UPPER CANADA COLLEGE, TORONTO.



HE College was founded, in 1829, by Sir John Colborne (Lord Seaton) with the intention that it should be developed after the model of the great Public Schools of England. This object is still kept in view. Provision is at present made for receiving about one hundred and sixty resident pupils. It is the aim of the masters to make the College a place where boys may receive, away from home, a sound training, moral, mental and physical.

The class-room space of the College also enables it to receive about one hundred and fifty day pupils, who are required, as far as circumstances permit, to conform to the general school discipline.

SCHOOL BUILDINGS.

The old school buildings were situated on King Street, within the City of Toronto, and here the work of the College was carried on for more than sixty years. During this time a large proportion of the leading men of Ontario were trained within its walls.

The new buildings were completed in 1891 at a cost, including the site, of more than \$300,000. They are situated in Deer Park, a suburb of Toronto, and are about a mile from the city limits, and three miles from the lake front. The site is one of the highest near Toronto, being about 300 feet above the level of the lake. It is considered particularly healthy. The grounds cover an area of thirty acres, and furnish abundant space for playing fields.

The main school building is in the form of an E, the front part facing Lake Ontario to the south and the wings running to the north. The foundation is of brown Credit Valley stone for about six feet above the ground line; the upper structure is of brick. The class-rooms are spacious and well lighted; each bedroom is furnished for one, two or three boys, and the building is heated throughout by steam. The system of lighting is the Edison Incandescent Electric Light, generated by large dynamos. Water is supplied from the city water system. The plumbing is of the most modern description, and the drainage is believed to be perfect.

A double cottage, thoroughly equipped to give complete isolation in cases of contagious illness, is this year (1898) in course of construction.

ENTRANCE AND COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

Application for entrance should be made on forms which will be supplied by the Bursar of the College.

In order to meet the requirements of many parents who wish to enter boys too young to go at once into Form I. a Preparatory Form has been organized, and has been in successful operation during the past year. Boys of nine years old and upwards can enter this Form, in which they are carefully prepared for the regular college course.

Boys can usually enter Form I. between eleven and thirteen years of age, the time varying according to their ability and acquirements. Latin is then begun, and the courses of study are planned to carry a pupil forward from this time to University (honour and pass) Matriculation; to entrance at the medical, military or other special colleges, or to business life.

When boys enter at a later stage they are placed in the form best suited for them. In the case of applicants more than fifteen years old the greatest importance is attached to sufficient certificates of character and assurance of a disposition to yield willingly to school discipline.

The general course provides for thorough training in Classics, Mathematics, French and German, Science and English. In this course the University and College matriculation examinations determine for the most part the options permitted to pupils.

Special arrangements for commercial instruction are made for boys wishing to enter business life without a University training.

Parents are strongly recommended to allow their boys, as a matter of mental discipline, to take at least one classical language, even when not looking forward to University work.

RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION.

A syllabus of Bible Study is issued at the beginning of each term to resident and day pupils alike, and a written examination on the work laid down is held at the end of the term. Instruction in the allotted subjects is given to resident pupils by the principal and house masters. When it is deemed advisable the pupils are divided for this purpose into classes, according to the religious denomination to which they belong. Day pupils are expected to have their Bible Study superintended at home, and the Principal directs the special attention of parents to the need of careful preparation for the terminal examinations, the results of which will be stated in the home reports.

On Sunday morning resident pupils attend service in churches, as far as possible of their own denomination, in the immediate neighbourhood of the College.

On Sunday evening at 7.30 o'clock there is a service in the College hall.

LEAVE.

In ordinary cases leave is given on Saturday—for juniors till 9 p.m.—for seniors till 10.30 p.m.—to visit in Toronto at houses specified in writing by parents or guardians.

Leave is also given, at the request of parents or guardians, to visit friends in Toronto on Sunday afternoons, but all resident pupils must be back in the College buildings before 7.30 p.m.

HOME REPORTS.

Reports on the class standing, progress and conduct of pupils are sent to parents and guardians every half term.

Promotion examinations are held at the end of the year, and a fixed percentage of marks in each subject must be gained to entitle a boy to pass on to the next Form.

EXERCISE AND PHYSICAL TRAINING.

It is the policy of the College to give much, but it is believed not undue encouragement to school games and athletics.

Rugby football, hockey and cricket are the principal games. The Macdonald Cross Country race in the autumn, with the Athletic Meeting and the Hendrie Steeple Chase in the spring, make up the series of school sports which are especially sanctioned and encouraged.

The general executive power in all athletic matters is in the hands of the stewards, who consist of the captains in football, cricket and hockey, the head of the house, the head of the town, and the captain of the rifles. The athletic captains, who win their places by merit, have control, under proper supervision, each of his own organization.

In the gymnasium, which is 80 feet long and 40 feet wide, the boys are trained under the supervision of an instructor. The College physician examines all the boys of the school from time to time as to their fitness to undergo gymnastic training, and to take part in games.

Swimming is taught in a large swimming bath. The instructor forms classes in connection with the Life Saving Society for drill in the methods of resuscitation and rescuing from drowning.

A professional English cricketer is employed during the spring months to give instruction in cricket.

A large covered rink and a rink in the open air give opportunities for skating in the winter. For cycling and running, a quarter-mile cinder track has been prepared on the grounds. There are several tennis courts.

A Cadet Rifle Corps, attached to the Royal Grenadiers, is organized in connection with the College, and in accordance with the regulations of the Militia Department of Canada, which furnishes the corps with rifles, belts and bayonets. Boys of suitable age and physically qualified are expected to join the corps.

MUSIC.

Dr. Albert Ham, Organist of St. James' Cathedral, directs the musical education of the school.

Regular training in singing is given without extra charge to resident pupils and to such day pupils as desire to attend the classes.

Dr. Ham gives private lessons in the college on the organ or piano. Instruction on other instruments will be provided as occasion arises.

SCHOLARSHIPS.

At the opening of the College in September, 1898, four Scholarships of the value of fifty dollars each will be offered for competition among boys entering as resident pupils.

Two of these Scholarships are given by the Old Boys' Association—one by George W. Beardmore, Esq., and one by William Christie, Esq.

At the same time two Scholarships of the value of twenty-five dollars each will be offered for competition among boys entering as day pupils.

The examination for these scholarships will be held on Thursday, September the 15th, in the College building. Intending competitors should send in their names to the Bursar of the College.

In January, 1899, four Scholarships of \$50 each will be offered for competition.

Two of these will be given in the Upper School and two in the Lower.

These form Scholarships will be open to resident pupils only.

PRIZES.

The following prizes will be awarded at the end of the current school year :

1. HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL'S MEDAL.—This medal is awarded annually to the boy who ranks first in general proficiency at the leaving examination of the sixth form. It carries with it the rank of "Head Boy" for the year.

2. THE J. HERBERT MASON MEDALS (Gold and Silver).—These medals are awarded annually to the two boys, members of the Upper School, who are considered by the masters and pupils to possess in the highest degree the following characteristics: "Cheerful submission to authority; self-respect and independence of character; readiness to forgive offence; desire to conciliate the differences of others; and, above all, moral courage and unflinching truthfulness." It is through the liberality of Mr. J. Herbert Mason, who donated to the College Board \$1,000, that these medals are annually offered for competition.

3. THE HOWLAND PRIZE.—Instituted by the late W. H. Howland, Esq., and continued by Oliver A. Howland, Esq., to the pupil (who must be the son of an Old Boy of the College) who ranks highest in the forms.

4. THE BEARDMORE PRIZES.—Books to the value of \$100 are annually presented to the College by George W. Beardmore, Esq.

The subjects for which these prizes are awarded and the conditions of competition will be announced each year on the bulletin boards of the College.

5. THE BROCK PRIZES.—These prizes are given by W. R. Brock, Esq., and are awarded for knowledge of Bible History. The subjects for examination are announced from term to term.

6. HARRIS PRIZE.—The relatives of the late Rev. Joseph H. Harris, D.D., appointed first Principal of the College in 1829, give an annual prize in History, as a mark of their continued interest in the College.

"OLD BOYS" PRIZES.—The Association of Old Boys of the College offer for competition for the year 1898-9 three book prizes :

1. The best Classical scholar.
2. The best Mathematical scholar.
3. The best English essay.

Additional prizes of books are annually awarded by the Board of Trustees for merit in the different forms. The awards are based on the standing of the pupils throughout the term or at examinations.

TERMS.

The school year is divided into three terms :

The Autumn Term begins on Tuesday, September 13th, 1898.

The Winter Term begins on Wednesday, January 11th, 1899.

The Spring Term begins on Tuesday, April 11th, 1899.

VACATIONS.

At Christmas, three weeks ; at Easter, ten days ; at Midsummer, ten weeks.

Provision is made for keeping boys in residence during the Christmas holidays only under very exceptional circumstances, and by special arrangement. Boys remaining in residence during the Easter vacation are charged at the rate of five dollars per week.

N.B.—Pupils enrolled before the summer vacation of 1898 will be charged the same fees as heretofore until September, 1899, but after that date the above scale of fees will come in force for all pupils attending the College.

* All fees are payable strictly in advance at the beginning of each term.

Half a term's notice is required before the withdrawal of a pupil. Without this notice a half term's fees must be paid.

The annual fee of \$300 covers education, board, washing, mending, bedding and ordinary attendance by the Collège Physician.

No abatement is made for withdrawal or absence of a pupil, except in cases of lengthened illness, when an allowance of \$4.00 a week is

made for resident pupils after the first six weeks of absence. In every case a physician's certificate that sickness is the cause of absence is required.

Pupils taking the course in Chemistry and Physics are required to pay an initial fee of \$2 and \$1 per term additional for the chemicals used.

OPTIONAL.

There is a Carpentry in which boys have an opportunity of being trained, under a competent instructor, in the use of tools.

Fees for instruction - - - - - \$2 00 per term.

Cost of set of tools, if bought by pupil himself - - - 10 00

Charge for same if supplied by College - - - - - 2 00 per term.

Stenography and typewriting are extra subjects.

Fee for each - - - - - \$5 00 per term.

Classes for Dancing are arranged from time to time.

Fee for 10 lessons - - - - - \$5 00

Day pupils living at a distance have the privilege of lunching at mid-day in the College dining hall. Lunch tickets can be obtained on application to the Bursar at the rate of seven meals for one dollar.

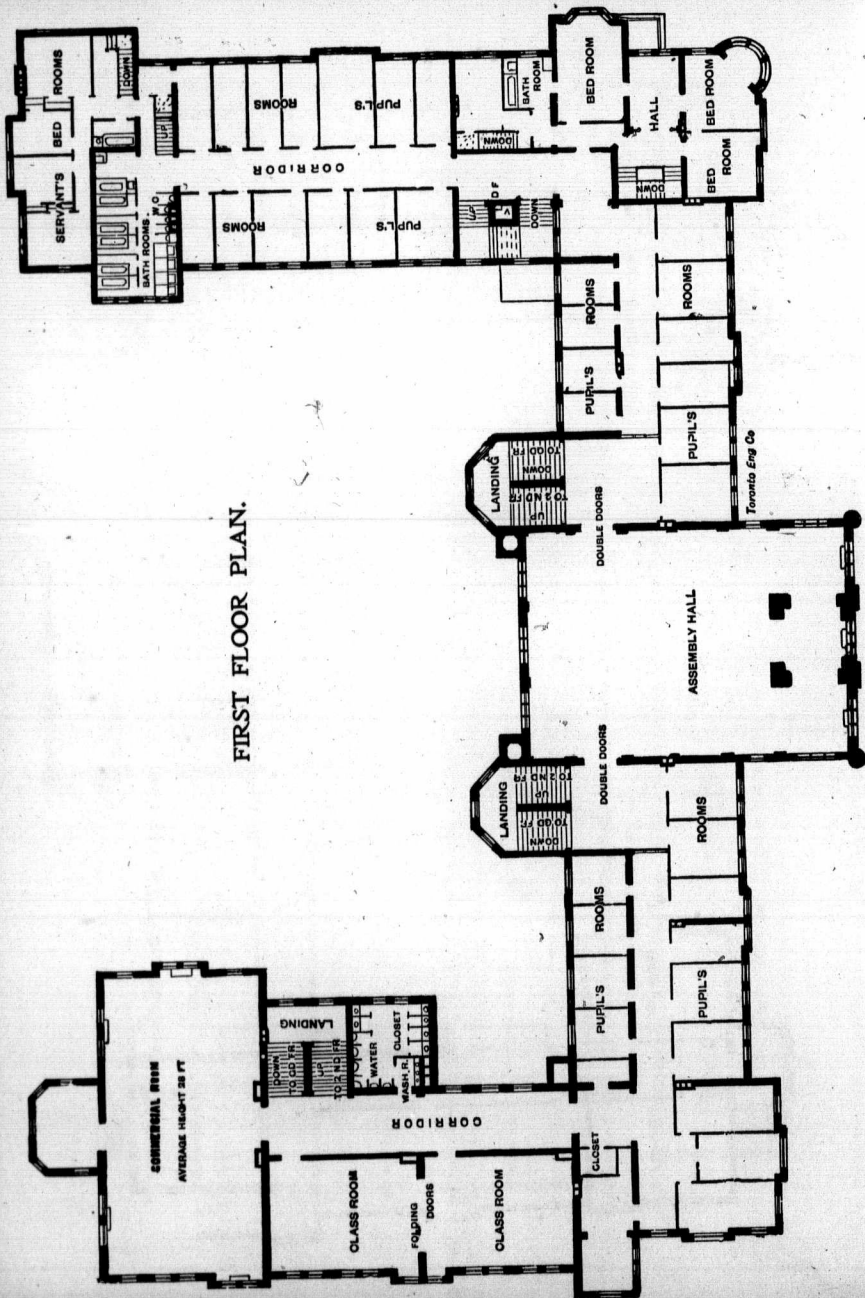


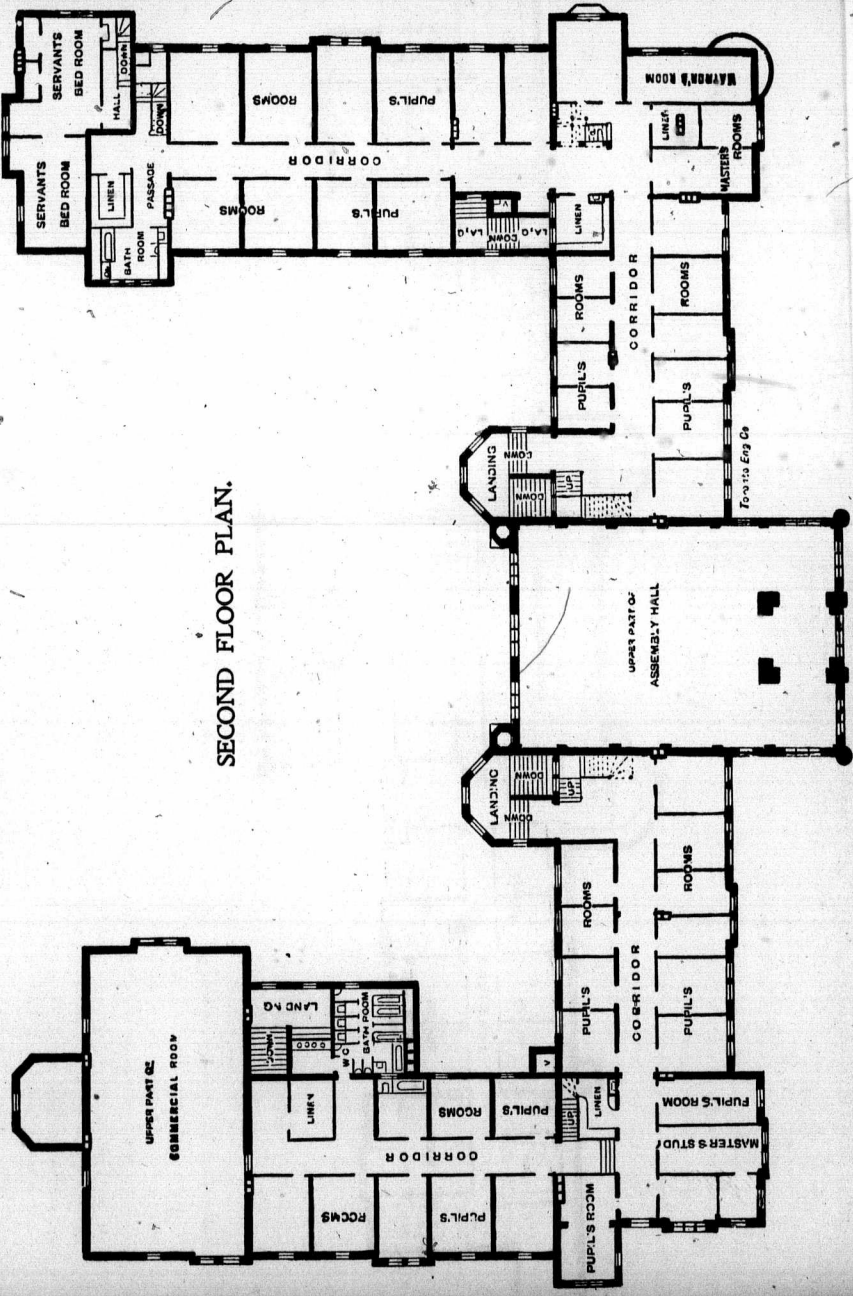


GROUND FLOOR PLAN.
