# ROJESTVENSKY RUNS AWAY BALTIC FLEET GOING HOME

## Japan Announces That Czar's Admiral Fears a Conflict With Admiral Togo's Battleships

Tokio, Jan. 9.-The secret service department of the Japanese navy has deunitely informed the government that Russia's Baltic fleet is on its way back to Europe. This information, posted to-night in the imperial navy board, explains the prolonged stay here of Admiral Togo and Vice Admiral Kamimura. From the beginning Japan has been accurately informed with regard to both divisions of the Baltic fleet, and is now able to announce that the warships are returning.

They will go thru the Suez Canal in three divisions, the first led by Admiral Botrovsky on the battleship Oleg. He has with him trhee cruisers, two colliers and a small torpedo boat flot the Baltic squadron would sail as far as the South China Sea, in which event its return would have been doubtful. Admiral Rejestvensky's division of warsnips was south of Diego Saurez Bay yesterday, the imperial board is informed, but it would be iangerous for him to remain on the northeast coast of Madagascar for aluy lengthy period. His return thru the canal could be cut off by Jan 20. It is expected here that he will sail not later than Wednesday for Port Said. 

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

Commission of Harvard College Arrives at This Conclusion After Experimenting Four Years

the conclusions arrived at by the cancer commission of Harvard Medical College, composed of seven physicians who have been experimenting on the disease for the past four years, and whose report is now in the hands of the who have been experimenting on the disease for the past four years, and whose report is now in the hands of the printer. There is no other known cure except in the mildest cases, when the X-ray sometimes succeeds, the commission says. The research has been made with a fund of \$100,000 left by Mrs. Caroline Brewer Croft to Harvard for this specific purpose. A member of her family died of cancer and this caused her to leave money, hoping to benefit mankind by having a corps of experts thoroly investigate the subject. Dr. E. H. Nichols, who had charge of the laboratory work, said to-day:

"Our work thus far has been to find the cause of origin of cancer and we have been unable to do so, altho we have exploded popular theories. When we know what life is, I think we will then know what cancer is. No more is known about its origin now than at the beginning of the Christian era, It is a supreme mystery. On present lines of investigation the cause of true cancer will never be learned. Our only hope is in some new method. No its covery has been made which offers any hope of cure of cancer which begins to compare with the surgeon's knife.







REGIPROCITY

The New York Sun Says No Need It With Canada.

N.Y. Sun: Canada is already so go a customer of ours that all talk about the need of reciprocity to hold or stimulate the demand for our products from our northern neighbors is really

a waste of words.

We increased our exports to Canada from a value of \$32,000,000 in 1873 to \$131,000,000 in 1904, fiscal year, and when the statistics for the calendar year are made up they are likely to reach \$150, 000,000. That is a pretty good showing, with tariff conditions as they are. In 1873 the balance of trade was toward five million dollars in favor of Canada, but for the next six years it was steadily in our favor by from nearly four millions to more than 13 millions are also.

lions yearly.

The next year, 1880, it was against us by about three and a half millions, and in 1881 it was about even. In 1882 the amount against us rose to more than 14 millions. In the fallowing three years it averaged about two millions a

years it averaged about two initions a year in our favor.

It was then that we unwisely tried reciprocity. What was the result? We went behind an average of nearly three million a year for six years. Then we found out that the reciprocity was a better thing for Canada than for us. Our minds have remained the same ever since, and the conviction has been strengthened by the increase of our strengthened by the increase of our yearly exports to Canada from about \$43.000,000 in 1892 to \$131,000,000 in 1904. \$43.000,000 in 1892 to \$131.000,000 in 1904, and of our trade basance from eight millions to 75 millions of dollars.

This growth has been in spite of efforts in the later years to turn the tide of Canadian imports in favor of Great Britain by tariff preferentials of from 12 1-2 per cent, to the present British preferential of 33 1-3 per cent.

Instead of hurting us, the tide has been still more strongly in favor of the United States. The long and the short of the matter is that the Canadians jump over the imaginary boundary line between their Dominion and the United States, and buy American goods because they pre-fer them and get quicker deliveries-in
