## A DISGRACEFUL SCENE.

The creatures in the British House of Commons on Wednesday night were not amenable to the first legislative body in the world. The scene is thus described:

Mr. Chamberlain and the members were called to witness the last scene of a disgraceful farce. The debate on the financial clauses had been a mere sham. The Irish members, as well as the unionists, were anxious to discuss at length the important financial questions presented by the new clauses, but each discussion was to be cut short. The bill had been changed in its most vital features; still, no debate was regarded as necessary, since whatever was altered, the bill was always fatal perfect by the adherents of the prime minister. Jests from the Irish, cheers from the unionists and counter cheers from the liberals interrupted Mr. Chamberlain. He waited two or three minutes until the confusion abated. He then proceeded thus:

"The prime minister calls 'black,' and his adherents say it is good. The prime minister calls 'white,' and they say it is better. (Unionist laughter.) It is always the voice of God. Never since the time of Herod, had there been such—"

Mr. Chamberlain got no further. Immediately after resuming his speech he had been warned by gutters from the Irish benches that a storm was gathering. With his half finished reference to Herod there came from the nationalists such a roar of indignation as has not been heard since the days of Parnell.

Mr. Chamberlain plainly was startled, but he tried to talk on. His voice was inaudible to the members on the next bench.

Still yells of execration sounded above the uproar. T. P. O'Connor shouted 'Judas' so loudly that the epithet could be heard throughout the House. The rest of the Irishmen took up the cry, and for half a minute shouted 'Judas' in chorus. Meanwhile the clock struck 10.

Chairman Mellor tried to put the closure but his voice could not be heard amid the shouts of the Irish and the unionists.

Mr. Mellor gave, in a weak voice, the customary directions to clear the House for a division. As the disorder subsided, preparations were made to execute these directions.

The conservatives, however, flatly refused to quit the House.

Meanwhile half of the Unionists had climbed to the benches and were making "Gag" "Gag." Others were struggling in the aisles or between the benches, with radical, liberal or Irish assistance.

Curses, yells of rage and cries of pain were heard on every side. Blows were struck right and left. Members fell and were picked up by their friends to fight again. The whole space between the front benches was filled with a struggling, cursing mass of members, striking, clashing and upsetting each other. B.A. sergeants at arms forced their way through the thick of the fight, but as fast as one group was pacified another came to blows.

Eventually Mr. Gladstone begged Edgar Morris, a liberal, to try to stop the fighting. Mr. Morris, being his way through the belligerents, and by repeated appeals in the name of the premier succeeded in ending the conflict.

Mr. Gladstone had watched the scene with inflamed face and an expression of sorrow, indignation and astonishment. Chairman Mellor sent for Speaker Peel as soon as order was restored. When the speaker entered several conservatives, pointed to Mr. Gladstone and exclaimed: "There sits the author of it all."

The hum of voices died out as speaker Peel, stern and dignified, took the chair. Mr. Mellor reported to Mr. Peel what had occurred, and Mr. Gladstone and Mr. Balfour recounted their versions of the fight given by their respective lieutenants.

Mr. Peel then said: "I have arrived at the conclusion that the obnoxious expression alleged to have been used was the original cause of the disorder. I feel certain the gentleman used the words in the heat and irritation of the moment. If he were to say he regrets having used them, I am certain it would be my duty to take no further notice of the affair."

the latter on the band. The use of the knife enraged the white spectators. They caught the negro and threw him into the thrashing machine and killed him. Among the spectators to this horrible affair was a son of the negro, who, to defend his father, picked up a pitch-fork and attacked the crowd, sticking the fork into one man and killing him. The crowd then turned upon the boy, but he ran and escaped.

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 26.—The steamship Empress of India has arrived with news of the murder of two Swedish missionaries by Chinese fanatics at Sing Pu, near Hankow, and Johnson, the missionaries, arrived at Sing Pu last April and were the only missionaries there. Sing Pu is an important market place northeast of Hankow and contains about 30,000 inhabitants. They made no converts, but on the contrary their lives were in danger almost from the start. They were warned by servants that they would be killed on July 1, but took no precaution except to send a letter to a magistrate demanding protection. Early in the morning of July 1 their house was surrounded by a mob composed of butchers, tradesmen and scholars, who clamored for their blood. Stones were thrown at the house and the windows battered in until the missionaries could no longer remain indoors. They attempted to escape over the roofs of the houses but were followed by the mob. Finally they could go no further and dropped into the street into the hands of the mob. Their sufferings were short. Wilkinson's skull was smashed with an axe and Mr. Johnson was specifically beheaded of all semblance to human shape by bamboo rods and iron bars. The bodies were stripped naked, subjected to revolting mutilations and left on the street for dogs to eat. The mob then looted and burned the missionaries' house. Two missionaries from Hankow in company with a mandarin and soldiers left for Sing Pu on July 4 to investigate the matter and recover the bodies.

Miss Kate Dwyer, assistant police woman, has organized a relief for the women and children who cannot provide for themselves, and has secured the co-operation of the Cooks and Expressmen's unions. The members of the Cooks' Union and the Knights of Labor cooks have agreed to give all locked victuals at the hotels and restaurants. The expressmen have agreed to carry the food to the mission, 1,235 Eleventh street. There the food will be sorted and given to the poor. The hours for distribution will be given from 12 to 2 o'clock and from 7 to 8 o'clock in the evening.

A meeting has been held to devise means to provide for the destitute. "Parson" Usher and Dean Peck, of the Tabernacle and Haymarket missions, stated that over 400 men had registered at those places as applicants for work, but none could be had. They estimated that there are 7,000 idle men in the city today, many of whom are without food, and that 15,000 people are directly affected by the idleness. Each of these missions has felt from 900 to 1,200 men daily for a week past. These provisions have been loaned by private citizens, but the demand is increasing to such an extent that they will be unable to continue this charitable work unless assistance is given by the city or state.
