MONCTON, N. B.

THE BRITISH MAIL.

WELL UNDERSTOOD THAT NO MAIL SUBSIDY WILL BE GIVEN TO LINES MAKING THEIR TERMINUS AT FOREIGN PORTS.

OTTAWA, Sept. 30.—The steamship representatives are still here interviewing Sir Richard Cartwright and Mr. Blair. Messrs. Huggill, of Halifax, and Schofield of St. John, N. B., had a long interview with Sir Richard Cartwright this afternoon. The minister of trade and commerce stated that there was no announcement to make after the interview was over. It is, however, pretty well understood that should the Allan and Dominion lines decide to make their terminus at a foreign port, they will not get the British mail subsidy. There will also be no difficulty in making an arrangement for the winter season with the Furness and Beaver lines to carry the mails. Last winter some of the Furness steamers were making better time than the Allan boats. There is a clause in the government contract with the Furness people to carry the mails at postal rates should the government want them to do so. Mr. Campbell, of the Beaver line, had also an interview with the minister.—Halifax Chronicle.
