This shall be known as "Newfoundland Time," and shall be applicable to the whole colony.

POSTAL TELEGRAPH OFFICES are operated throughout the Colony at all the principal places. Messages of ten words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word.

A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 85 cents to \$1.00.

A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.50.

To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word.

Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the messages may be left with the P. M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.

Newfoundland Patriotic Association Employment Committee

The Employment Committee has been appointed by the Newfoundland Patriotic Association to take into consideration applications for employment in civil life from returned Soldiers and Sailors of the Newfoundland Regiment and Newfoundland Royal Naval Reserve who have been granted honourable discharges. The Committee can only perform this duty to our returned soldiers and sailors with the fullest help and co-operation of all those in the Colony who employ labour or require help or service of any kind in which these men may be employed. The Committee will prepare and keep on file a register of all men seeking employment, giving their age, qualifications and experience, so far as possible, of each applicant. This information will be available to prospective employers, and steps will be taken to bring about interview or correspondence between employers and soldier or sailor applicants. Every person or firm when requiring such help for either domestic or business purposes is therefore invited to communicate to the Committee the nature of the help required, and of the work to be done, and such other information as may be useful. For the present the Headquarters of the Committee are at the Colonial Building, St. John's, and communications should be addressed to A. E. Parsons, Secretary of the Employment Committee.







Over \$20 but not exceeding \$30	15 cts
Over \$30 but not exceeding \$40	20 cts
Over \$40 but not exceeding \$50	25 cts
Over \$50 but not exceeding \$60	30 cts
Over \$60 but not exceeding \$70	35 cts
Over \$70 but not exceeding \$80	40 cts
Over \$80 but not exceeding \$90	45 cts
Over \$90 but not exceeding \$100	50 cts

Maximum amount of a single Order to any of the above countries and at offices in Newfoundland, \$100, but as many may be obtained as the remitter requires.

Public Notice

The attention of the Public is called to Section 32 of the Post Office Act, 1891, which provides that the P. M. General has the "sole and exclusive privilege of conveying, receiving, collecting, sending and delivering of letters within and from Newfoundland. It is therefore unlawful for letters to be handed to passengers or conveyed by passengers clear of the Post Office, and any person may, and every person employed in the Post Office service shall seize any letters so unlawfully collected, sent or delivered in violation of the Act, and take them to the nearest post office and give such information to the Postmaster as he is able to give and is necessary for the effectual prosecution of the offender."

ORDER IN COUNCIL

Made under The War Measure Act, 1914-1916

"All stocks of Salt held by mercantile firms, or their agents in St. John's, at Battle Harbor, and at other places as may hereafter be designated by proclamation, are hereby placed under the control of the Tonnage Committee of the Executive Council, and no such Salt shall be sold, delivered or otherwise dealt with except under the authority of the said Tonnage Committee.

"The violation of this Order shall be an offence triable before any magistrate, on conviction the offender shall be liable to a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars and in default of payment to imprisonment not exceeding three months.

The Motor that Makes the Mark



Published by Authority

For the information of persons belonging to Newfoundland who propose to go to the United States of America, notice is hereby given that the Immigration Laws of the United States, which came into effect on the first May last, provide:

1.—That all aliens entering the United States shall pay a tax of \$8, but children under sixteen years of age, accompanying their father or their mother, shall not be subject to such tax. In the case of persons not remaining sixty days in the United States, the said tax will be returned upon their leaving the country.

2.—All aliens over sixteen years of age, who cannot read the English language, or some other language, will not be permitted to enter.

3.—Amongst other classes of aliens not admitted into the United States are the following:—Idiot, insane, epileptic, pauper, those physically defective and children under sixteen who are unaccompanied.

Cases have been brought to the notice of the Government where Newfoundlanders for one or other of the above reasons have been refused admission to the United States, and much disappointment and inconvenience, as well as expense, has been the result.

Soft-Cured Will Slump

It looks as if the fishermen are going to lose a lot of money this Fall by having cured their fish for Labrador Soft, or Labrador Slop as some call it. No doubt they were induced to do so by the high prices paid for this particular quality the past three years—last Fall in particular. The conditions this season are quite different from those that existed last year.

At the present time the outlook for getting this kind of fish to the only markets that will take it—Italy and Greece—is very bad, and even if those markets are not shut off altogether, the cost of freight, insurance, and war risk up the Mediterranean will be so great that exporters will be practically prohibited from sending fish there.

Some fifty schooners have already arrived home to Wesleyville and adjacent ports with an aggregate catch of over 50,000 quintals of fish. We are informed that three-fourths of this is heavy salted and cured as slop fish. By soaking it out well in the "trams horn" some prudent shippers, when they found out how conditions stood, have managed to convert it into hard cured; but it cannot possibly be ever as good fish as if it had been salted for dry cure in the first place. This fish is too fat and thick for soft cure, and should never have been treated in this way. Turned into hard cure it is the very article that the Brazil market wants and there would be no difficulty in selling any quantity in St. John's the coming Fall for \$9.00 or \$9.50.

As for St. John's, there will be so much of it in the market by the end of October that, for our part, we look for a slump down to \$6.00 a quintal, unless something that we are now unable to foresee turns up.—Trade Review.

Jury's Verdict On Mine Disaster

Sydney, N. S., August 3.—The Inquest into the New Waterford colliery explosion concluded to night at nine o'clock, and two hours later the Coroners jury brought in a verdict severely censuring the company's officials, and reprimanding the Deputy Inspector, for not giving evidence.

The chief witnesses to-day were Manager Angus Macdonald and the several over-men of the colliery. The jurors wished to have Deputy Inspector of Mines McIntosh examined, but counsel on behalf of its chief inspector, Mr. Donkin, objected on the ground that the Deputy Inspector was there in his official capacity. The verdict was as follows:— "We the jury empanelled to inquire into the death of the men killed in the explosion in Dominion No 12 on July 25, 1917, agree that the sixty five men more or less, came to their death at Dominion No 12 through an explosion caused by ignition by some means of which we are not sure, and have come to the conclusion that the gross irregularity of mining as followed in this mine has been largely responsible for the retention of this gas, thereby causing an explosion resulting in the death of those men, and find the officials guilty of gross neglect.

"Further, we submit that the action of Deputy Inspector McIntosh in not giving evidence, is a wrong position for him to take, and would call the attention of the Minister of Mines to his action. We further recommend the following:— "That the Inspector and Deputy Inspector of Mines be recognized as eligible witnesses at a coroner's inquest, and further recommend a thorough investigation into this explosion which took place on July 25, 1917."

A Big Haul

A letter received in town from Bonavista Bay gives an account of an interesting porpoise hunt by some of the fishermen of Southern Bay and vicinity recently. The fishing boats were all on the grounds but were meeting with little success. Suddenly an enormous school of porpoises was sighted less than a hundred yards from the grounds. The boats on sighting them at once hauled up their anchors and gave chase. A semi-circle was formed around the school by the boats which kept closing in while at the same time the fishermen kept up a disturbance in the water with their oars and the porpoises which, as is well known, go along by alternately diving and coming to the surface, were gradually driven towards the land and ultimately ashore on a mud bank, where the men could "gad" them at their ease. There were in the school nearly 600 of the immense sea hogs and very few if any escaped. These mammals, which by nature greatly resemble the whale, yield an enormous amount of oil, which is quite valuable, and if the successful hunters get a market for their supply they will do well.—Herald.

Greece with the Allies

London, Aug. 18.—In reply to a question in the Commons to-day Foreign Secretary Balfour said Greece was now definitely at war with Germany, Austria, Turkey and Bulgaria. In a statement at the time of the assembling of the Greek Parliament last month, Premier Venizelos said Greece was in the war with the Entente. No formal declaration to this effect was considered necessary, the Venizelos Government, established at Salonika before the deposition of King Constantine, having declared war and placed troops in the field.

Codfish

Over a thousand quintals of new codfish were brought into town on carts during the past week, and sold at the different merchants stores. The prices paid ranged from \$9.50 for the run of the trap to \$10.00 for large hook and line fish. Those who are selling now at these figures are, we think, acting wisely. The freighting difficulties as foreign markets are going to become worse as the season advances, and the prospective large catch will make it merchants very careful and char stocking up holdings.

Codfish.—Common codfish is now beginning to come in in large quantities. The demand is not quite so good as last week, and most of the sellers, had to be satisfied with \$195 a ton, though \$200 is still being given in the outports. Refined codfish shows even a more decided weakness, and it is only by scouring the town that \$1.50 per gallon can be got this week. The number of licenses issued to manufacturers this season, by the Marine and Fisheries Dept. is about 250, which is slightly in excess of last year's record. In view of the big fishery this year, refined oil is not likely to advance.—Trade Review, Aug. 11.

A New Mining Field

For some years past explorers and trappers have been bringing back from northern Manitoba reports of the existence of deposits of metallic ores. Gold mines are also being developed in the region east of Lake Winnipeg, and near the north-western boundary of the Province, in the Lake Athabaskan region, immense deposits of copper sulphide ore have been discovered, in which veins of gold quartz are found, and from which good returns are being obtained. Several properties are now being developed by a syndicate but they are handicapped in their operations by lack of labour, by the difficulty of obtaining the necessary machinery and by the lack of transportation facilities. One company has built 3,000 tons of ore a distance of 80 miles to Sturgeon Landing, from which point it can be conveyed by water to Mile 82 of the Hudson Bay Railway.

If we read aright "the signs of the last three months, the Russian revolution has given birth to a man of heroic mould. Though he is not yet out of his thirties, Kerensky, all aflame with the spirit of freedom is leading Russia brilliantly and wisely. He is sacrificing himself for his people, rescuing them from the peril of anarchy, to enjoy the reign of liberty. 

GEORGE THE FIFTH, by the Grace of GOD, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.

Whereas We deem it expedient and necessary to appoint Terms or Sessions for the holding of Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Northern District of our Island of Newfoundland, at the several times and places hereinafter mentioned:

We do, therefore, declare to all our loving subjects in Our said Island that it is Our will and pleasure to direct and appoint that Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Northern District of Our said Island, shall be open and holden—

At Bigus on Friday, the Sixteenth, and Saturday, the Seventeenth days of November next;

At Harbor Grace on Monday, the Nineteenth, Tuesday, the Twentieth, Wednesday, the Twenty-first, and Thursday, the Twenty-second days of November next.

At Carbonear on Friday, the Twenty-third, and Saturday, the Twenty-fourth days of November next.

And the said Court shall be kept open for the periods, hereinbefore prescribed at each of the respective places as aforesaid provided the presiding Judge shall have business to do therein; and, if necessary, such Judge may extend the term at any of the said places for a period not exceeding two days, and until the determination of the trial of any case then proceeding.

And We do, by these Presents, further order and direct that in the event of a Judge who may preside in the said Court in the Northern District of Our said Island being prevented by unforeseen circumstances from opening Our said Court on any of the days hereinbefore appointed, or if the said Judge should be absent at any of the places, hereinbefore named for holding Our said Court before the time stated for the opening thereof, and shall deem it proper to open the same without delay, the said Judge may, and he is hereby authorized to open and hold Our said Court on any other day or days than those hereinbefore specified; and to keep the same open for the respective periods hereinbefore stated, as aforesaid, if he should find it necessary for the despatch of business to do so.

And of these Presents all Magistrates, the Sheriff, Officers of the Constabulary Force, and all Bailiffs, Constables, Keepers of gaols, and all other officers in the execution of their offices about the premises, and all and singular other persons whom these Presents do, shall or may concern, are hereby required to take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Baked Brown Bread

Four cups sour milk, three cups fine corn meal, one half-cup molasses, one cup finely rolled bread crumbs, two and one-half teaspoons soda, one tea-spoon salt. This just fills a five-pound lard pail or two-pound coffee can. Be sure the cover is tight and put into pail or kettle large enough to hold two quarts of water besides pail holding the batter. Use boiling water and bake in oven all day. To be wholesome corn meal should be cooked a long time. This may be cooked on stove one and a half hours and finished in fireless cooker.

New Steamer

A new steamer was recently launched at Wedgeport, N.S., for the Harbor Grace Shipbuilding Company, of which Mr. Christopher Hannover is the head. This ship which is called the "Norge" will be used around the Newfoundland coast in connection with the shipbuilding yards and will be commanded by a Nova Scotian.

The work on the new shipbuilding plant at Ship Head, Hr. Grace, is now being rapidly rushed ahead and the work will be completed in a short while. The whaling factory which occupied the site has been demolished and the dock is now assuming shape. About 120 men are working at the construction work.

The Garden Party

On Wednesday the W. P. A. Garden Party, which was to have been held in Snows field, was, owing to the poor weather, held in the Public Building.

It was the intention of the W. P. A. to serve Teas again in the building on Thursday afternoon, but we are informed that when the President went to the building Thursday morning to arrange matters she met with rather poor treatment from an official from whom better should be expected.

That official must have known on Wednesday that Court was to have been held on Thursday, and he could easily have notified the W. P. A. to that effect, and then the building would have been cleaned up.

It is surely bad enough when men fail to be present and show that they have some interest, at least, in the noble work the ladies are doing for the soldiers and sailors. But when officials discourage the workers, would it be any wonder if they discontinue the good work altogether. Whose fault would it be?

The time is now ripe when a move should be made to place this building in the hands of a suitable committee residing in our own town who would have the self-control and to whom applications for its use for public purposes could be made.

The War

The war outlook this week is not so bad from our standpoint. A steady and persistent pressure by the British and French is being kept up in France and Belgium. The Canadian troops have just captured Hill 70, overlooking Lens, and it is believed Lens, which is an important French mining centre, cannot hold out much longer.

The Russo-Romanians seem to be regaining their steadfastness, and reports of an offensive from that quarter have been received. An important peace move was announced by the Vatican this week, and certain suggestions have been made and questions asked by the Pope. But it is generally thought that nothing will be done with these proposals. To give back Germany her colonies and to simply require that occupied territory be relinquished is not good enough for those nations who have been fighting Prussian and Austrian Militarism for over three years. The Papal proposal will be given due consideration; but they will no doubt be rejected, as they bear the marks of being manufactured at Vienna or Berlin. Full and complete reparation and atonement (as far as this is possible) must be exacted from Germany and Austria.

Fewer ships have been sunk by submarines the past week, and it only remains for the British and French to advance a few more miles into western Belgian territory to compel Germany to retire altogether from the Belgian coast, where her chief submarine bases are.

Haig's Troops Take Another Bite

London, Aug. 15.—Field Marshal Haig's forces attacked the German positions along the west front early this morning from Lens to the north-east of Loos. The official statement says the British are making satisfactory progress, and have carried the German first line at all points of the front attacked.
