RAILROADERS' ROOM OPEN.

An Augury of Much Benefit to Grand Trunk Men.

GEN. MAN. HAYS' SPEECH.

He Not Only Sees Moral and Social Good, But Financial Aid.

Are Even An Increase of Dividends Through All Such Agencies as Y.M.C.A.'s if Patronized by the Army of Railway Men—Words of Encouragement and Sanguine Predictions Were Pleas for the Employers to Avail Themselves of the Spindia Institution.

This is the culmination of 20 years of work and prayer... said one of the new railway Y. M. C. A., at the corner of Spadina-avenue and Front-street.

All day the place had been visited by men from the head offices, from the engines or the yards, thus showing their appreciation of the privileges the Grand Trunk had given them.

The chair was taken by Mr. H. O. Williams, general international secretary of the railway Y. M. C. A., and on the platform with him were: Mr. Charles M. Hays, general manager of the Grand Trunk; Mr. C. J. Hicks, grand secretary of the International Association; Mr. S. H. Blake, R. L. Nelles, Berlow Cumberland, John Harvie, C. S. Gzowski, Arthur Burton, F. M. Pratt, secretary of the Central Y. M. C. A., R. J. Colville, G. M. Cook, Thomas S. Cole, travelling secretary; Mr. McDaniel, superintendent of transportation; Mr. Fitzhugh, Supt. D. Morse, Rev. P. C. Parker, and many other prominent railway men.

Its Noble Object. The first speaker was Secretary Hicks. He said the building was for the purpose of giving the men of the road certain privileges which were obvious and which could be got in no other way.

It was a great thing to be a member of this institution for the Grand Trunk at its head, which represented thousands of miles. But they should know above that and consider themselves part of the great brotherhood which were banded together for Christian benefit. They were all doing a grand work.

The membership of the one here entitled the holder to similar privileges in any of the others, which was a thing for men who were all over the country. Other systems than the G. T. were taking in the Grand Trunk, and the great Santa Fe was now making an investigation, as Mr. Hays and the Grand Trunk had. He asked them to forget that the underlying principle of the organization was Christian which did not mean anything narrow or bigoted. It meant that in each association a group of men had caught the spirit to help men and not for self-gain.

The General Manager's Speech. The next speaker was Mr. Charles M. Hays, general manager of the G. T. He received a deafening reception as he rose to address his men. Speaking for Hicks, he said, and the other officials of the road, he was pleased to be present at the opening of the building, but more pleased to stand face to face with so many of the Grand Trunk operators. All the progress of the system was due to the men. The most of the credit of the present opening was due to Mr. Williams and Mr. Hicks. It was through their success in other parts that he had been led to desire such an institution for the men. Nothing was too good for them; the managers alone could do nothing unless they took an interest in the success of the system. The managers got all the abuse of the case might be, but what did they count alongside of their 18,000 operators, brave and true?

A Financial View. Looking at the matter from a material standpoint, he said, if dividends were to be shared at all the Y. M. C. A. would tend to increase them. It one time it was thought the managers had some under-plot in forwarding the movement. That was natural; corporations were always so looked upon. But it was a fact the system did look for financial returns.

Continuing, he said this association would be the model for all the others that they contemplated starting. If it succeeded the others would, and it failed they all would fail. The present enthusiastic crowd bid fair for success.

If for no other reason than that the managers and men could meet in social comfort, the work done would be of great advantage. He did not want it to be a select club, for the few, but for every man on the system and he wanted them to make good use of it. The building was nice, but not too nice; for even grumpy and sooty men. He did not think it hurt a roundhouse to get a coat of whitewash once in a while. Cleanliness gave a man self-respect and if they took care of their own property, they would that of the company.

In conclusion, he speaks of the religious aspect of the matter. Once it was thought that for a railway man to be a Christian was about equal to considering him a fool. But the public view had

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
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
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

### THE JUBILEE RELAY RACE.

On a Sprint From Toronto to Chatham.

### CLEVELAND VERSUS WORLD

Delays of Wheelmen to Race With Messages on June 26.

The World Riders Will Take the Southern Route Through Hamilton, While the Cleveland Racers Will Wheel Up North Via Berlin and Stratford—All for the Cause of Good Roads—To Start in the Morning and End in the Evening.

The World, ever to the fore in the field of honest, athleticism, in order to further the interest and cause of good roads, as well as to draw attention to the fact that the Canadian Wheelmen's Association's annual meet will be held at Chatham on July 1, 2, 3, has entered into a competition to ride a relay race from Toronto to

Chatham, over two separate routes, against H. A. Loder & Co., Toronto.

The race will start from Toronto on Saturday, June 26, at 7 a.m., and if all's well the last relay should arrive in Chatham by 7 o'clock in the evening.

The route chosen by the Cleveland is the north one, which goes through Georgetown, Guelph, Acton, London, and on to Chatham. The southern route, which will be one ridden by The World representatives, goes through Hamilton, Stratford, Woodstock, London and on to Chatham.

Each route will be divided into 25 relays and nine districts.

**EVERYONE WANTS GOOD ROADS.**

With the assistance and co-operation of the wheelmen of Ontario, it should prove quite a factor in good roads reform throughout the province, and should tend forcibly to bring before the notice of our different legislatures the state and condition of the roads of Ontario, as it is the World's intention to collect and file the different reports and publish the same on completion of the race. It is also the idea to show that the bicycle is no longer a mere toy or vehicle for pleasure alone, but an important factor as a means of modern locomotion; also to show the correct riding positions between the different places, as well as the most desirable roads for the benefit of those who are looking for short trips ahead this summer.

The following rules for the Cleveland-World Jubilee Relay Race have been agreed upon by the joint representatives of the two parties interested:

**RULES OF THE RELAY.**

1. Each relay shall consist of two riders, the courier who shall carry the message, and a trailer.
2. Trailers are to start one minute after courier, and in no case shall trailer precede or ride beside the courier by trails.
3. Couriers have right of way over all trailers.
4. At each relay there is to be at least one judge and one timer.

5. Each man of every relay team is to wear a distinctive badge, which shall be procured from chairman of district.
6. Couriers on the northern, or Cleveland route, shall wear a purple badge; trailers on this route shall wear a green badge.
7. Couriers on the southern, or World route, shall wear a red badge; trailers on this route shall wear a white badge.
8. Riders in all races to confine themselves to the roadway, and in no case to use side walks.
9. Timers will set their watches by standard time G.T.R.
10. Names of riders should be in the hands of committee seven days prior to the race, with the relay each team will ride.
11. In case of sickness or accident, which may prevent regular entry from starting, a substitute may take his place providing the chairman of the district be notified before commencement of race.
12. Race to start at 5 a.m. from Toronto, at the corner of King and Yonge-streets.
13. Rules of the C. W. A. and Century Road Club to govern any point not covered by the foregoing.
14. The Toronto World is the official or in same shall be deemed official.
15. Chairmen of districts are requested to appoint umpires, judges and timers at all places where necessary.
16. H. H. Macnamara is chairman of Cleveland-World Relay Race Committee, with address, The Toronto World.

**FULL REPORTS WANTED.**

As the principal object of this relay is to collect evidence and draw attention to the class and state of the roads throughout the province the committee are requested to send in a full and concise report of roads in their districts as soon as possible. All the reports will be compiled and forwarded to the Local Legislature.

Chairmen of districts are requested to send in as soon as possible at what point and in what order the packet will be exchanged.



Improvements in Passenger Service With Summer Train - Niagara Falls and Muskoka - Changes of Officials. When the summer time-table goes into effect on the 14th inst., on the G.T.R. system, there will be a general improvement in the passenger service, and better time will be the order of the day.

PEDLARS' LICENSES.

Protest Against the Low Rates Being Signed by Merchants, Mechanics and Property Owners. The following petition to raise the pedlars' licenses is being extensively signed: "We, the undersigned storekeepers, merchants, and property owners, do hereby protest against the injustice of the city of Toronto in issuing licenses to street pedlars and house-to-house canvassers at the rate of from 10c to 50c per year, believing that it is ruinous to our storekeepers, who rely on their store for their living etc."

VICE-PRESIDENT RANNEY OF THE WABASH RAILROAD.

Buffalo, June 4.—Joshua Ranney, Jr., vice-president and general manager of the Wabash Railroad, arrived in Buffalo today to make arrangements for running the Wabash trains between Detroit and Buffalo on June 13. He was shown a despatch from Windsor, Ont., which stated that vigorous protests are being made in that city against the plans of the Wabash and Grand Trunk Railways regarding the employment of American crews while running their trains between Detroit and Suspension Bridge via the Canadian route.

NERVOUSNESS AND STOMACH TROUBLES FOLLOWED-SLEEP AT TIMES WAS IMPOSSIBLE-HEALTH AGAIN RESTORED.

From The Amherst, N.S., Sentinel. The little village of Pettitcodiac is situated in the south-easterly part of New Brunswick, on the line of the Intercolonial Railway. Mr. Herbert Yeomans, who resides there, follows the occupation of a hunter and trapper. His occupation requires him to endure a great deal of exposure and hardship, more especially when the snow lies thick and deep on the ground in our cold winters. A few years ago Mr. Yeomans fell out of a tree, and was seized with a severe bilious attack and a complication of diseases, such as sour stomach, sick headache and rheumatism. Mr. Yeomans' version of the facts is:

THE LATE LIEUT.-GEN. HEWETT.

He Was Well Known in Canada-The End Came Suddenly. The death is announced of Lieut.-Col. Edward Osborne Hewett, C.M.G., Governor of the Royal Military Academy at Woolwich, who died suddenly yesterday. Lieut.-Col. Hewett was well known in Canada, where he was engaged in the construction of the fortifications of the country, as commanding the Royal Engineers of Ontario, west of Toronto, and as founder of the Royal Military College at Kingston. The cause of death is attributed to blood poisoning. Some time ago the officer met with an accident, which resulted in a fracture of the leg. Mrs. Arthur Grassett, wife of the late Mr. Arthur Grassett, of Danforth, is a daughter of Lieut.-Col. Hewett.

THE SON GRABBED THE AX AND THE FATHER RAN FOR HIS SHOULDER.

St. Catharines, Ont., June 4.—As Patrick Kelly, who resides with Mr. Newell on the farm in Grantham, was engaged splitting wood, his son Joseph drove into the yard and requested some articles of furniture which were in his father's possession. In the excitement of the moment the son grasped the ax. At this the father secured a shotgun, and before it could be taken from him he sent the entire contents of the weapon into the young man's body. The charge lodged in Joseph's thigh, and John Nagle, who was in charge of the rig, took Kelly to the hospital.

A CYCLONIC STORM.

The Town of Westmoreland, N.Y., Badly Shaken. Utica, N.Y., June 4.—A cyclonic storm swept over a territory about 20 miles long and a half mile wide in the western central part of this county yesterday. Great damage was done by the wind, especially in the town of Westmoreland, where at least half a dozen barns were blown down and other houses are moved from their foundations. In one barn Mrs. Charles Cook took refuge with her three years old. The barn fell in the storm and Mrs. Cook was instantly killed and the boy crushed so badly that he cannot live.
