



At its quarterly meeting in St. An-Irew's church yesterday the St. John Presbytery approved the purchase of a manse and a site for a church in

resbytery approved the purchase of a manse and a site for a church in East St. John, where it is proposed to carry on co-operative work with the Methodist denomination. Rev. W. W. Malcolm, of St. Stephen, the moderator, was presiding and Rev. Dr. J. S. Sutherland, of Fredericton, carried out his duties as clerk.

Religious education for the young was discussed at length and a report was given of the successful operation of week-day religious instruction classes in Chipman. A report was to be brought in with regard to the use of school buildings for religious instruction. The need of greater encouragement of Sunday school work was specially stressed in view of the fact that attendance at Sunday schools had dropped although the enrollment had increased.

Attention was drawn to the fact that only two-thirds of the budget allocation had been subscribed by the St. John Presbytery during the last year and in order to stimulate giving it was decided to ask Rev. Dr. A. S. Fraser, of Trinidad, to make a visitation of the congregations and also to have a conference on the budget giving at the September meeting of the Presbytery.

It was admitted that most of the ministers want it and that their limitation of persuasive effort is reflected in the General Assembly, but it is denied that that body really reflects the views of the congregations, of which the great majority are held to be in unerring-fidelity to the Auld Kirk. 


