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## REPORT OF THE SESSION.

The Session, in submitting its report for the past vear (1894), does so with feelings of thanksgiving, not unmixed with sadness and sorrow. Of thanksgiving because of the many encouraging circumstances connected with the congregation, these being—a desire on the part of many for a higher and holier life, and a riper Christian experience; the spirit of unity and brotherly love that prevails; Christian activity and usefulness, and a display of zeal in the service of the Master. Of sadness, because of the number of those with whom we have held sweet fellowship having been translated from the church militant to the church triumphant. The Session tenders its warmest sympathy to the bereaved families. Besides the adult members who have been taken away we have to record the removal of some of the lambs of the fold children of tender years—who, having heard the gentle voice of the Good Shepherd, are now eternally folded in His arms and resting in His bosom.

In a special degree, as a congregation, we sorrow over the loss of our beloved pastor, Rev. James Allister Murray, who, for nineteen years, went in and out among us, breaking the Bread of Life, sympathizing with those in distress and trouble, consoling the sorrowful, and by his public ministration of the Word of Life, leading the church into green pastures and by still waters. For ourselves, and on behalf of the congregation, we blend our grief with that of the stricken

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family, and bow with reverent submission to the dispensation of Divine Providence. As the reports of the various organizations of the congregation will be found elsewhere, we content ourselves here with wishing them all God-speed in their efforts to bless humanity and advance the Redeemer's kingdom.

The additions to the Communion Roll during the year were: By profession of faith in Jesus Christ, 25; by certificate, 28; the withdrawals, by change of residence, 30; by death, 14; leaving a net gain of 9; making the present membership 773. The Baptisms were 14 infants and 4 adults.

We would acknowledge the useful service rendered by Mr. Wm. Patterson, B. A., of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, who, for four months during the summer, filled our pulpit with acceptance and profit to the congregation. Our prayers and good wishes go with him, and our strongest hopes for his future success, as an ambassador of our Lord Jesus Christ. We would also record our indebtedness to the various ministers who have occupied our pulpit; no doubt at considerable inconvenience to themselves, certainly to our advantage and profit. At the request of the Session the Rev. E. H. Sawers, of Westminster, was appointed Moderator during the vacancy.

On Sabbath morning, the 9th of December, our pulpit was declared vacant by Rev. Mr. Sawers; since which time, the Session, amidst many difficulties, has put forth its best efforts to secure suitable candidates for the pastorate, and we trust when the church shall be called upon to announce its choice we may find that the decision is one approved of God, and thus for the highest interests of the congregation.

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Though there are encouraging features in our church work we feel that our labors have not been as profitable and successful as they might, yea, ought to have been. We, therefore, devoutly urge upon all our members, adherents and office bearers, renewed consecration to the service of our Lord, knowing their efforts cannot fail or be in vain in the Lord.

## THE FORTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

# BOARD OF MANAGERS

BEING FOR THE YEAR 1894.

The Board of Managers, in submitting their Forty-fourth Annual Report, deplore the loss which the congregation and city sustained by the death of their late pastor, the Rev. J. Allister Murray, whose ministry in St. Andrew's Church was productive of much good, and whose life and character were an example to all. His eloquence in the pulpit and his untiring exertions in attending to all the work of the congregation endeared him to everyone. His death occurred on the 21st day of October.

To Mrs. Murray the Managers extend their strongest sympathy, and submit that in view of the long and earnest services of Mr. Murray and in keeping with his generous disposition, it is the duty of the congregation to do whatever they deem reasonable for Mrs. Murray, and thereby lessen the effect of her great loss.

The congregation have shown their unity and loyalty to St. Andrew's during the year by maintaining their regular attendance and increasing their subscriptions, the total sum collected for all purposes being \$9,701.31. This is the more praiseworthy when we consider the unusual depression everywhere pre-

vailing, and that the pulpit has been for the most partfilled by strangers.

We will report under the different headings: Finance, Pew and Music, and Improvement and Cemetery.

FINANCE.

The total receipts for the year ending 31st December—including weekly contributions, \$5,341.20; collections, \$467.75; sundries, \$32.34—have been \$5,841.29, and the expenditure has been \$5,960.66, leaving a deficit of \$119.37. This deficit has been covered by a loan of \$125.00, leaving a balance on hand of \$5.63.

In comparing the revenue from weekly contributions and collections with that of the previous year from the same sources, it shows an increase of \$252.42 in the envelopes and a decrease of \$88.30 in the open collections. The revenue for the year amounts to \$6.77 per sitting.

The canvass of the congregation undertaken by the Managers in the early part of the year with the object of increasing the revenue, though not wholly meeting our anticipations, still had an undoubted beneficial effect.

#### PEW AND MUSIC.

Throughout the year there has been great demand for pews downstairs, and consequently there are few sittings unoccupied in the body of the church, though there are still some good pews vacant in the gallery.

The congregation is reminded that it is from the Pew Committee, and not from previous holders, that sittings are obtained, and that it is to the Committee that sittings revert when no longer occupied.

Attention is also called to the necessity of immediate notice being given whenever any person has occasion to vacate sittings. It is not unusual that the only intimation of the removal of such parties is through the secretary reporting that no envelope contributions are being received. It would be of great advantage to the congregation if a definite, limited time of not less than three months were fixed, at the end of which sittings that have not been occupied, and whose holders have ceased to contribute, should be at the disposal of the Pew Committee.

On the retirement of Messrs. Jas. Gillean and Donald McDonald, who for so many years, and with such great and universal satisfaction, acted as ushers, the following were appointed in their stead: Messrs. Walter Laidlaw, Jas. Davis, Ralph Gillespie, Fred. Nelles, Alex. Calder, B. Glover, O. Leslie, John Harvey, R. McDermid, A. McPherson, Jas. Waters, C. Campbell and H. McDougall.

Our organist, Mr. C. E. Wheeler, asked and obtained leave of absence for one year from August 15th, in order to pursue his studies in Germany. In his absence the services as organist are being very acceptably performed by Mr. Wm. Ellis.

#### IMPROVEMENT AND CEMETERY.

The Improvement and Cemetery Committee has kept your property in the best possible state of repair with the strictest regard to economy. The chief items of expense were: Drain from manse which had become blocked up with roots of trees; relaying the walks on the west side of the church; levelling of the

boulevard and erection of a fence to the sheds. The cost of the work will be found in the financial statement.

The cemetery has been duly cared for. Your Committee would recommend that, while the Board exercises a general supervision over the cemetery, in future, owners attend to the repair of monuments and proper care of plots.

Under the head of the Improvement and Debt Fund, your Committee has completed the changes commenced during the year 1893, and have refitted the Sabbath School Class Rooms at a cost of \$1,055.45. During the year 1895 it is the intention of the Board to proceed with improvements in the body of the church, or apply the funds in hand as the congregation shall direct. Your Committee gratefully acknowledges its gratitude to the congregation for its liberal contributions, and to the Ladies' of the congregation and the Christian Endeavor Society, through whose generous efforts the sum of \$214.00 was raised to aid us in the work.

The amount contributed to this fund up to the present time, Jan. 26th, is \$2,197.16. The amount on hand to the credit of the fund is \$1,064.87.

The Board respectfully recommends that the expenditure in connection with our Central Sabbath School be sent in monthly to the Managers, and that all expenditures be sent to the Board through the Chairman of a Sabbath School Committee, to be appointed by the Board.

You will be called upon to elect six Managers in the place of G. A. Somerville, M. H. Rowland, R. A. Gray, J. B. Laidlaw, Jas. Houston and R. A. Little, whose te are eligi

The Treasurer's detailed statement has been checked with his books and vouchers, certified to by your Auditors, and submitted herewith for your consideration.

The best thanks of the congregation for their efficient services are due and are hereby tendered to the ladies of the congregation, the choir, the ushers, the Christian Endeavor Society, and the auditors, for their valuable services during the year.

### THE MINUTES OF THE

# ANNUAL MEETING

The Annual Meeting of St. Andrew's congregation was held in the Lecture Room on the evening of Tuesday, January 22, 1895.

Mr. Alex. Fraser opened the meeting with devotional exercises.

On motion of Mr. Mills, Mr. R. A. Little, chairman of the Board of Managers, was appointed chairman.

The Managers' Report and Treasurer's Statement were submitted for the consideration of the meeting.

On motion of Mr. Mills, seconded by Mr. Rowland, the report was taken as read, and considered clause by clause.

Clauses 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9, as printed in the Managers' Report, were, after considerable general discussion, adopted.

Clause 10. On motion of Mr. McGregor, seconded by Mr. Gillean, this clause was adopted with the following addition, "That the Pew Committee be empowered to select ushers for the present year, and endeavor, as far as possible, to retain the services of those who acted last year."

Clauses 11 and 12 were read and agreed to.

Clause 13, in reference to the cemetery, was then read. After considerable discussion as to the advisability of closing this cemetery entirely and making

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some arrangement for removing the bodies to one of the more distant cemeteries, it was moved by Mr. Cowan, seconded by Mr. McCallum, and agreed, "That this clause be adopted with the addition that a Special Committee, composed of Messrs. Jas. Cowan, John Ferguson and C. McCallum, be appointed to take into consideration the cemetery in all its bearings, and report at next Annual Meeting."

Clause 14 was read. On motion of Dr. Macarthur, seconded by C. McCallum, it was adopted with the following addition, "That \$800.00 of the amount on hand be used to pay off a liability note of \$800.00, which has been carried for some years by the Managing Board."

Clause 15 was, on motion, changed to read as follows: "The Board respectfully recommends that the expenditure in connection with the Central Sabbath School be sent in monthly to the Managers, and that all expenditures be sent to the Board through the Chairman of a Sabbath School Committee, to be appointed by the Board."

Clause 16, referring to election of six Managers in place of those retiring, was read. Moved by James Mills, and seconded by Wm. Stevely, "That the Nominating Committee be not now appointed, but that this Representative Meeting of St. Andrew's Church proceed, without delay, to nominate and elect Managers to take the place of those retiring, and that the former way of nominating candidates for Managers by a Nominating Committee be hereby cancelled."

Motion lost.

The Chairman then appointed Messrs. Jas. Mc-

Sween and Alex. Gillean on the Nominating Committee from the Managing Board, and the meeting, on motion, appointed Messrs. Alex. Fraser, O. B. Leslie and Frank Love.

The Nominating Committee then withdrew, and later on submitted the names of six candidates, as follows: Messrs. Geo. A. Somerville, R. A. Gray, J. B. Laidlaw, Jas. Houston, J. W. McIntosh and Allan McPherson.

Moved by Mr. McGregor, and seconded by Mr. Ferguson, that these persons named be elected Managers for 1895.

Carried.

Clauses 17, 18 and 19 were agreed to.

The following motion was adopted: "That in compliance with the recommendation of the report of the Board of Managers the sum of one thousand dollars be granted to Mrs. Murray, being two hundred dollars each year during the next five years, payable quarterly in sums of fifty dollars each. That the Managers be authorized and requested to continue to pay to Mrs. Murray, while the pulpit remains vacant, the difference between Mr. Murray's salary and the amount paid for supply up to 1st July, 1895."

Mr. Alex. McIntosh was re-appointed Secretary-Treasurer, and Messrs. C. R. Somerville and F. W. Merchant were re-appointed auditors.

The amount of \$80.00 was voted to the North Mission S. S., and the amount of \$145.25 was voted to the Central Sabbath School.

A vote of thanks was tendered to the Chairman, Mr. R. A. Little, after which the meeting was closed with the benediction.

# St. Andrew's Sabbath School Report for 1894.

A review of our Sabbath School work for the year just closed presents many features for thanksgiving to the Great Head of the Church. A goodly number of the scholars, during the year, made a public profession of their faith in Jesus as their Saviour. This, we believe, is only an earnest of the good work which is being quietly but honestly done for the Master.

In common with the rest of the congregation we mourn the loss of our pastor, Rev. J. Allister Murray. His cheerful and encouraging words and wise counsels

are greatly missed by us.

Early in the spring the Board of Managers undertook and completed the long needed improvements necessary to make the school room habitable. light and class accommodation are now as good as it is possible to make them in a basement.

The number of pupils on the roll is not as large as it was last year, and there is a corresponding decrease in the average attendance. The falling off is in the junior classes; the attendance in the senior classes

being even better than it was in 1893.

The pupils in the Chinese Class have been more uniformly regular in their attendance, and apparently they are taking a deeper interest in religious instructions.

The collections for missionary purposes amounted to \$247.37, which is \$24.42 less than was raised in 1893. Besides the foregoing three classes of girls gave special collections which amounted to \$16.30, which makes the total raised for missions \$263.67.

The senior class of boys contributed an average of 90 cents per Sabbath. We commend their example to the rest of the School.

OF THE

## North Presbyterian Sabbath School

IN CONNECTION WITH

ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH, LONDON, FOR THE YEAR 1894.

To the Session of St. Andrew's Church:

Brethren,—In submitting this, the Seventh Annual Report of our North Sabbath School, we acknowledge the goodness of God in many blessings bestowed upon us in connection with our work. We have had a year of uninterrupted systematic work along the line of the International Bible Lessons and the Shorter Cathechism. A spirit of hearty co-operation has prevailed among us, and evidences of increasing interest in, and faithful study of, God's Word have been manifest.

Our school is now fairly well equipped, and we have tried to use all the means and opportunities our Heavenly Father has given us for the extension of His kingdom in the hearts of His children, and for the honor of His name.

We have also had some discouragements. All parents do not co-operate as they ought. This always results in a loss of efficiency in Sabbath School work. The removal of quite a number of our scholars has reduced our membership, and the resignation of several of our teachers has somewhat disorganized our classes No department of our congregational work presents

just now a better field for the earnest and energetic work of our Christian Endeavor Society than the work in connection with our North School.

We have greatly missed the wise counsel and ripe experience of the Rev. Mr. Gordon, who has been laid aside from active work. We trust that he may realize the blessing of the promise, "that at evening time it shall be light." We also feel the loss of our brother, Mr. Nelles and family, with their earnest, active interest in the work of the school, and we trust the Master may soon constrain others to take their places.

Our membership has decreased a little since last report, being now: Fourteen teachers, officers, and 120 scholars—with three classes vacant. The Wednesday evening Prayer Meeting has been regularly held, with a varying attendance, the smallest being 12, and the largest 42, with an average of about 18. We trust that when a new pastor takes his place among us this meeting may be made more efficient and be better sustained.

The usual Anniversary Services of the school were held in January, and were successful and greatly enjoyed.

We cannot close our report without joining with you and the whole congregation in expressing the deep sorrow we feel that our late beloved pastor is no longer present with us, but has been called home to his reward by Him who doeth all things well. Deeply interested in the Christian training of the children as he was, he always had a special interest in the work of our North School, which he was the means of organizing. His kindly advice and cheerful encour-

FOR 1894.

In presenting our Annual Report we do so with feelings of gratitude to God for all His goodness to us during the year now closing. We trust our efforts have been a means of grace to ourselves in leading us to a higher spiritual life, as well as a blessing to our perishing sisters in heathen lands, to whom we have been enabled to send the Gospel of Christ. Meetings have been held regularly every month. It has been the aim of the Society to make them as pleasant and instructive as possible. Besides devotional exercises, missionary intelligence is received fresh from the field, the work is discussed, and extracts on subjects of interest are frequently read. Through the missionary letters in the "Leaflet" we are kept in touch with the work in India and China, in the North-West and the Islands of the Pacific, we become acquainted with the workers individually, and in some means share in the joys and sorrows of our far-away sisters. We sincerely regret that so many of the women of our church should, by their absence, have failed to enjoy or benefit by the information given, or the words spoken at these meetings. Our membership is forty-five, average attendance twenty—a small number out of so large a congregation. In response to an appeal for help for the North-West, clothing and furnishings, valued at \$113.60, were sent to the school at Regina. We are pleased to note that this particular branch of our work—the sending aid to the heathen of our own country—is nowise abating.

Our Thank-offering Service was held in November. To those present it was enjoyable and profitable; the offering amounting to \$31.37. We feel we cannot close this report without referring to the great sorrow that has come to our President, Mrs. Murray, in the removal by death of our dear pastor. We extend to her our sincere sympathy, and pray that the God of all consolation may comfort her in this time of trial. May we, all of us, solemnly realize our responsibility, and "Work while it is called to-day, for the night cometh when no one can work."



In submitting our fifth Annual Report, we desire to express our thanksgiving to God for the way in which He has led us during the past year. Truly we have been led by the loving hand of an Eternal Father, and His all sufficient eye hath guided us.

We would like to make special mention of an interesting meeting held on the evening of Dec. 31st, 1894. As it was our last meeting together, we arranged to have all the members present who were in the city,

We had eight letters in all—received from Edinburgh, Scotland, California, British Columbia, Detroit, etc. Everyone present enjoyed these breezy New Year messages. We had the pleasure of having with us that evening Rev. Mr. McWilliams, Peterboro'; Rev. Mr. Freeman, St. Paul, Minn.; and Mr. Solman, each of whom addressed us briefly with words of encouragement. 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# Women's Visiting and Aid Society.

Although our membership remains about the same, still we are glad to be able to report an increased average attendance at our meetings, which proves that the interest of the women of the congregation in our work is growing.

It will be seen by referring to the Treasurer's Report that the sum collected by the District Visitors is slightly less than last year, but not so much as to render it necessary for us to reduce the amounts given to those for whom we specially ask help.
