controller.

### STREET CARS TO THE ISLAND

City Engineer Reports Upon the Cost of the Various Routes Under Consideration.

#### EXPENDITURE WOULD BE LARGE

Final Meeting of the Board of Control for 1901—At the City Hall.

The Board of Control for 1901 disbanded yesterday afternoon after closing up as far as possible a number of matters which have been worrying for months past. The board did not die until it had presented itself with a substantial obituary full of congratulatory remarks on the stand it had taken on various big questions, and at least three of its members finished up with such satisfaction to themselves that they would not object to going on the board again for another year.

Therefore Ald. Lamb, Hubbard and Frane are in the coming fight.

Island Street Cars. Street cars on the island were the chief matter discussed. The City Engineer reported that the estimated cost of constructing a double track of street railway from King-street down Sunnack and Cherry streets to the Don River and thence south-east across Keating's Channel to the eastern breakwater, to connect with any line traversing the island from its east end west end would be \$95,500, as follows: from King-street to Sunnack and Cherry, to the River Don, \$11,000; from Don to Keating's Channel, \$500; bridge over Keating's Channel, \$70,000; from Keating's Channel eastward to Woodbine-avenue. This estimate does not provide for permanent pavements between the Don and eastern breakwater, nor for the construction of equipment.

The report was made by the Engineer on a motion of what was asked for the cost of extending the street railway system along Sunnack and Cherry streets to the River Don, connecting with any line of street railway traversing the island between its east and west ends, from Bathurst-street, the western breakwater and the Sand Bar at Ashbridge's Bay to Woodbine-avenue.

Sheppard's Scheme. Ald. Sheppard had another scheme, upon which the City Engineer reported. He wanted to know the cost of extending a line down Bathurst-street to the breakwater, crossing to the island by swinging bridge, along the island, keeping the road allowance in the most convenient places, to the eastern channel, connecting it by a swinging bridge to the Sand Bar, south to Ashbridge's Bay, joining the mainland at Woodbine-avenue.

The Engineer reported on this proposal that there were two routes which could be made available to the island, one by a swinging bridge to the Sand Bar, south to Bathurst-street, and the other by way of Bathurst-street to the waterfront, and thence by either route to the Sand Bar, south to Queen's Wharf. He would recommend the latter track service. The length of either route would be a little over eight miles. The City Engineer had reported the terms of the Toronto Railway Company agreement.

**Cost Would Be Heavy.** Mr. East said the estimate cost of a line via Bathurst-street, from King-street to a junction with Queen-street tracks, from Woodbine-avenue would be \$200,837. This estimate is exclusive of any land damages, and does not include cost of track or equipment. The estimated cost of the alternative John-street route would be \$400,170. Both these estimates provide for permanent pavements and contingencies.

The Engineer says that if a sub-line would prove satisfactory a line would be constructed by laying tracks from King-street down Sunnack and Cherry to the Don, and then crossing to the island, where it would have to be crossed by a swinging bridge, the line afterwards following the route to the west of the breakwater, and proposed for the other schemes, but stopping at or near Turner's baths. This would cost \$411,290.

**Municipal Ownership.** Ald. Hubbard thought the schemes were very expensive, and he advocated the city building a line on the island, and then connecting it with the Toronto Railway Company. He suggested that the city should own the line and that the Toronto Railway Company should not be allowed to operate on the island unless the city build a bridge.

The city engineer reported that the city could not build a line on the island, but would be a great convenience.

The report of the Engineer was sent to the Works Committee.

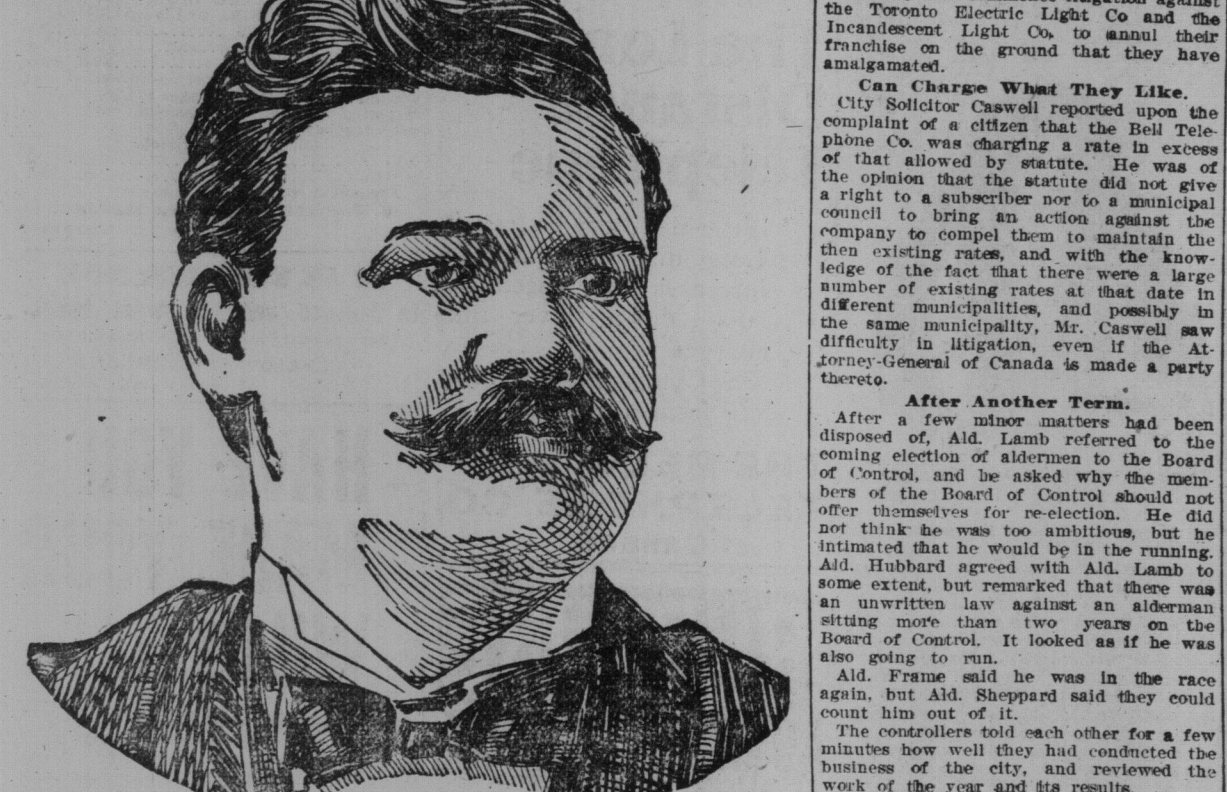
