MAY EXTEND ATLANTIC REGION

St. John Hears That C.N.R. Management Now Favors Such Extension

St. John, April 18.—A report which has gained considerable strength during the last two or three days is to the effect that the C.N.R. management has decided to extend the Atlantic division of the railway, with headquarters at Moncton, to Riverview, N.B., via the original route. The fact that a proposed conference between Sir Henry Thornton and a representative of the Maritime Provinces, principally to discuss the question has been postponed from April 18 to April 24, is taken by some as an indication that something is in connection with the development, but not ready for announcement. If such was the case, the report certainly has been checked on, it is expected that a definite statement should be made in the near future.

NO TRUTH IN WATER RUMORS

Steps Have Been Taken to Maintain Sanitary Conditions Along Brook

According to positively authentic information, the many wild rumors concerning the town's water supply, which have been in circulation for the past week are absolutely groundless. It was reported that a quantity of water from the Walker Brook had been sent to St. John for analysis and that it had been found, when tested, to contain both typhoid and diphtheria germs. Such is not the case. No water has been subjected to a test and the story about germs is merely nothing more serious than the figment of some creative imagination. Moreover, it is the belief of those most familiar with the conditions which would affect the town's water, that so far no foreign water which might carry drainage from barns, etc., has been running into the brooks. Conditions along these brooks are the same this year as have always existed. The railway has been using water from the Walker Brook for approximately fifty years and no complaints as to it being unsalubrious have yet been registered. The town pump is taking water at a point which is quite remote from any stables and where poisonous drainage has no easy access.

MUST HAVE PERMIT TO ENTER WOODS

New Dept. Public Works Jan 23 to Get

People entering forests between May 1 and November 1 this year must register. The Royal Gazette contains a proclamation issued by the Minister of Lands and Mines under authority of the Forest Fires Act, 1922, in which all forest land in the Province of New Brunswick is proclaimed "a protected area" with the following regulations: No person may enter upon any forest land after May 1, 1923, until November 1, 1923, for the purpose of traveling, camping, fishing or picnicking, or for other purposes without first having registered with a local fire warden, councillor, game license, vendor, or other person duly authorized giving his name dates, and having obtained a registration certificate. Such certificate shall be produced when requested by any fire warden or other authorized person, provided that the following persons or companies shall not be subject to the above regulations, namely: licensees or owners of forest lands entered upon, or to their employees, or to the fire wardens, fire fighters, land surveyors, or to persons accompanied by registered guides or holders of hunting, fishing, guides or mining licenses. All persons, shall when requested by any fire warden show their license and give the above mentioned information regarding their stay in the forest.

DISORDERS BREAK OUT IN BERLIN

One Killed and Seventeen Injured in Unemployed Demonstration

Berlin, April 18.—One man was killed and 17 men were injured in disorderly demonstrations of the unemployed at Muelheim, in the Ruhr today. When the demonstrators were dispersed they tried to storm the town hall with clubs and pistols, but were beaten off by the German authorities. Intervention by the French troops was not required, the advice state.

FORD HAS BALANCE OF OVER \$200,000,000

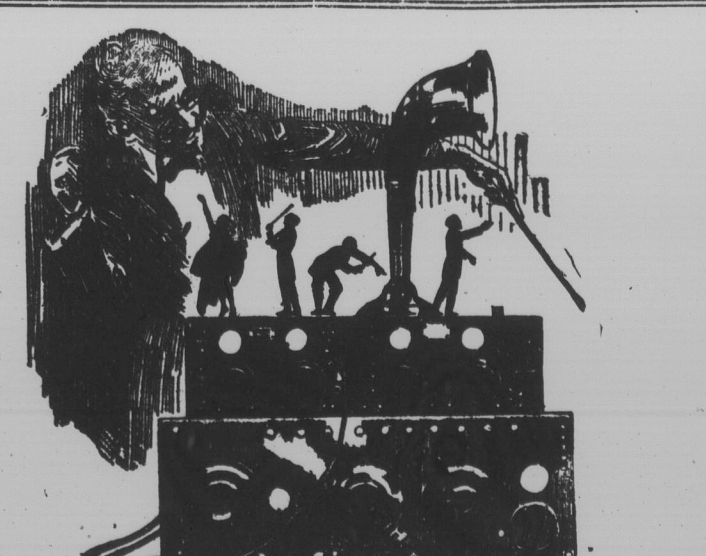
Enormous Expenditures Did Not Affect Reserve

New York, April 18.—Ford Motor Company has a cash balance of more than \$200,000,000, according to an interview with Henry Ford, published by the Wall Street Journal here today. An enormous sum of money paid out in the purchase of coal and timber lands, water-power sites and branch plant investments came out of the current earnings and did not affect the cash reserve, Ford was quoted as saying: "As yet we have not thought of borrowing any money," Ford added.

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HUNTING SEASON DATES CHANGED

Deer Hunting to Start Sept.
16th But No Moose Hunting
Before Oct. 1st.

Fredericton, April 13.—Under an amendment to the Game Act which was passed in the Legislature last week, the provision is cancelled under which special licenses were issued at advanced prices last year to persons desiring to hunt deer on September 15th. Instead of October 1st, the date set for the commencement of the regular big game hunting season. However, deer hunting is to be generally allowed after September 16th but no moose hunting will take place before October 1st. The hunting season will continue to close on November 30th.

Hon. Mr. Robinson said there had been objection to the regulation relating to the size of horns of a moose which could be legally killed and he withdrew the section. There also had been objection to the section forbidding the sale of game meat and he withdrew an amendment of the regulation allowing license hunters to sell the animals which they had killed was being used in such a manner that moose were being rapidly depleted.

Mr. Young said that if the Game Warden were doing their duty they would be no fear of depletion. The section was stricken out. Hon. Mr. Robinson explained that game shooting was to be permitted for the holders of big game licenses without additional license, that an improved system for the collection of statistics was to be introduced, that for buyers were compelled to keep records, and that a bounty would be placed on wild cats.

Mr. Peck asked if the department had any policy with regard to crops destroyed by game animals. Hon. Mr. Robinson said that there was no policy. He had received a claim from the member for Albert (Peck) but the most he could promise was to investigate the claim. Hon. Mr. Peck said that it had been suggested that deer licenses be issued to be in effect fifteen days in advance of the big game season, which would make the date Sept. 16th. The special license which had been in effect previously had been done away with.

Hon. Mr. Magee moved an amendment to the effect that during the month of December, January and February, the Minister of Lands and Mines might be allowed the hunting of foxes and wildcats with hounds in any parish of the county of Westmorland. Hon. Mr. Veniot said that there should be provision for registration of every dog in the county who would be called a hound.

Mr. Warnock said that in the county in which he had worked during the winter he had seen dogs running wild in the woods and in parks killing deer. In fact one dog had become so wild it was almost like a wolf and was dangerous. It had become necessary for the men in the county to kill the dogs. Such conditions showed the danger which lay in such an amendment.

Mr. Burdock said that hounds would probably kill more deer than foxes or wildcats. Hon. Mr. Magee said that in Westmorland hounds were used largely to capture sheep, silver or black foxes. Mr. Burdock said he had, doubtless, been giving his permission, although it might be confined to Westmorland.

The amendment was adopted. Hon. Mr. Robinson asked if any representations were made to the Federal authorities regarding the shooting of game birds in the woods in violation of the law. It was a serious matter, he said, that the province had no control over the criminal Code. No representations had been made to the Federal authorities to correct the situation. During recent years, game laws were enforced in the province but in the past few years the enforcement of game laws has been practically non-existent.

Mr. Young said that two years ago there was an attempt to introduce a bill for the regulation of a young man's hunting. No progress had been made.

MILLIONS OF FISH EGGS HATCHED

Over Six Hundred Million
Eggs in Hatcheries Throughout
Canada.

The Department of Marine and Fisheries maintains a number of fish hatcheries scattered throughout Canada from the Atlantic to the Pacific. Each autumn millions of eggs of different species of fish are collected, propagated, and collected from the spawning grounds. The different eggs are almost quite distinct and each species is taken to the particular hatchery or hatcheries devoted to that kind of fish. The eggs are hatched in streams of running water, the operation taking from five to seven months according to the species, and in the spring, the fry, or small fish, are distributed throughout Canada and deposited in the water which it is desired to stock or restock.

The number handled are enormous. The Department of Marine and Fisheries announces that eggs to the number given below are undergoing incubation in the Dominion Government hatcheries in the provinces indicated. These eggs are now well developed and under normal conditions they will practically all hatch, all the spoiled and infertile eggs having been removed.

THE LOSS OF OUR YOUTH.

Reports show that crowds of young

men and women of the Maritime

Provinces are leaving daily to seek

their livelihood in the United States.

Information Officer Roberts of St.

John verifies these reports: He says

"I estimate that about two hundred

a week have been leaving during the

last month alone." An American im-

migration official also gives testimony

declaring that crowds of sturdy young

men and women were leaving the

provinces on nearly every train. Many

of these, in reply to questions, say

they are going on a vacation trip but

records present the alarming fact that

not twenty-five per cent. return. Im-

migration men who are familiar with

this traffic state that many of these

young people were never in the States

before and declare that this increased

migration across the border is a good

index to trade conditions here. With

times dull in the Maritime Provinces

and opportunities for employment

much better in the United States, Can-

ada is rapidly losing many of her

most valuable citizens for these im-

migrants include farmers, artisans and

tradesmen of various description who

are needed here to carry on this part

of the world's work.

While migration of this sort from

this part of the province has never

been so noticeable as described above,

there is abundant proof available to

show that the country of Residence

and the surrounding area have

always contributed a large num-

ber seeking a future across the

line. And no organized effort has

ever been made to offer adequate in-

centage to keep our youth in their

own country.

It is only a natural sequence in

education and advancement that a

great many of those who choose pro-

fessional careers should wish to travel

or go to bigger centres but there is

nothing for this country to gain in

allowing its skilled tradesmen and the

better class of its workmen to mi-

grate to another country. On the

other hand there is a great deal to

lose. The work here must be done

and when our native youth skilled in

these various callings and familiar

with the country and its work here

have gone away their places are fre-

quently filled by men who have no

particular interest in this town or

country. Unless they become perma-

nent residents they are seldom as pro-

fitable citizens as our own native

youth would be. This is a matter

that challenges the interest of all for

it is one which is inseparably linked

with the progress and prosperity of

the country. Every effort should be

made to check such an alarming mi-

gration as is taking place at present.

If opportunities for our youth are

lacking in this great rich country, an

organized effort should be made to

supply them.

HAD RAFFLE TICKET IN HIS POCKET.
Windeer, Ont., April 18—When the mangled remains of Marcus Swisher, a Grand Trunk Railway crossing watchman, was picked up at Ford, Ont., last week, after the unfortunate man had been struck by a train, a raffle ticket was found in his pocket.

It now proves to be the ticket to win a high priced automobile, which will be sent to his widow living in St. Thomas Ont.

Here and There
The Swiss Government has appropriated 500,000 francs for the purpose of assisting the emigration of unemployed workers, especially as farmers to Canada.

Saskatchewan now stands first in the world in regard to the number of rural telephone exchanges, with a telephone for every nine of the population.

The Canadian Pacific Railway has a survey party in the Koryn gold field, plotting a route in case it should be decided to push further westward. The line now being built from Mattawa to Quince.

Construction work on a 39 mile extension of the Acme-Empress line running from Drumheller to the Bull Pond will be commenced this year according to statement made by D. C. Coleman, vice-president of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

Organization of the Okanagan fruit growers into a co-operative association has now been accomplished. Among the main difficulties which faced the co-operative advocates was the raising of adequate credit to finance the whole scheme. This has been overcome.

The United States bought Canadian produce during February of the value of \$28,719,355 in comparison with \$20,116,256 Canada's exports to the United States in 1922. Exports of Canadian produce to the United Kingdom were \$17,874,265 in February 1923, and \$15,515,555 in February 1922.

Canadian exports of whiskey for the year ending March 31st, 1923, amounted to 339,181 gallons valued at \$2,098,277; for the previous year the quantity exported was 192,910 gallons valued at \$882,789. Ale and beer exported during the past year amounted to 1,454,639 gallons, while for the previous twelve months the amount was only 431,960 gallons.

Making Canada Europe's best and quickest road to the Orient means much to this country and the Canadian Pacific Railway, in re-arranging its route from England or France to Japan to sea to reduce the journey by four days, has made the route more than ever a serious competition of travel via the Suez Canal. About 10,000 miles in 21 days is better than even Jules Verne thought of.

A silver tag attached to the dorsal fin of a salmon before its release after the eggs have been removed at the Dominion Government hatcheries is one of the methods resorted to by the Fisheries Department for tracing the life history of the fish. A reward of \$1 is paid by the Department for the return of silver tags that are being attached to Atlantic salmon, together with scales from the side of the fish, and particulars regarding their length, weight and place of capture.

With a view to establishing tourist resorts along its line in Central and Western Ontario, the Canadian Pacific Railway will erect Bangshaw Camp after the style of those successfully operated in the Rockies. The first three will be built in the Niagara, French River and Lake of the Woods districts, and should be ready for occupation by July 1st. The low cost of construction and maintenance will make it possible to charge much lower rates than the standard hotel, and the camps will prove a boon to those of moderate means who desire to spend a week or more or less in the out-lands.

THE EDMUNDSTON TYPHOID CASES

Fredericton, N. B., April 18—Dr. G. Melvin, who has returned after an inspection of the typhoid epidemic situation at Edmundston, said today that seventeen new cases had developed since the last report, bringing the total number of cases reported up to approximately 160. No further deaths have been attributed to the epidemic. Three were previously reported. A large number of the patients are now convalescent.

B. Y. P. U. HELD DEBATE

An interesting debate was the feature of the last weekly meeting of the B. Y. P. U. which was held at the Baptist paragon on Monday night. The subject of the discussion was "Resolved that Winter Sports are a means of more pleasant enjoyment than Summer Sports." Miss Ethel Baird led the negative side, while Miss Jessie Currie captained the team who put up the affirmative arguments. Although necessarily short the speeches were very interesting and many logical and well conceived arguments were presented. The Rev. W. Camp and Miss Jessie Piquon acted as judges and gave decision in favor of the negative side. This part of the evening's entertainment was preceded by a supper and this proved a most enjoyable part of the programme.

U. S. RELIEF WORKER IN SOVIET PRISON

Spent 18 Days in Solitary Confinement
Threats of Starvation.

London, April 17—A Constantinople despatch to the Daily Mail says that E. E. Gouzenko, a United States relief worker, has arrived in that city from Tiflis, where he had spent 18 days in solitary confinement in a Soviet prison on a charge of spying. The charges were based on the discovery among his papers of an insurance policy which the Soviet police mistook for an espionage document. Gouzenko said that while in jail 92 political prisoners were shot in reprisal for the assassination of a Bolshevik commissary.

GIRL SPY
CHAINED TO ROCKS

Vengeance Wreaked on Red Agent is Discovered by peasant.

London, March 15.—The skeleton of a beautiful girl spy chained to a rock and left to die of starvation last night of the Russian Revolution, was discovered at Hotin, Bessarabia, writes the Berlin correspondent of "The London Daily Express."

A peasant who sought refuge from a storm in a cavern was horror-stricken to see a human skeleton secured by chains riveted into the walls of the cavern. A notebook, half-buried by leaves, revealed the story of Russian vengeance.

The girl was Magdalena Frisch, the daughter of a Jewish chemist of Petrograd, Poland. She was the fiancée of the Russian agent Savro who under her influence entered the German spy service, and later became a Bolshevik spy in the armies of Denikin and Wrangel.

Magdalena carried messages from Savro to the Bolsheviks, in which the military dispositions of Denikin and Wrangel were disclosed. Every effort was made to discover the source of the disastrous leakage, but without success, until Savro was wounded while serving with Petlura. Papers were then found on the airman which revealed not only his treachery, but the part played by his fiancée.

Savro was shot, but Magdalena made good her escape. She was recognized some time afterwards in the streets at Hotin and kidnapped. Her captors carried her to the lonely cavern, chained her to the rock, and left her to die.

The girl set down in her notebook full details of what had occurred, and then, in order to escape the furies of starvation, took poison, with which one of her more compassionate executioners had supplied her.

The notebook is dated "October 28, 1921."

PRIEST PLEADS
GUILTY OF MURDER

Story of the Shooting to Death of Rev. Father Henry O'Neill

Kalamazoo, Mich., April 13.—Arraignment of Father Charles Dillon, charged with the murder last night of his Superior, Rev. Father Henry O'Neill, pastor of St. Augustine's parish, was postponed late today at the request of Judge George V. Welmer, in circuit court, until Monday.

Postponement was granted at the request of counsel for Father Dillon, although the priest had made known his willingness to enter a plea of guilty to a charge of first degree murder.

It was indicated that alienists might testify into the sanity of the accused priest. Father Dillon, a member of the Carthusian Fathers' Order, and formerly a missionary of the church in many countries, declared that he wants to go at once to John or Marquette where state prisons are located and insisted he is perfectly sane. He remains calm and manifests no sign of remorse because of his deed.

Father McCullough, the only eye witness of the shooting, made a statement to officers today.

"When we were seated at the dinner table last night," he said, "Father Dillon appeared nervous. Finally he burst out addressing Father O'Neill. 'You'd like to get me out of here wouldn't you?'"

"Father O'Neill replied: 'You are under no compulsion, you may stay as long as you wish, or if you prefer you may go.'"

"Then I'll go and pack up," Father Dillon. He went up stairs. In a few minutes he returned and with out warning began to fire."

This version of the affair differs from that of Father Dillon who told the police that the Parish Priest had ordered him to leave.

Native of Peterboro, Ont. Peterboro, Ont., April 13.—Rev. Father Charles Dillon, assistant at St. Augustine's Catholic Church, who at supper last night shot and killed his superior, the pastor of the church, Rev. Henry O'Neill, was born in Peterboro, Ont., and served for a time as priest in churches in both the Toronto and Peterboro dioceses. He was stationed thirty-four years ago as temporary pastor of St. Basil's Church, Toronto, during the absence of the rector, Father Kelly, in Rome. Last summer he spent several weeks in Peterboro visiting relatives.

CANADA'S FOREST FIRE PLAGUE Four thousand forest fires left Canada millions of dollars poorer last year and, says the Canadian Forestry Association, unless every "care is exercised" by campers, fishermen, settlers and others, 1923 will show a loss equally as great.

Nine-tenths of all forest fires in Canada occur through human acts which are incidental to land clearing, felling and hunting. Very few fires are deliberately set.

TROUT FISHING MAY 1ST

The trout fishing season which formerly opened on April 1st will not open this spring until May 1st. The government amended the law last year which reads as follows:—

"No one shall fish for, catch or kill trout of any kind from the first day of October in each year to the thirtieth day of April following, both days inclusive."

"No one shall at any time fish for, catch or kill trout otherwise than by angling. Angling is strictly prohibited. Fishing for trout through the ice is prohibited."

"No one shall catch in one day a greater number of trout than weigh more than ten pounds in the aggregate and no greater number than thirty, and they shall weigh less than ten pounds."

CANADIAN HOME

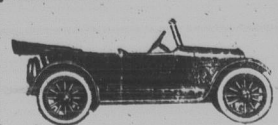

WALL OF WATER
70 FEET HIGH

Steamer Ran Into a Mountain of Water That Rose From Sea.

Tacoma, Wash., April 18.—A mountain of water that rose from the sea was described yesterday by Captain George C. Mitchell, of the Nawasco liner Brush.

The captain said that on the morning of March 20, while the Brush was 50 miles off the coast of Mexico, sailors saw a long, unbroken black line on the sea. This line approached the Brush rapidly, until it was seen that it was a wall of water fully seventy feet in height. The ship was made ready for the onslaught and Captain Mitchell said when the water hit the vessel it seemed as though a great hand grasped the ship and elevated it into the air. There was not a breath of wind at the time.

For six hours the log of the Brush shows the vessel wallowed in swells equal to those off Cape Horn. The ship was driven miles off her course. Captain has sent the facts to the government officials for an explanation of the phenomenon.

As it is an expenditure in the interests of the whole people, the people must be prepared to pay for them.

HEALTH REPORT

Dr. Pinault Reports for Local Health Committee—Pleads for the Sick.

At the public meeting held in the Town Hall Monday evening at which Miss Melkielejohn delivered a very interesting address, a report of which will be found in another column, Dr. L. G. Pinault submitted the following report of the work of the Public Health Committee:

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen:

The Public Health Committee thought it proper to take advantage of this meeting to give a synopsis of our doings in public health work during the last twelve months. As we were not much posted in this kind of work at first we did not do as much as we would have done if we had not been compelled to overcome all the difficulties that go hand in hand with the organization of a new service.

As you all know there was no question of a public health nurse in this town until the Provincial Department of Health last winter sent us Miss Ferris to show us what a good public health nurse can do in a community. A committee was formed then to help her carry on the work. Knowingly and when at the end of six months she left us to report to headquarters, everybody regretted it and it was the unanimous feeling that we could do without a public health nurse in future.

The committee then made an application to Miss Melkielejohn, the able director of Public Health Nurses in this province for a nurse to continue the good work started by Miss Ferris. Unfortunately there were none available at the time and we had to wait, but, in the fall our patience was rewarded when Miss Maloney was sent to us. Miss Maloney seems to have adopted the French motto which I can translate as this: "Noise does no good and good makes no noise." I can assure you that she is a great worker and a very competent one and I can add that she is liked as much as was Miss Ferris and that means a great deal.

Last year our expenses amounted to very little outside of the nurses salary and the financing was easy, the Town Council having granted us the amount of \$1000 to help pay our nurse.

Your Worship and gentlemen of the Town Council, it is our duty to thank you for this move which honors you individually and brings great credit on the Town Council as a body. You have understood the importance of helping the poor sufferers unable to pay for private assistance and you realized the duty of saving the babies who for various reasons have not been given a proper chance to live or grow strong. We formulate the wish that in future you will always consider favorably the requests coming from the Public Health Committee, convinced that every one of them is made for the prevention of disease, mitigation of suffering, improvement of health and for the saving of lives in danger.

The work has been carried on under some difficulties and has been incomplete so far, the nurse has been unable to attend to all the services she can render on account of lack of proper accommodation for the holding of baby clinics, but we hope for better days as a request for a room is before the Town Council at the present time.

Now our programme for the future is the following: First—The holding of baby clinics, where mothers will report weekly with their babies, have them weighed and if something is defective either in the feeding or in the keeping of the child have it remedied when possible, but it will be impossible to carry out this first part of our program if we cannot secure proper quarters.

Second—Have a list of the tubercular persons who for some reasons are a little neglected, and take special pains to make sure that they take all possible precaution to protect from infection those with whom they live. An effort will also be made to place in sanatoriums all curable cases too poor to pay their own expenses.

Third—The carrying on of a campaign of education on cleanliness, fresh air and sunlight. Too many ignore the fact that fresh air and sunlight are our best friends; friends who are waiting at every door and at every window, knocking for admission, anxious to come in to purify the atmosphere, fill the lungs with vivifying oxygen and kill the germs of diseases which are waiting for a prey by the cradle side.

To effect this program we expect from the Town Council the continuation of a good substantial grant and a proper all day room for the Public Health Nurse. You were right gentlemen

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
