An estimate of the Austrian losses in the Goritz engagement is furnished by the correspondent of the Daily Telegraph at Milan who wiress—Their losses were enormous. Not many of the defending army had time to retreat. A Swiss correspondent on the Austrian side says: "I saw on Podgora, on Sabotino and on Monte Santo lines upon lines of Austrian corpus, exposed as if for a review of the dead. "The work of the Italian artillery was systematic. Every inch of the Aus-trian trenches and secret lakes was mapped out and each battery had its work assigned. The Italian infantry accomplished the remainder by a series of bril-liant assaults. They approached the Austrians from one quarter through sub-terramen galleries to within forty yards and in another forded and swam the Isoneo in the face of a hall of shells and rille fire. "At a third point the engineers threw bridges across the stream to hurry or reinforcements. Detachments of the Casale and Pasts brigades received order, to cross. Into the rive troops plunged, wading waist deep, holding their rilles high, while others carried band greasdes bigh in the air. All crossed within half an hour and entered the town."
