He summed up the personality of the ideal teacher in the words of the great dramatist:—"His life was quiet, and the elements so mixed in him, that Nature might stand up and say to all the world, 'This was a man.'" He urged upon the teachers the importance of study and self-culture in order to approach as nearly as possible this ideal. He was in favor of allowing teachers considerable latitude in regard to methods and even courses of instruction, was also in favor of higher salaries, and of less crowded classes.


